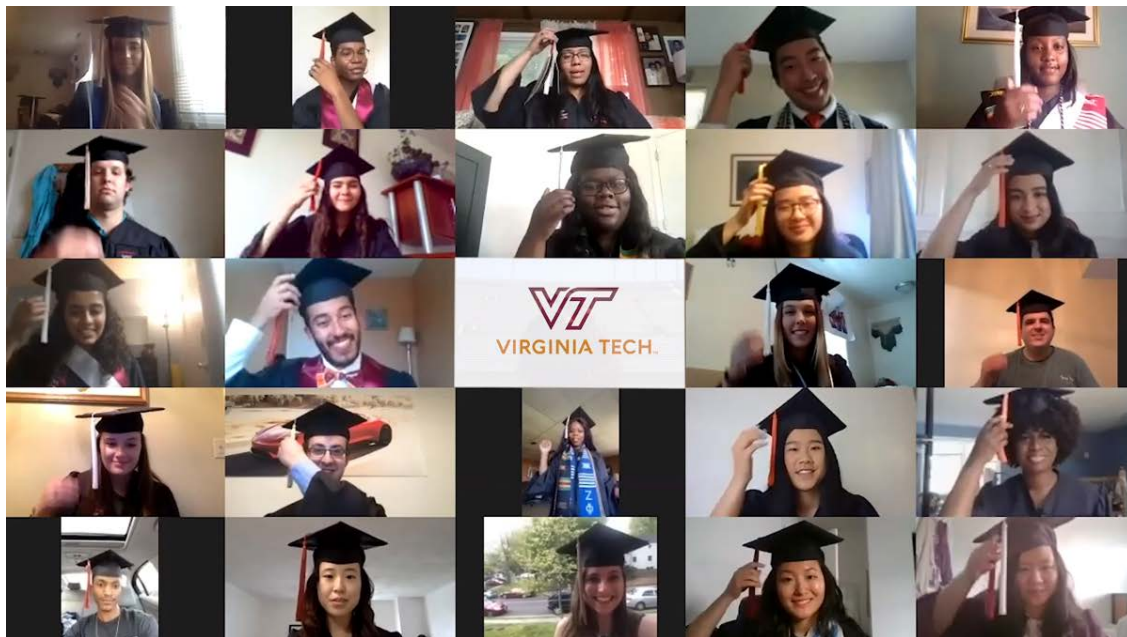

Online ceremony honors graduates

Commencement 2020 was one for the Hokie history books.

For the first time, Virginia Tech leaders, celebrity alumni, a sports icon, and a dancing HokieBird appeared virtually across computer and mobile screens everywhere to confer degrees and salute the Class of 2020. More than 4,200 viewers watched the ceremony in real time online.

About 5,600 Hokies graduated with bachelor's degrees and 62 earned associates degrees. Also, 1,247 graduate students were recognized.

Hokies@Home collecting COVID-19 experiences

The University Libraries' Special Collections and University Archives is collecting and preserving the extraordinary experiences of members of the Hokie Nation during the COVID-19 global pandemic.

Leaders of the Hokies@Home: Documenting COVID-19 at Virginia Tech project are [collecting](#) oral histories, audio recordings, written stories, diary and journal entries, photographs, videos, art, and other documentation for inclusion in its publicly available digital collections.

Archivists want to hear from university faculty, staff, and wage employees; prospective, undergraduate, graduate, and doctoral students; alumni; parents and family of Virginia Tech students; university contractors; and members of local communities connected to Virginia Tech.

“We also want to hear from all Virginia Tech locations including Blacksburg, Richmond, the Greater D.C. area, Hampton Roads, Roanoke, Abingdon, Reynolds Homestead, Agricultural Research and Extension Centers, the Steger Center for International Scholarship, study abroad sites, and any other locations with a connection to the university,” said Aaron Purcell, director of University Libraries' Special Collections and University Archives. “It’s important to collect all of these experiences and make them digitally available and searchable for future generations.”

Satellites capture spread of 'mile-a-minute weed' from space for improved food security on the ground

The spread of the invasive weed *Mikania micrantha* has increased by 800 percent in Nepal over the past 30 years.

That's the latest research out of Tribhuvan University in Nepal, part of a Feed the Future Innovation Lab for Integrated Pest Management project, housed at the Center for International Research, Education, and Development. The findings were recently highlighted in [Agrilinks](#), an online hub for agriculture, food security, and development news. Nepal, which is one of seven countries the IPM Innovation Lab operates in, is especially vulnerable to invasive species spread as it fosters some of the world's most unique biodiversity hot spots.

Mikania is a vine that spreads so quickly it earned the nickname "mile-a-minute weed." Native to Central and South America, it threatens Nepal's forest areas and grasslands, its spread dramatically reducing crop yields and increasing weeding costs for smallholder farmers. Additionally,



the weed is rampant throughout the Chitwan National Park, a world heritage site and popular ecotourism destination. *Mikania* outcompetes a number of vital native plant species within the park, including vegetation eaten by the endangered greater one-horned rhinoceros, which resides there.

The IPM Innovation Lab project tracks the spread of *Mikania* — as well as other destructive invasive weeds — using remote sensing, a relatively new area of research that utilizes satellite images to identify occurrence, distribution, and abundance of species spread.





