COVID-19 Rapid Response Seed Funding Available

In collaboration with Virginia Tech institutes and colleges, the Office of the Vice President for Research and Innovation has established a COVID-19 Rapid Response Seed Fund to support Virginia Tech researchers. **Faculty, staff, and students are strongly encouraged to utilize their expertise to identify problems related to the COVID-19 pandemic and seek partnerships** with interdisciplinary researchers, industry, and federal agencies to create novel solutions needed now and in the future. COVID-19 Research Grants on Education and Inequity

The Spencer Foundation is interested in **supporting studies that aim to understand and disrupt the reproduction and deepening of educational inequality caused by the COVID-19 crisis as well as studies that explore ways to remake and imagine anew forms of equitable education.** The program does not specify research topics, disciplines, designs, methods, or locations. Applications will be accepted on a rolling basis with budgets up to \$50,000 for projects ranging from one to three years. Review of applications will take place on May 4th, again on May 18th, and again on June 8th. [Click here](#) for details.

CIVIC Innovation Challenge

NSF has launched the Civic Innovation Challenge (CIVIC) which is a research and action competition in the *Smart and Connected Communities* domain. The challenge will **support ready-to-implement, research-based pilot projects in and with communities, with an expected \$9M in federal funds.** CIVIC comprises two tracks: 1) Communities and Mobility: Offering Better Mobility Options to Solve the Spatial Mismatch Between Housing Affordability and Jobs; and 2) Resilience to Natural Disasters: Equipping Communities for Greater Preparedness and Resilience to Natural Disasters.
