The Virginia Tech **Army ROTC** cadets have been ranked #1 in 2008, and for the past three-year average in the National and Senior Military College Order of Merit Army ROTC rankings. The cadets have improved their rankings over the past three years, culminating this year with first place rankings in 16 of 20 evaluated areas.

Sharon Arnold, Allison Dunn, Valerie Samson, and Ryan Winegan, undergraduate students in Apparel, Housing, and Resource Management, have been selected for the 2008 Who's Who Among Students in U.S. Universities and Colleges. Selection is based on academic performance, leadership, and an applicant essay. They will receive their certificates at a university-wide leadership awards banquet on April 12.

Julia O. Beamish and **Rosemary Carucci Goss,** both from Apparel, Housing, and Resource Management, published, along with Mira Ahn, "Understanding older adults attitudes and adoption of residential technologies" in *Family and Consumer Sciences Research Journal* 36.3 (2008): 243-60.

Sociology doctoral student **Laura Boutwell** is a co-author on the paper "A Digital Library for Recovery, Research, and Learning from April 16, 2007 at Virginia Tech," which has been accepted for publication in the journal *Traumatology*.

Professor of Religious Studies **Brian Britt**, Interdisciplinary Studies, has co-edited, along with Alexandra Cuffel, *Religion, Gender, and Culture in the Pre-Modern World* (Palgrave Macmillan, 2007). The book compares shifting formulations of gender, interfaith, and ethnic relations in the Near East, Europe, the Americas, and Africa from antiquity to the nineteenth century.

Elizabeth Carraway, an undergraduate English major and Women's Studies minor, has been selected as one of four students representing Virginia Tech at the Third Annual ACC Meeting of the Minds Conference at Florida State University. Carraway was selected for her analysis titled "Fitzgerald and Anderson on Lovers, Wives and Mothers." Fritz Oehlschlaeger, English, serves as her Faculty Research

Advisor. The ACC Meeting of the Minds is an opportunity for students from ACC schools to present their research projects and for faculty and administrators from across the ACC to share information about conducting undergraduate research. This is the third year that the College of Liberal Arts and Human Sciences has sent a student representative to this meeting.

Tracy Cowden, Music, has been invited to perform with the Carpe Diem String Quartet, ensemble in residence at the Conservatory of Music at Capital University, in Columbus, Ohio, on March 9, 2008. She will join the quartet for a performance of the Taneyev Piano Quintet, and they will repeat the program at Virginia Tech on March 15 and 16 as part of the University Chamber Music Series.

Outsourcing Technical Communication: Issues, Policies and Practices, edited by Barry Thatcher and Carlos Evia, English, was published by Baywood Publishing Company (2008). Evia also wrote the introduction, "The Changing Face of Technical Communication in the Global Outsourcing Economy," and a chapter, "Defining Technical Communication in the United States and India: A Contrastive Analysis of Established Curricula and Desired Abilities."

The New River, a journal of digital writing and art created and edited by **Ed Falco**, English, was selected by the Electronic Literature Organization for inclusion in the Library of Congress's Internet Archive Project. The Library of Congress will now provide a link to the New River and periodically "crawl" the site to stay updated. The purpose of the project is to archive significant sites for future generations.

Theodore Fuller, Sociology, hosted a delegation from Thailand on November 27. The group was comprised of 41 people from Thailand, 32 of whom were university Presidents. They were interested in learning more about county government in the United States, as Thailand is in the process of decentralizing many of its services. Fuller organized several presentations for the guests regarding the varieties of local government in the United States, economic development issues at the local level, preparing professionals to work in the area of economic development, and the Balanced Scorecard method of planning. Before leaving Virginia Tech, the group had a banquet at the Inn at Virginia Tech, where they were greeted by Dean Sue Ott Rowlands and Vice Provost John Dooley.

University Distinguished Professor of English **Nikki Giovanni** won an NAACP Image Award in the Literature Category (Poetry) for her collection "Acolytes: Poems"; this was Giovanni's fourth Image Award in the 39 years since the awards were established. The NAACP Image Awards is the nation's premier event celebrating the outstanding achievements and performances of people of color in the arts as well as those individuals or groups who promote social justice. The awards recognize achievement in motion pictures, television, recordings, and literature. Other winners this year included Denzel Washington, Tyler Perry, Alicia Keys, and Janet Jackson. Giovanni received the award in Los Angeles on February 14.

Susan A. Hagedorn, English, is Editor-in-Chief of a new electronic international, peer reviewed scientific journal. Issue 1, Volume 1 of the *Journal of Environmental Detection* was published in January 2008. The journal is dedicated to the detection and amelioration of sources of pollution in the environment.

Celia Hayhoe, Apparel, Housing, and Resource Management, has been invited to be a keynote commentator at an Interdisciplinary Academic Symposium on Debt hosted by the University of Illinois and the American Bankruptcy Institute.

Tiffany Henry, an undergraduate in Apparel, Housing, and Resource Management, received the first place design award in the student design competition of the 2008 Fiber to Fashion Conference. Along with a scholarship, she received a trip to the conference in Las Vegas. Henry's faculty sponsor and advisor is Jihyun Kim.

Joan B. Hirt, Educational Leadership and Policy Studies, has been announced as the 2008 recipient of NASPA's Robert H. Shaffer Award for Academic Excellence as a Graduate Faculty Member. Hirt will be honored during the NASPA Awards Luncheon on Tuesday, March 11, in Boston. NASPA-Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education is the leading voice for student affairs administration, policy, and practice and affirms the commitment of student affairs to educating the whole student and integrating student life and learning.

Kent Holliday, Music, won the Virginia Music Teachers Association Composition Competition for his piano sonata. In addition to a cash award, Holliday was commissioned to compose a new work to be played at the state convention next fall.

Kelly, Professor Emerita, Teaching and Learning, received the Ted Hipple Award for Distinguished Service to the field of young adult literature at the National Council of Teachers of English Convention in New York in November 2007. The award is given annually by the Assembly on Literature for the Adolescent.

On Friday, February 29 and Saturday, March 1, the Department of Music hosted the annual conference of the Virginia State Chapter of the National Association of Teachers of Singing, the professional organization for both academics and those who teach voice in private studios. During the conference approximately 400 students of singing were audited by panels of three judges in some 27 different categories based on age, gender, and literature, and workshops were offered for those in attendance.
