The staff of the Special Collections Department and the Scholarly Communications Project made tremendous achievements, expanding access to online library resources and providing superior library services to local and remote clientele this fiscal year. Electronic resources available from the Scholarly Communications Project increased radically this year and experiments evolved into new resources and services that the local university community as well as Internet users have come to expect from the University Libraries. Online class materials grew from eight classes in the spring of 1995 to 130 in the fall of 1996. The first forty graduate students submitted electronic theses and dissertations for Graduate School approval and these ETDs received full library processing and timely Internet access worldwide. Six new journals were added to the publications roster, and five editors have contacted SCP about additional works they would like published electronically. Developing new initiatives for the Information Systems' strategic plan resulted in the founding of the VT Digital Libraries group and stage-one development of a digital image database (complete with images and identifying data).

The Special Collections Department staff concentrated their time and energy this year on improving access to its unique materials and rare resources, and used a relatively small portion of the budget to increase the size of its physical collections. More students were employed to assist in routine collection processing, digital image scanning, and HTML markup. Through closer interaction with the Scholarly Communications Project, equipment, software, and expertise were more readily available to the department. The Reading Room was open nearly 2000 hours, providing professional-level reference services and research assistance to walk-in clients. A wealth of new finding aids and scanned images were made available on the World Wide Web, improving access for remote Internet users as well as local clients and generating numerous additional e-mail inquiries.

With increased responsibilities and important staff losses by both the Project and Special Collections, personnel resources were stretched; our time was often fragmented and tasks begun could not always be completed. However, the staff at the Scholarly Communications Project and the Special Collections Department expanded access to online library resources and provided superior library services to local and remote clientele. Throughout 1995/96 the Scholarly Communications Project continued to focus on its mission –publishing electronic journals and experimenting in electronic scholarly communications. The goal to increase access to scholarly works and those of local and regional interest by electronically developing resources serves the University Libraries and Virginia Tech community well. The Project's endeavors add value to scholarly works that may also be published in paper and expands library services beyond its buildings or the limits of the campus through all day every day Internet access. Below is a summary of the resources that were begun or enhanced this year by the University Libraries' Scholarly Communications Project.

The Project's roster of ejournals/ grew with the addition of significant new titles, three edited by VT faculty, two mirrored in collaboration with MIT Press, and one negotiated by a VT faculty but edited by a University of Delaware colleague. Remarkably, four new titles (*) are published only electronically. During 1995/96 this FDA database was migrated from plain ASCII to HTML; updated guarterly; and received improved searching and readability of records.

The Special Collections Department had a terrific year! So much was accomplished due to a knowledgeable staff who provide excellent user services. They developed an exceptional number of new Web sites that greatly increased the awareness of the Internet community, both local and remote, to the unique resources available through University Libraries. They accepted the challenge of learning to prepare Web pages while not relinquishing their other responsibilities, including collection, development, management, and processing; traditional outreach such as exhibits and presentations; and direct user services. The four key staff spent nearly 2000 hours at the Reference Desk and responded to an ever increasing number of e-mail messages generated by the new Web sites, in addition to the traditional postal, phone, and walk-in references queries.

Disaster in the Rare Book Room

Mold bloom developed during the summer of 1995 when the cooling system malfunctioned and the war humid air was pumped into the Rare Book Room. Laura Katz Smith identified the problem and immediately assumed responsibility for removal, restoration, and cleaning. She called to action the Disaster Action Team--examining every single book and those with any indication of possible mold were removed from the room, air dried, and subsequently cleaned. She was able to save all the rare books. While about half of the Brittle Book collection was effected (circa 400 volumes), only about 250 brittle books had to be discarded (working with the Principal Bibliographer), with the remainder moved to Storage. Smith also initiated a regular monitoring and cleaning plan for the Rare Book Room.

Physical space in Special Collections is at a premium in every area. The Rare Book Room had paintings and art work leaning against the spines of value and rare books. The space in the Reading Room and the Basement was maximized by stacking map-type cases in each area, providing flat rather than rolled storage of blueprints and architectural drawings. The Processing Room and the Staff office space were somewhat improved by moving 500 cubic feet of manuscripts and books to offsite storage. However, there isn't enough space for the staff to have computer tables next to their desks; they average only ???? square feet of floor space person. These crowded conditions are not conducive to efficient work, but the staff are very congenial.

PERSONNEL HIGHLIGHTS: Special Collections and Scholarly Communications

With increased responsibilities and important staff losses in both SCP Special Collections, staff resources were stretched to the limit. Less was accomplished than we had planned as our time was often fragmented and tasks begun could not be completed. However, the Scholarly Communications Project and the Special Collections Department staff accomplished a tremendous amount, expanding access to online library resources and providing excellent library services to local and remote clientele.

Dorothy **Bodell** resigned, leaving the experienced Special Collections staff to assume her reference and access services responsibilities. Her knowledge of local history and genealogical resources was so unique, and her salary quite expensive, so she was not replaced. Instead, additional students were hired to assist with manuscript and archival collection processing, freeing trained staff time for reference services. For the first time **Liz Ackermann** assumed regular reference desk duties, drawing upon her experience with the collections, but diminishing the time she could spend on other tasks, most notably the Billings Collection inventory. She also supervised a welcome cadre of Chi Delta Alpha service sorority volunteers who worked over 325 hours and contributed immensely to a variety of projects.

Laura Katz **Smith** did a tremendous job of handling the most bloom that developed in the Rare Book Room when the cooling system malfunctioned in the heat of the summer. She also contributed to the Internet a wealth of information about the unique manuscript collections held within the department. Tamara **Kennelly's** diligence in archival collecting and Web access (particularly the Lyric Theatre and the Math Department History) greatly improved the presence s well as the content of the University on the Web. **Eric Ackermann** attempted to create and maintain a user database but was thwarted by PC hardware failure and learning the Macintosh replacement system. Joyce **Nester** co-presented a session on job rotation and cross training at the VLA Paraprofessional Forum that was attended by nearly 200, and she contributed to planning the very successful "Charting Our Course" staff development day for University Libraries.

The SCP's half-time grade six position (shared with Science Reference) was vacated in March and the two halves were joined into one full time position for the SCP. Peter **Haggerty** accepted the position, but stayed only six months before successfully applying for a grade 10 in Library Automation. He continues to support the SCP, especially the ETDs, Spectrum, and VA News. Many of his programming initiatives immensely improved access, especially VA News and ETDs.

James **Powell** continued to split his time between Library Automation and the Scholarly Communications Project, enthusiastically devoting his energy and creativity to experiments in electronic scholarship that evolves into popular new library services. He made outstanding contributions to the Project digital initiatives with his ideas for improving library services to students and faculty as well as to our remote clientele. **His book,** *HTML Plus!* **went to press this fiscal year.**

Gail **McMillan** continued to split her time between the Scholarly Communications Project and the Special Collections Department. Much of her time was devoted to the ETD project, participating in SURA grant funded travel and training, contributing to the successful FIPSE grant, and drafting technical services processes. (The latter included an article published in *Cataloging and Classification Quarterly*.) She also taught over 600 faculty about VT Online Class Materials and prepared detailed instructions for faculty and students (both online and in paper). She served as a
