




Jim Bohland is one of the directors of a state-wide study of indigent health care, sponsored by the Virginia Department of Medical Assistance.

Implementation Project, will review the <u>Guidelines</u> in preparation for a second edition. Over 30,000 copies of the first edition have been distributed since 1984.


