

INFLUENZA IS SERIOUS

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You can never tell who is going to develop the disease in its dangerous form, and one would certainly feel very badly if he thought he had unwittingly, perhaps carelessly, caused the death of some person.

The disease has secured a very wide distribution throughout the country, and also in the state. It will be only by the co-operation of all the people that the epidemic can be controlled.

There are about fourteen or fifteen homes in Cedar City affected with the disease, and Health Officer, Dr. Macfarlane states that the eqidemic is now pretty well in hand with but few new cases developing and with possibly one exception, no cases at present that appear serious.

Now, if everyone will heed the instructions issued by the State Board of Health, as published elsewhere in this issue, we feel sure that the disease can soon be stamped out here.

INFLUENZA IS SERIOUS

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Tone Classification Categories:

- Alarmist: uses fear or urgency; induces a sense of panic; mentions a number in a comparative context (e.g., 10 more deaths today); mentions a seemingly large number for the context (i.e., hundreds in a single day).
- Warning: refers to the gravity of the situation; serious but not urgent; cautioning; advises the reader what to do; mentions measures being taken as a sign of seriousness of threat
- **Reassuring:** comforting; implies threat is diminishing; addresses fears with soothing sensibility; motivates action with sense of hopefulness, improvement, or possibility of avoidance of disease
- Explanatory: neutral source of information; lacks distinctive affect.






Tone classification on 8 weekly newspapers

- Selected texts: local reporting on the disease, including news articles, statements from county and city health officials, editorials and letters, and advertisements from local companies that referenced influenza.
- This sample did not include reports on individual victims, such as obituaries or reports of ill individuals.
- Total of 723 sentences from Hays Free Press (66), Colville Examiner (169), Iron County Record (142), Perrysburg Journal (25), Red Deer News (70), Middlebury Register (94), Era Leader (35), and Big Stone Gap Post (122).



Issues with Tone Detection

- (Dis)agreement among coders
- Poor text derived from OCR and substantial time needed to prepare text
- Level of analysis: phrase, sentence, or article
- Limited number of newspapers available for text mining (Chronicling America and Peel's Prairie Provinces)
- Accuracy rate of the classifier
- Balancing precision with scale

"To be sure, subject-area experts won't die out. But their supremacy will ebb. From now on, they must share the podium with the big-data geeks, just as princely causation must share the limelight with humble correlation. This transforms the way we value knowledge, because we tend to think that people with deep specialization are worth more than generalists—that fortune favors depth. Yet expertise is like exactitude: appropriate for a small-data world where one never has enough information, or the right information, and thus has to rely on intuition and experience to guide ones way. In such a world, experience plays a critical role, since it is the long accumulation of latent knowledge—knowledge that one can't transmit easily or learn from a book, or perhaps even be consciously aware of that enables one to make smarter decisions. But when you are stuffed silly with data, you can tap that instead, and to greater effect. Thus those who can analyze big data may see past the superstitions and conventional thinking not because they're smarter, but because they have the data." (pp. 142-143)





QUARANTINE IN BISBEE IS REPLACED TO CURB DISEASE

County and City Health Authorities Decide That City Should Undergo Part Quarantine to Safeguard Public.

The order does not apply to cigar stores and soft drink parlors but the public is asked to co-operate in every way with the city and coun-

HEAVY INCREASE IN INFLUENZA IN WARREN DISTRICT

Quarantine Will Remain in Force at Least Ten Days and Ban Will Be Lifted With Caution

The quarantine in the Warren district, imposed on account of the epidemic of influenza, will not be lifted today nor tomorrow. At least ten days must pass before it is lifted and the removal of the ban then will be attended by extreme precautionary med ures. This was the sense of a meeting held last night in the rooms of the Warren District Commercial club between the directors of the club and the physicians of the district. After shearing what the doctors had to say about the present situation the directors unanimously pa sed a resolution endorsing the action of the physicians in extending the quarantine.





- •Our study did not originally seek to answer questions about visualization. Instead, these questions came to us late in the process of research, after decisions about data mining algorithms had been made.

The Serum Question

- A serum is created by separating blood into its solid and liquid components so that antibodies to microbes can be utilized for their immunizing properties.
- Serums are injected into people who are already sick in the hope that antibodies from other people who have been sick and recovered will be helpful.
- However, serum at the time was sometimes used as a synonym for vaccine, although not all the time as we discovered.

WILL TRY BLOOD SERUM

Illinois Doctors Will Employ Luduenza Remedy Used Here.

The state influenza commission of Illinois has decided to try the blood serum which has been employed by University of Missouri physicians in combatting influenza.

The commission is faced with a difficult problem to obtain the curative in sufficient quantities, as it was stated that eight ounces of blood must be taken from a patient who has survived the malady to produce three ounces of the serum.

The commission received first hand reports of experiments with the serum from Dr. Herman N. Bundesen of the Chicago Health Department. who returned recently from an Eastern trip. The commission laid emphasis on the fact that the serum cannot be obtained for use in the thousands of cases of influenza in the state. and that it should not be confused with the vaccine now in use. The vaccine is a preventive and the serum is used as a curative only in desperate cuses. The commission expect to rely on the vaccine from the Mayo Founduction for general vaccination.

The Serum Question continued.

Paris, Ky., Jan. 14, 1919. Believing that a former order of the City Board of Health strongly urging the importance of innoculation with the Rosenow-Mayo serum as the safest known method for protection against influenza and pneumonia, has in a large measure been disregarded, the percentage of innoculated children in the various rooms of the City School being about six, and in further view of the fact that the Board finds many cases, though mild, which might have been prevented, respectfully calls attention to the following communication:

Dr. A. H. Keller, City Health Officer,

Paris, Ky.

As requested, I am sending you the Rosenow-Mayo Vaccine for preventive inoculation against influenza, and especially against the types of pneumonia which have caused most of the deaths during this epidemic. Dr. Rosenow says "This vaccine is prepared from pneumococci of the various types and allied green-producing streptococci, from hemolytic streptococci, staphylococci and influenza bacilli, as isolated from the sputa and lungs of cases during the present epidemic of influenza and pneumonia."

Dr. Rosenow advises that individuals be given three inoculations, one week apart, in order to get the highest and most enduring immunity. There is usually no reaction from the inoculation except in persons about to come down with influenza, and even then the disease seems to run a shorter and milder course and complicating pneumonia seldom occurs.

CHICAGO WILL USE NEW 'FLU' VACCINE

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—Vaccine originated by Dr. E. C. Rosenow, of the Mayo clinic, Rochester, Minn., will be used in Chicago's campaign against Spantsh influenca.

Dr. Rosenow told the Chicago influenza emergency commission of his experiments with the vaccine, with which he has treated 20,000 persons. The commission at once named a committee of physicians to take charge of the manufacture and use of all vaccines and serum in Chicago, including the Rosenow vaccine. Another committee was named to raise funds for its manufacture and distribution.

Five days will be required to begin on the manufacture of the vaccine hers, it was stated. Meantime Dr. Rosenow will provide a supply sufficient for 100,000 doses from his laboratory at Elochester.

The vaccine is designed to provide immunity from the disease, though Dr. Rosenow is unwilling to make specific claims as to its value. He believes it aided greatly to suppress the spread of influence at Rochester.




