Dr. T. Marshall Hahn, the eleventh president of Virginia Polytechnic Institute, through his two years in this position has continued to strive to fulfill what he has outlined as our two-fold responsibility—"to place ever increasing emphasis on excellence and provide the broad education which will enable VPI graduates to work tomorrow in fields which do not exist today."

At 36, Dr. Hahn is the youngest president in the history of VPI, and the youngest land-grant university president.

After receiving his B.S. degree in physics from the University of Kentucky in 1945, Dr. Hahn did graduate work at the University of Maryland. He received his Ph.D. degree in physics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1950.

From 1954 to 1959, Dr. Hahn served as head of the physics department here at Tech. He was dean of Arts and Sciences at Kansas State University from 1959 until his appointment as VPI president in 1962.




CORPS OF CADETS



Virginia Tech, a land-grant college, maintains a Corps of Cadets to fulfill its military obligation. The Cadet Regiment, 2200 strong, is composed of a Headquarters, 2 Battalions, 2 Groups, and a Regimental Band. The Corps differs from other Cadet Corps in that it is run by its own officers under the supervision of the Commandant and his assistants. It is separate from the ROTC department since the Commandant is a college official and all cadets are not required to take instruction in military science.

In an effort to maintain the high military and academic standards of the Corps, every aspect of Corps life has been examined and re-evaluated and the basic needs for improvement were noted and acted upon. The Regiment provided an improved atmosphere for study this year as a cadet's education was placed on an equal level with leadership, responsibility, and self-discipline—the other aims of the military system. A new and comprehensive "Cadet Manual" was issued to provide a better foundation for our progressive system.



Many years have past since this picture of the Old Corps was taken, but the purpose of the Corps and the caliber of men it has produced since then have not changed. As was true in 1898, it takes a well-rounded individual to succeed in a world that places a heavy burden upon each of its children. The Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets has always strived to build men who could face the many challenges of modern society. In keeping with the many traditions of the Corps, today's cadet can proudly say that he belongs to a fine organization.



This staff is one of the most unique in the Corps—it has no command functions. Rather, it is a special staff, appointed and directed by the Commandant of Cadets, which performs special services for the entire Regiment.

The President of the Corps of Cadets is an elected official who supervises the Executive Branch by acting as the presiding officer of the Senate.

The responsibilities of the Corps Scholastic Officer encompass all aspects of a Cadet's academic pursuits. Working with a scholastic officer in each unit, he maintains contact with academic problems and insures the best possible study conditions and academic environment.

Although it is the pride of each cadet to uphold the Honor System, the final responsibility rests with the Chief Justice. His duties range from the orientation of freshmen to the conduct of actual trials—all of which result in this most cherished possession: a cadet's honor. To aid the Chief Justice, the Honor Council Chairman conducts or supervises the necessary investigations.

The General's Aide acts as a liason officer between the Commandant and the Corps of Cadets. He is the administrative commander of the Commandant's Staff.

The Corps Chaplain, aided by the Assistant Corps Chaplain, is responsible for all of the religious activities undertaken by the Corps of Cadets. He improves and stimulates religious activity throughout the corps.



1964 saw the VPI Civilian Student Body come of age. It was impossible not to recognize that the C.S.B. had developed into one of the most outstanding and most influential campus organizations. With a membership of over 4000 of the 6000 VPI students, the C.S.B. was able to provide its members with numerous desired activities.

The influence of the C.S.B. was felt most significantly late in the winter quarter when most of the offices of the class of "66" were captured by civilians. This was the first time in the history of our university that civilians were able to defeat the cadet bloc in a class election.

VPI was treated to a most enjoyable Civilian Weekend from January 27 to January 29. The Journeymen presented a fine concert on Friday night that filled Burrell Hall to capacity. The weekend was completed by a dance in the S.A.B. featuring the Magatons and a basketball game with West Virginia.

The C.S.B. is helping to give VPI the atmosphere of a university, rather than just an institute. The element that it is adding is helping to improve our image in Virginia and the entire country.

Among other duties, Mr. Payne coordinates the religious activities on the campus and supervises such programs as that of the War Memorial Chapel. Mr. Crawford is particularly valuable in his role as financial adviser to the treasurers of the varied clubs at VPI.

Thus in many areas of student life outside of college classes each day, Dr. Dean and his staff have authority and complex duties to fulfill.


ETA KAPPA NU

The fraternity has as its objectives the promotion of student participation in undergraduate publications and the elevation of the cause of journalism.


PI OMEGA PI




CIRCLE "K" CLUB






Jerry Claiborne, who has just completed his third season as Tech's head football coach, should be congratulated for his efforts in bringing VPI its first Southern Conference Championship.

Next year's team should be greatly improved with the addition of several outstanding freshmen runners plus the returning of the majority of this year's varsity team.




