A Year of Ups and Downs for The Gobblers

Utin tops Tech's scorers.



1967 was a year of ups and downs for the Hokie gridmen, a year of seven wins and three losses. The Gobblers went into the season with one goal "BEAT MIAMI" and when that goal was not met, the season was over. On way to the Miami rematch, the Techmen picked up seven consecutive wins, but come November 4 the winning skein broke.

A 13-3 win over Tampa University had kicked off the season for the Gobblers. The defense was already in its top-notch form, while the offense was trying to build an attack. Next came an easy 31-7 victory against William & Mary. Then three close ones: Kansas State 15-3, Villanova 3-0, and Kentucky 24-14.

The Techmen finally generated an offensive attack in the sixth game of the year—Richmond. The "Galloping Greek from Chesapeake," George Constantinides, scored 26 points, four touchdowns and one two-point conversion, leading Tech's 45-14 stomping of the Spiders. A 20-7 win over WVU at Morgantown brought the Gobblers undefeated streak to seven.

Victories came no more in Hokie Land. Miami repeated its 1966 Liberty Bowl performance with another 14-7 win over tech. Florida State revenged last year's game with an impressive 38-15 win. Even VMI got some revenge by humiliating the Gobblers 12-10 on Thanksgiving Day.

In the season opener against Tampa, the all-new Tech backfield started off by driving 70 yards in 10 plays with the opening kickoff to spark the Gobblers to a 13-3 win. The defense set the pace for the rest of the season by intercepting 5 Tampa passes. Jon Utin collected 7 points on two field goals and an extra point, Terry Smoot was the leading ground gainer with 67 yards in 10 carries.

The Virginia Tech Gobblers opened their home season with a resounding 31-7 thrashing of the Indians of William and Mary. Again, pass interceptions were the key plays as the Techmen picked off three enemy aeriels. Clarence Culpepper ran an interception back 87 yards late in the second half to stake the Hokies to a 10-0 lead. Ron Davidson ran another wayward aerial back 54 yards to set up another touchdown.

Next, the Virginia Tech Gobblers journeyed to Manhattan, Kansas, where they downed the fired-up Kansas State Wildcats 15-3. This game was a defensive struggle from start to finish. After the Wildcats took a 3-0 lead late in the first quarter, the Hokies mounted the only sustained drive of the game, traveling 53 yards for a 6-3 lead. Then after Tech stopped Kansas State on the Gobbler 44-yard line, Ken Edwards rambled 40 yards to set up Utin's field goal. Late in the game, George Foussekis forced an errant Wildcat pass that fell into the hands of Mike Widger who ran 8 yards into the endzone for the last Gobbler score.

On their return to Blacksburg, the Hokies were greeted by cold rainy weather in which to play the Wildcats of Villanova. The game, won by Tech 3-0 on Jon Utin's field goal, was one of frustration for both teams. The most excitement came at the end as a Villanova field goal attempt hit the cross bar and fell back on the field.

Next the Gobblers traveled to Lexington, Kentucky where they pounded the Wildcats of Kentucky 24-14. After a scoreless first quarter highlighted by Gene Fisher's punting, the Techmen took charge. The running of Ken Edwards, Terry Smoot, and Rick Piland enabled the Hokies to amass a 21-0 halftime lead. Frank Loria's punt return, a pass interference call and Ron Davidson's kickoff recovery were highlights of the three drives. After Kentucky came back in the third quarter to trim the Gobbler lead 21-14, George Constantinides took over for the injured Smoot and paved the way for Ufin's field goal.

The "Galloping Greek from Chesapeake," George Constantinides, scored 26 points and gained 117 yards to lead the Gobblers over Richmond 45-14. More than 27,000 fans piled into Lane Stadium to watch Virginia Tech in action in its Homecoming game and they all went away impressed. The Tech defense again intercepted four passes to put the season total at 18. Two of the thefts came late in the game and were returned for touchdowns. Chris Collins took the first one 12 yards to paydirt while Randy Treadwell took the last one 25 yards for the game's final touchdown.

Miami Ends Hopes For An Undefeated Season

Against archrival West Virginia, Tech ran its season record to 7-0 by downing the Mountaineers 20-7. The name of the game was kicking as Utin kicked two field goals and two extra points and Fisher consistently backed West Virginia up into its own territory. Fisher had one punt of 78 yards. Jimmy Richards blocked one field goal attempt and barely missed blocking another. Kincaid was 7 for 8 in the air. Constantinides and Longerbeam were the leading ground gainers for the Gobblers. The lone WVU touchdown was the first scored on the ground against the Tech defense this season. Ron Davidson returned a punt 73 yards to the WVU 3-yard line to set up the first Hokes touchdown.

Before 35,000 fans, Tech and Miami held a rematch of last year's Liberty Bowl and again the Gobblers lost 14-7. The loss to Miami snapped the nation's longest regular-season winning streak at 14. The Hokies played valiantly, but the breaks in the game all went to the Hurricanes. A pass interference call on Davidson in the end zone gave Miami the ball on the one from which they scored to lead 7-0. Following several series of downs, Loria fielded a Collins punt on his own 5-yard line and raced 95 yards untouched to tie the score 7-7. The ensuing kickoff was fumbled and Bocko recovered on the Miami 25. A clipping

Florida State and VMI Both Smash Hokies Season Ends With Three Consecutive Losses

The Techmen, still shaken up by a rough Miami game, journeyed down to Tallahassee to suffer a 38-15 loss to the Florida State Seminoles. FSU's All-American passing combination of quarterback Kim Hammond and flanker Ron Sellers was just too much for the Hokie defenses. The Gobblers yielded 390 yards passing, 229 of them were Sellers', on way to suffering their worst defeat of the season.

Thanksgiving Day turned out to be the most tragic day for the '67 Gobbler gridmen. Tech scored in the second quarter on a Jon Utin field goal, and held a 3-0 lead at halftime. The Keydets scored a TD in the third to pull ahead 6-3. Dickie Longerbeam sprinted 20 yards in the final quarter to bring back a lead for the Gobblers. But

the stubborn Keydet team came back and scored another touchdown with 2:31 left and won the contest 12-10. The season was over . . . It ended in a bad way for Virginia Tech.

Frank Loria Becomes Tech's First Consensus All-American

Frank Loria, senior defensive back of the 1967 Gobblers, became the first Consensus All-American in Tech's history. In order to make the Consensus All-America team, an athlete must be named to the first team on at least four of the seven officially recognized teams; Frank Loria made it on all seven teams. Loria also represented Virginia Tech on nation-wide television four times. He was on the Bob Hope Show as a member of the Football Writers' All-America team and the Ed Sullivan Show as a member of the football coaches' team. His other two appearances were as a player on All-Star teams. He played in the East-West Shrine Bowl in San Francisco and in the Hula Bowl in Honolulu. In addition to all his honors on the football field, Loria also made the Academic All-America team.

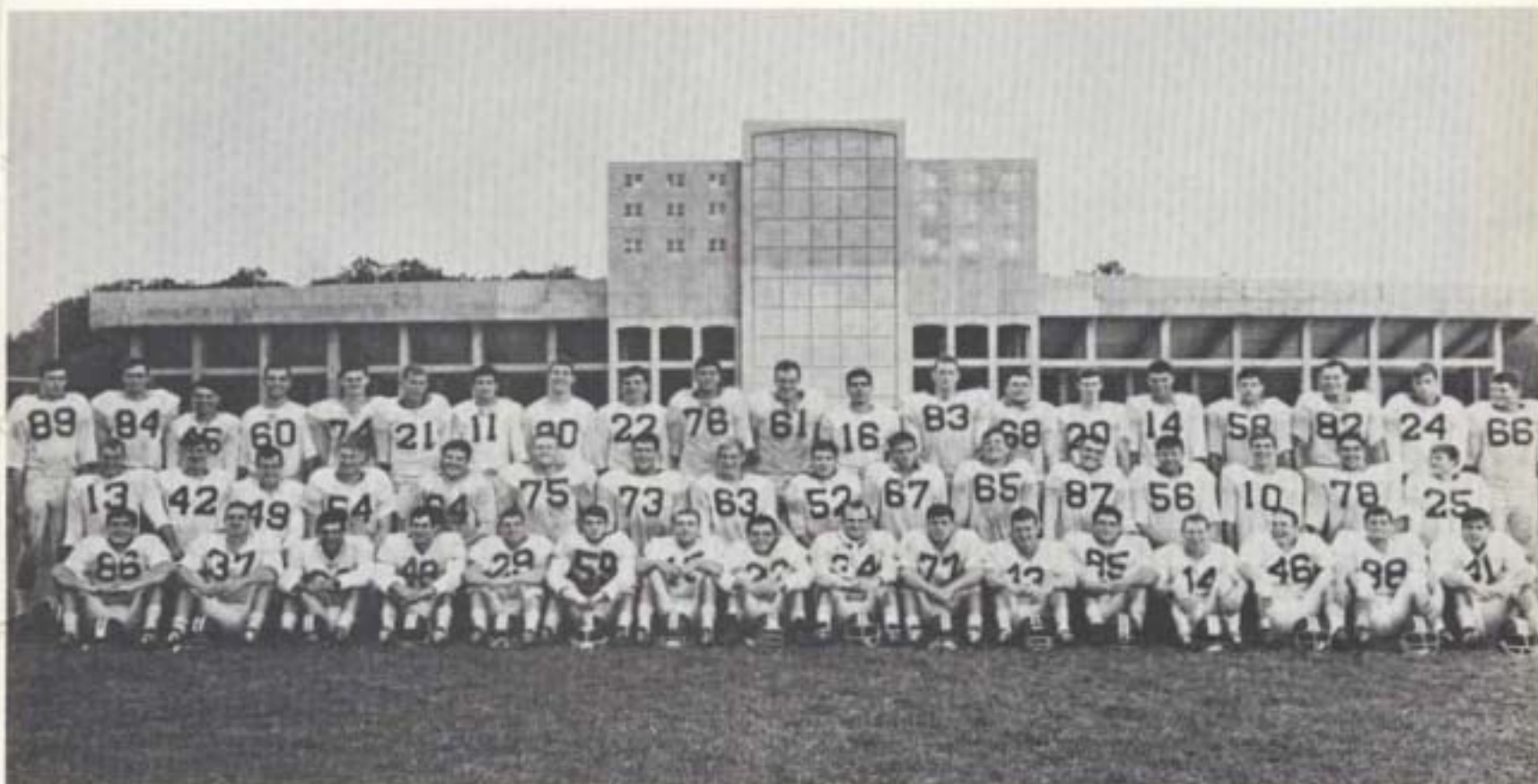

Soccer Club Posts A Strong 3-5 Record

The 1967 Tech Soccer Club experienced a frustrating season, losing five matches by one goal, and in only one game were the Hokies obviously outplayed.

The Tech team opened its season with a tough 2-1 loss at UVa., but came right back with a strong 4-1 win at home over VMI. Following a 3-1 victory over Morris-Harvey at Blacksburg, the Tech kickers traveled to Roanoke College and Eastern Mennonite, losing both games by 2-3 and 1-2 respectively. Returning home, the Gobblers lost a tough match to Washington and Lee on a penalty kick. After losing away to a strong Randolph Macon team, 1-0, the Hokies closed out with their first win ever over a Lynchburg Soccer team, 2-1.

The team's record was misleading as to the team's real strength. Inexperience and some bad breaks hurt the club this season, but with only two starters not returning, the 1968 team should have a better season, led by two-time All-State Selection Ron Evans, who scored 12 goals last season.

In addition to Evans, honorable mention was extended to Barry Baum, Tom Ramsey, Dave Sieg, and Price van der Swaag. The team is coached by Dr. Tom Martin.

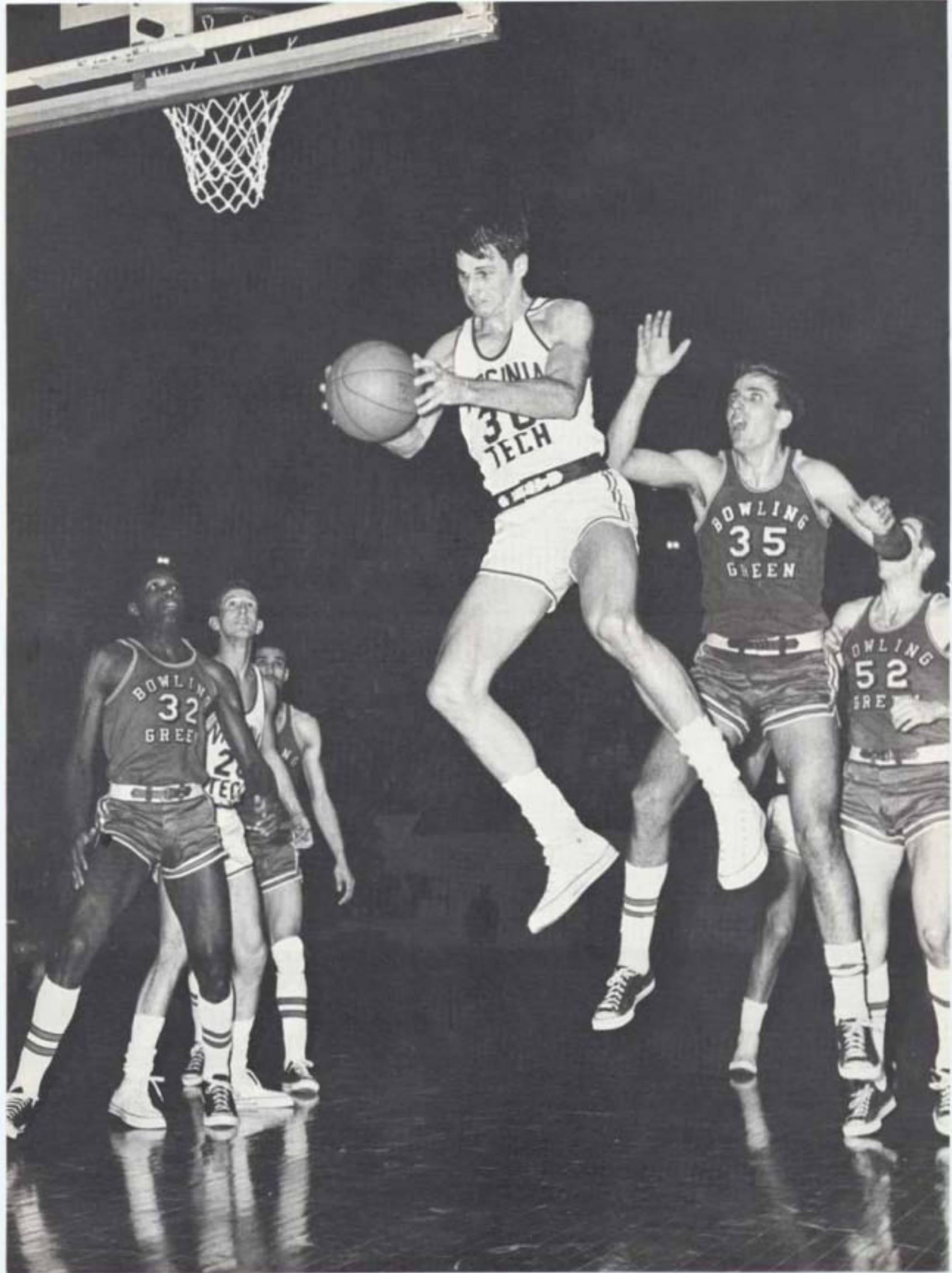

Bench Deficiency and Road Games Obstacles for Techmen

The 1967-68 season was a trying one for the Virginia Tech Gobblers; one in which they were faced with two major problems: an inexperienced bench and a punishing schedule. The Techmen had a 26-game schedule: 16 road games and only 10 home games. And then, if that was not enough, the depletion of the squad during the course of the year added to the bench problems. Three players who were on the team opening day were not on the team at the season's end. One of these three, Ken Talley, left school after the first four games, leaving Tech without a starting center, but Dan Wetzel came off the bench to fill the vacancy. The other two left due to injury. Number six man Stan Kerrick injured his ankle midway through the season and was lost for the concluding nine games, and starting guard

Chris Ellis sustained an injured foot in the Phillips exhibition and did not finish the campaign. At the end of the schedule only seven experienced Techmen were available for duty.

Three seniors were the core of the 67-68 edition of the Gobblers. Glen Combs, Ted Ware, and Wayne Mallard each supplied their own kind of leadership for Virginia Tech. Combs was the point man for the Hokies. From anywhere past the midcourt line, Combs was deadly. Ted Ware was the tower of strength for Tech under both the offensive and defensive boards. His timely layups and rebounding broke up several games. And Wayne Mallard was the scrambler of the team. Ball handling, scoring, and rebounding all were tools in Mallard's arsenal.

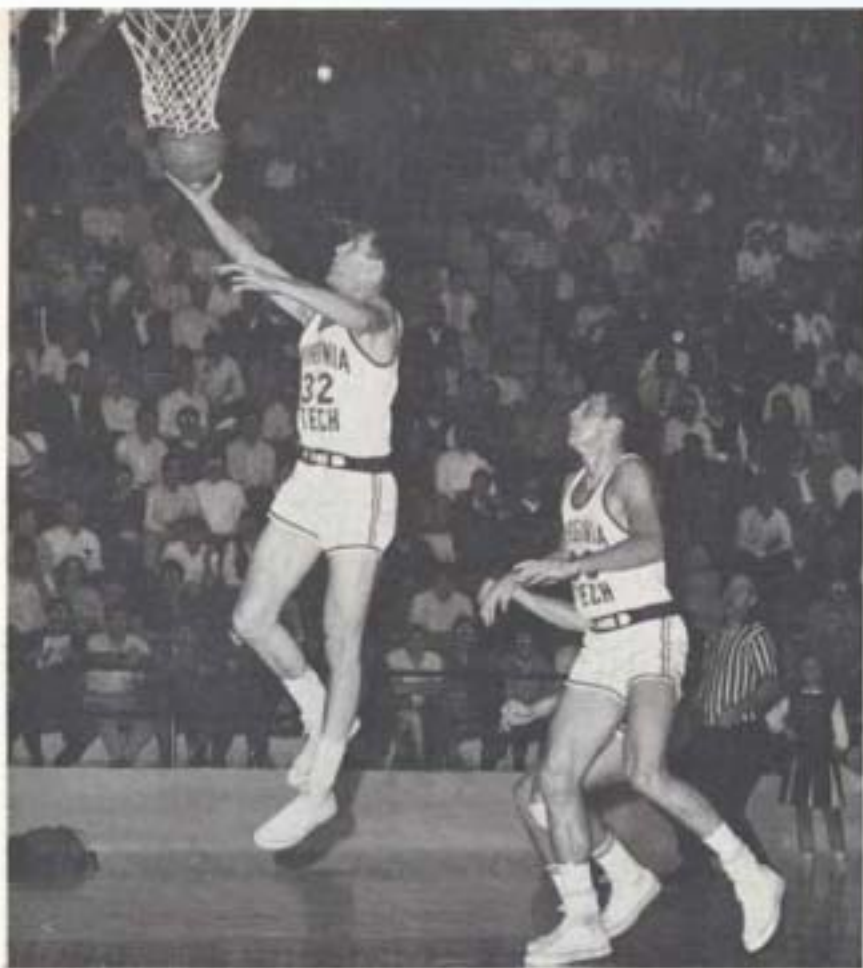

Tech Wins Only Three While Losing Six in December

Three road games resulting in three defeats opened the season for the Gobblers. A December 1, Friday-night game against Duke at Greensboro started the year for Tech, but Tech was not a team that night. Only Glen Combs had a good game as he scored a strong 32 points. The Gobblers led most of the way through the game and contained the Blue Devils until the final few minutes of play. Duke converted several late game one-and-one fouls and pulled ahead to win 74-66. The next night the Gobblers journeyed to Chapel Hill to suffer their second defeat. Again it was about the same story. Tech had a substantial lead throughout the game and lost it in the concluding minutes. Three Gobblers were hot from the field on this night. Combs ended the game with 27 points, Ellis with 19, and Mallard with 21. Larry Miller led his Tar Heels to the 89-76 victory by scoring 30 points. The tired, traveling Techmen then went on down to Alabama and were soundly stomped 92-70. The first victory came in the first home game. The Gobblers welcomed the friendly Coliseum court by defeating Wake Forest 71-67. The Christmas break and holiday tournament play brought more losses to Virginia Tech. The first loss was the departure of Ken Talley from school. The other losses were 90-77 to Yale at Charlottesville; and 97-64 to Brigham Young and 76-61 to Auburn in the All College Tournament in Oklahoma City. NYU fell 75-59 in the consolation of the Virginia-Virginia Tech Tournament at Blacksburg, and Tech also beat Idaho State 103-76 in the opening round of the All College.

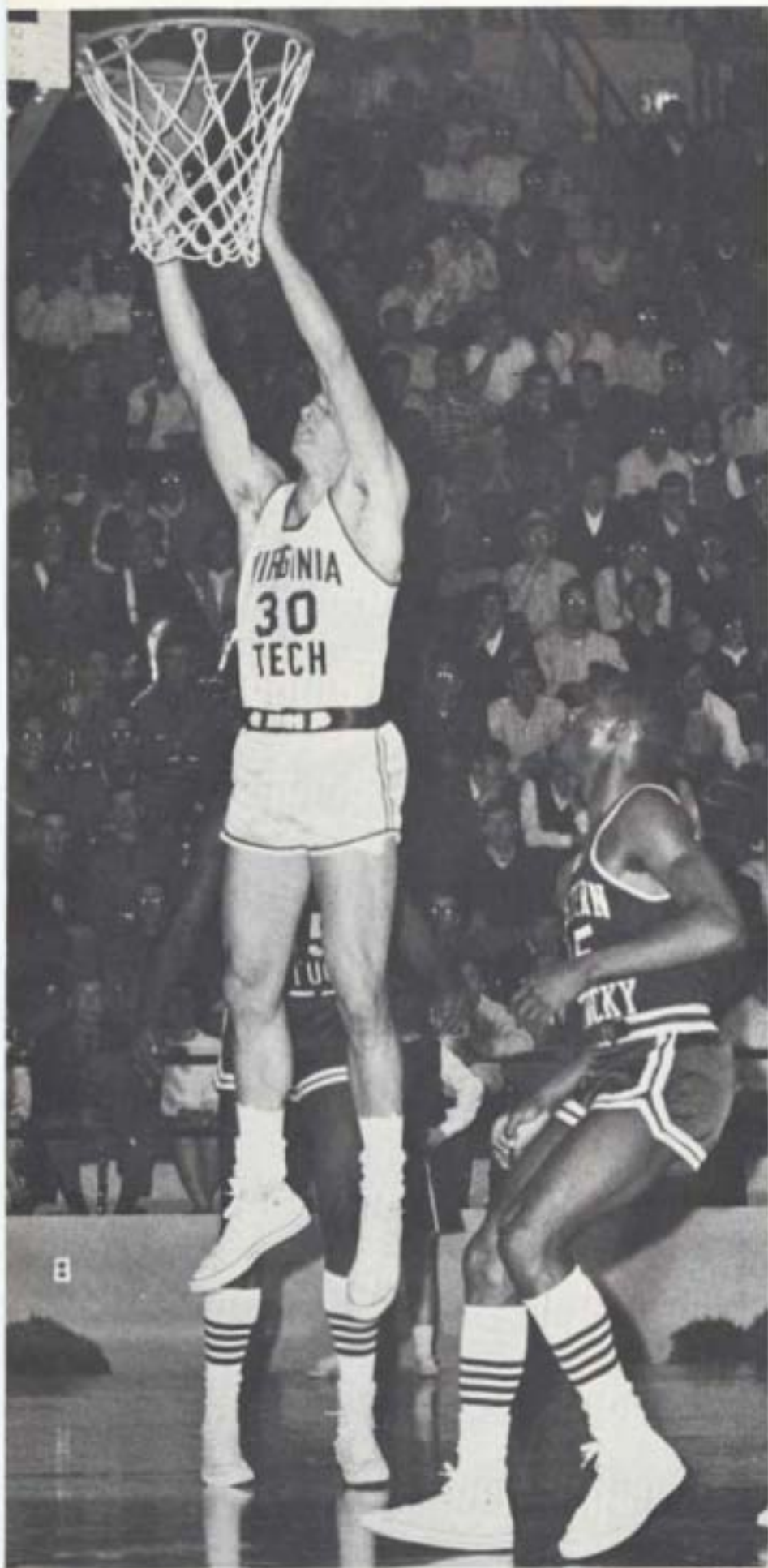

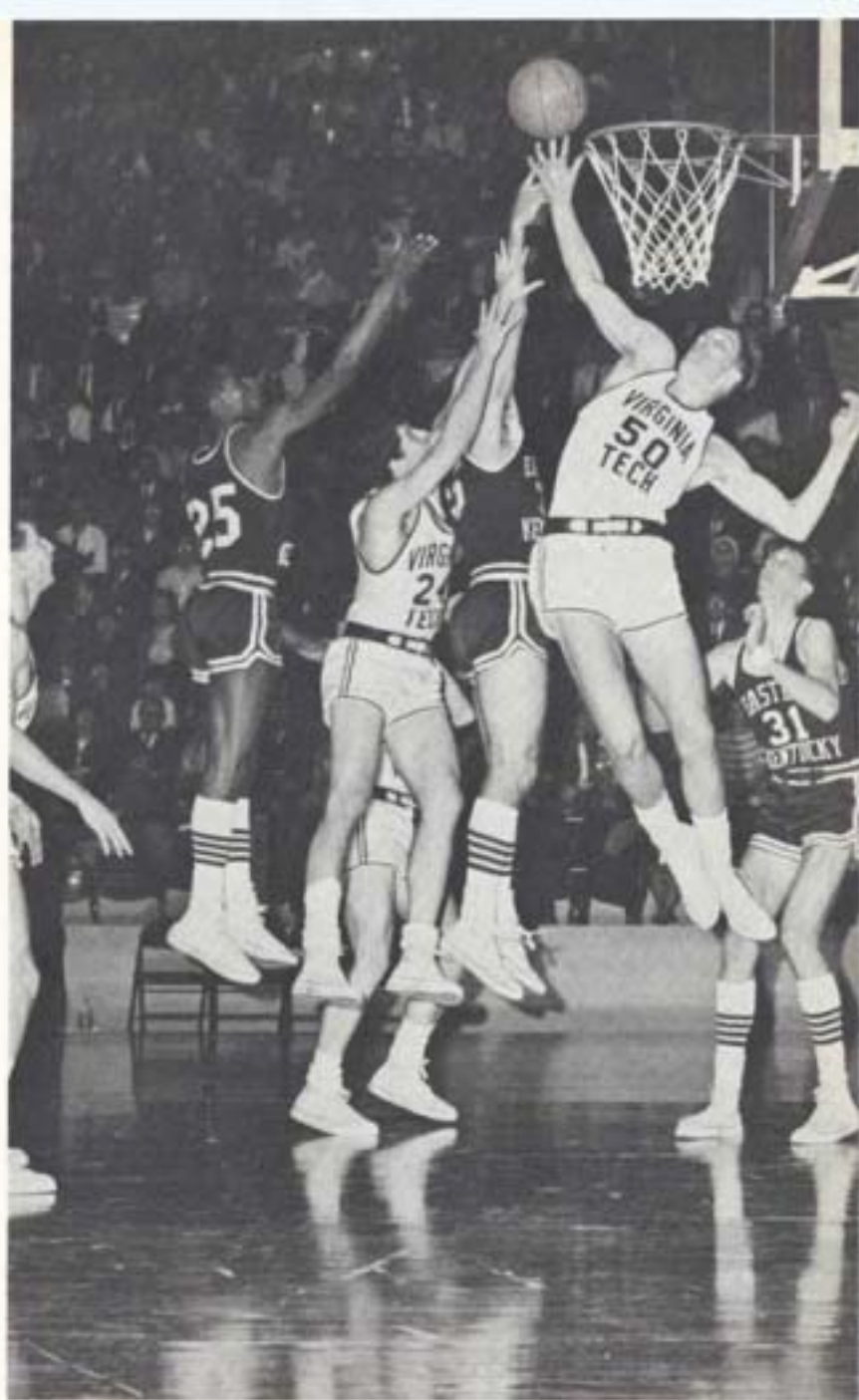

Six Consecutive Wins

After suffering through a bleak December, the Gobblers rallied for six consecutive wins opening the year of 1968. The first victim of the Tech New Year revival was Ohio University. In a game played on a cold January evening in Athens, Ohio, a balanced scoring attack led the Hokies to a 74-65 win. Next came the 84-82 victory over Virginia at Charlottesville. Again Tech had a balanced scoring attack with the top point man being reliever Stan Kerrick with 17. The Virginia Tech basketball team then journeyed to a strange place for Gobbler basketballers, the Tech Coliseum in Blacksburg. The Techmen were nearing the midpoint of the season with only two home games played. The Coliseum proved a welcome sight for Tech as they reeled off a 90-70 win over the William & Mary Indians. This win put Tech at the .500 mark for the first time of the season. The 80-71 win over the Spiders in Richmond jolted the Gobbler record to the winning side. Now Tech had seven wins and six losses, and they were riding a four-game winning streak. The starting five, Glen Combs and Chris Ellis, guards, Ted Ware and Wayne Mallard, forwards, and Dan Wetzel, center, were finally playing as a unit. Even the bench, Stan Kerrick, W. R. Deskins, Ron Wagner, and Dale Manuel, was developing. Next in line came an easy one for the Gobblers, Loyola of Baltimore. When the scoreboard stopped Tech had an easy 92-54 victory. The entire twelve-man Gobbler squad saw action in this contest with nine of them scoring. The sixth victory in the streak was over an extremely tough Eastern Kentucky team. Tech out-rebounded the then best rebounding team in the nation to gain this 84-74 victory. They also contained the Number One rebounder, Garfield Smith, on the way to the win.



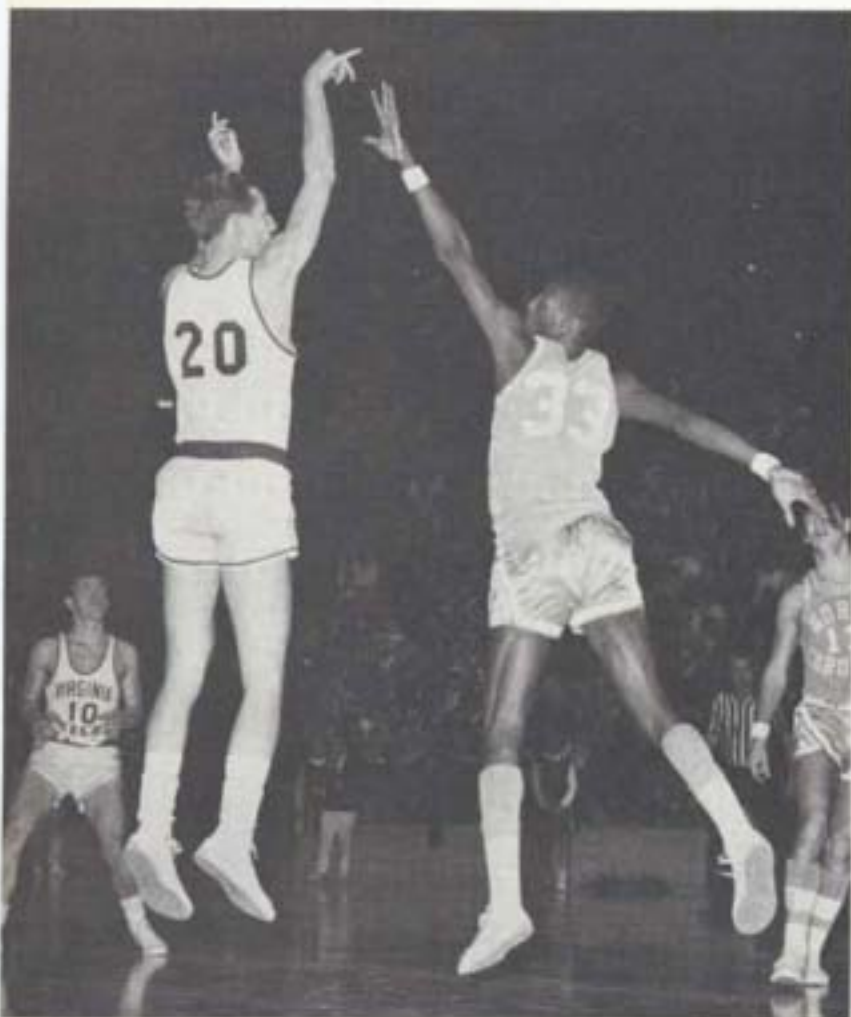

After the good Eastern Kentucky win, the Techmen carried their six-game winning streak to Villanova, Pennsylvania, to tangle with a group of Wildcats who were also riding a six-game winning streak. When it was all over Tech was on the short end of a 78-61 score. A clamping Wildcat defense proved to be impenetrable for the Gobblers in the second half. Guards Combs and Ellis scored 38 of Tech's points. Clemson, S.C., was a foul place for the Gobblers next game. In the 40 minutes of the basketball contest, 56 personal fouls were called, 29 of them on Tech. With four Hokies fouling out and another being injured, Tech had to play the concluding 4:42 without having a spare man on the bench. The Gobblers were accurate in their shooting at Clemson; they converted 35 of 39 free throws and 33 of 64 field goals to gain a 101-78 win. Davidson at Charlotte was the best shooting performance for the 67-68 Techmen. Tech had a 70.3 field goal percentage in the first half (19 for 27) and a 62.0 percentage at the end of the game (31 for 50); but they lost 81-76. Davidson's Rodney Knowles came off the bench to score 20 second-half points to lead his team to the come-from-behind victory. The traveling Techmen returned to Blacksburg to play their two big home games of the season: Toledo and North Carolina. A brilliant, unbelievable game by Gobbler guard Chris Ellis paced his team 76-65 over the Toledo Rockets. Ellis ended up leading the Tech team with 23 points and 10 rebounds. UNC, led by All American Larry Miller's 32 points, defeated Tech 80-70 in the game of the year. The game was not as close as the score, UNC had complete control.

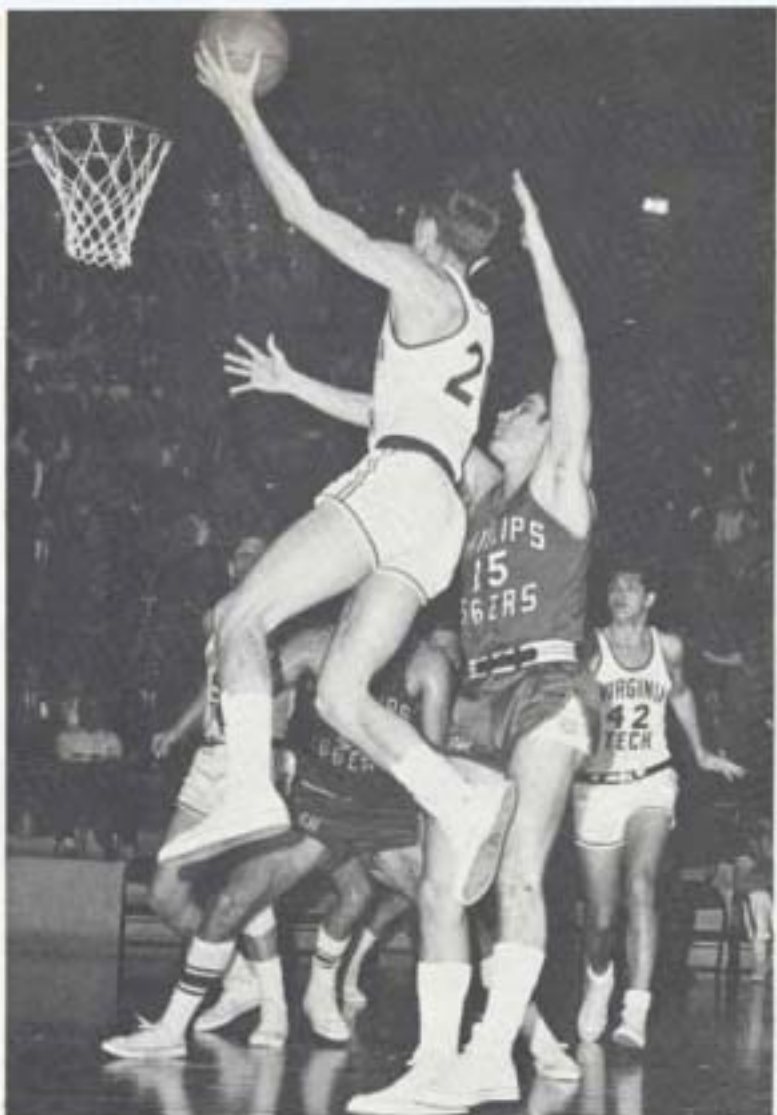

Give Tech State Title

The Gobblers did manage to salvage something out of the 67-68 season by winning the state title with a perfect 5-0 in-state record. A 91-71 win over Richmond and a 78-72 overtime win over William & Mary brought Tech this title. This was the eighth time in the last decade that Virginia Tech won the "Big Five" title. The Richmond game was one of those rare home appearances for the Hokies, 27 points by Combs, 24 by Ellis, 17 by Ware, and 14 by Mallard were enough to stop the Spiders; the rest of the team chipped in another eight points. The William & Mary game was played at Fort Eustis, and Tech had to go into an overtime period before they could stop the Indians. Combs was high man again with 30 points. The Phillips Oilers beat Tech 73-63 in an exhibition. In this loss Ellis got injured. Next came a home win over NCAA-bound Bowling Green. Combs pumped in a big 35 points on the way to the 77-71 win. And then came the Houston game and Elvin Hayes. The Cougars soundly defeated Tech 120-79 and Hayes had 51 points and 27 rebounds. The season finally ended at New Orleans against Tulane.

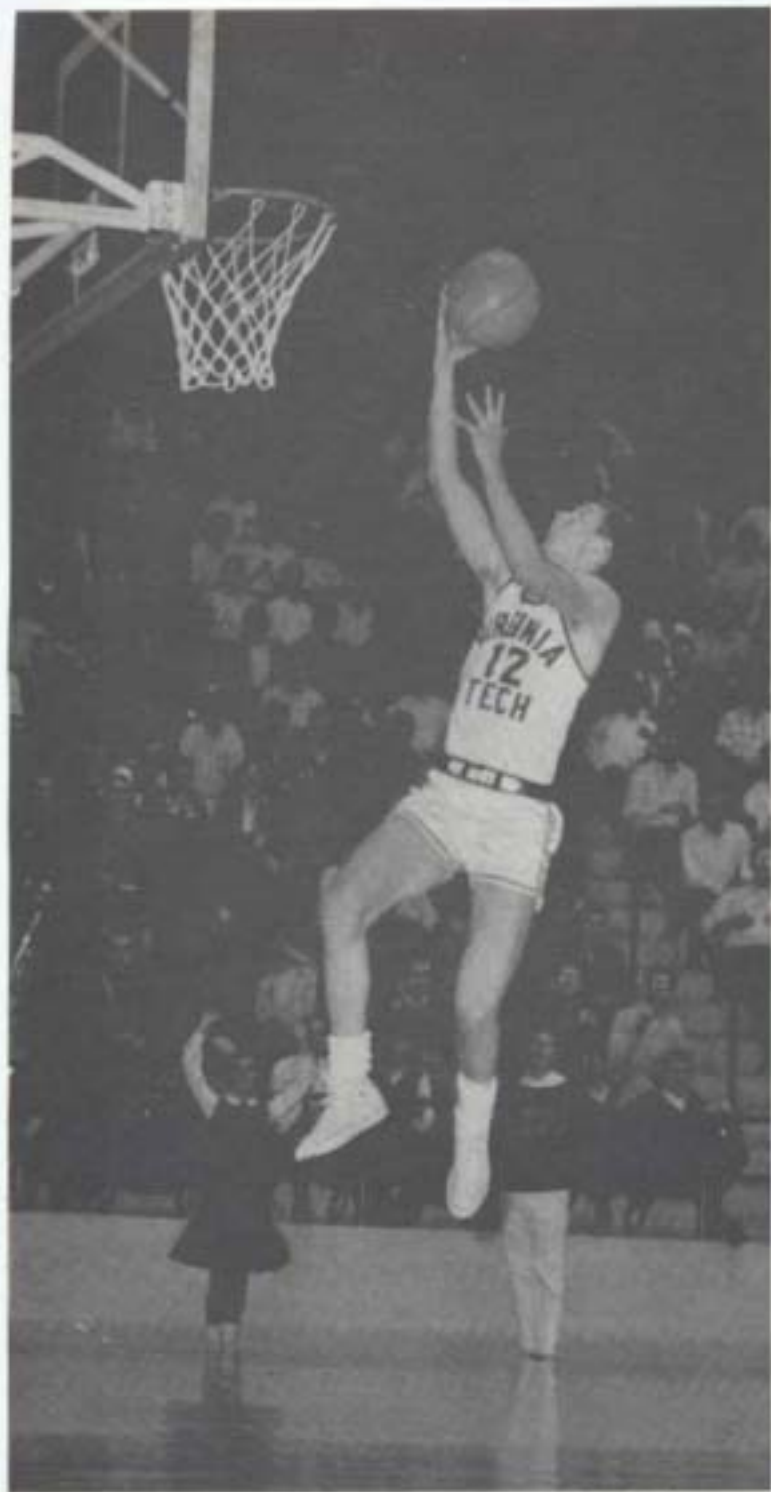

Gobblers Upset West Virginia and Virginia in 4-6 Season

Coach Jim Hartbarger in his first year as freshman coach led the Gobblers to a surprisingly good 4-6 record. The Gobblers had a small team which was built around the shooting and scoring of 6-1 guard Lloyd King. Of their four wins, the Gobblers had two major upsets; West Virginia and Virginia. The first upset came midway through the season on a neutral court in Beckley, West Virginia. King led all scorers with 20 points while receiving support from Barker 17, Lockett 16, and Llaneza 16. The most satisfying win came 67-55 over Virginia at Blacksburg. Earlier in the season, the Cavayearlings defeated the Gobblers 83-59 at Charlottesville. The other two wins were 52-49 over William & Mary and 60-58 over Richmond, both home games. The only team to defeat the Gobblers in Blacksburg was Wake Forest. The other defeats came to Duke, William & Mary (away), Richmond (away), and Davidson.

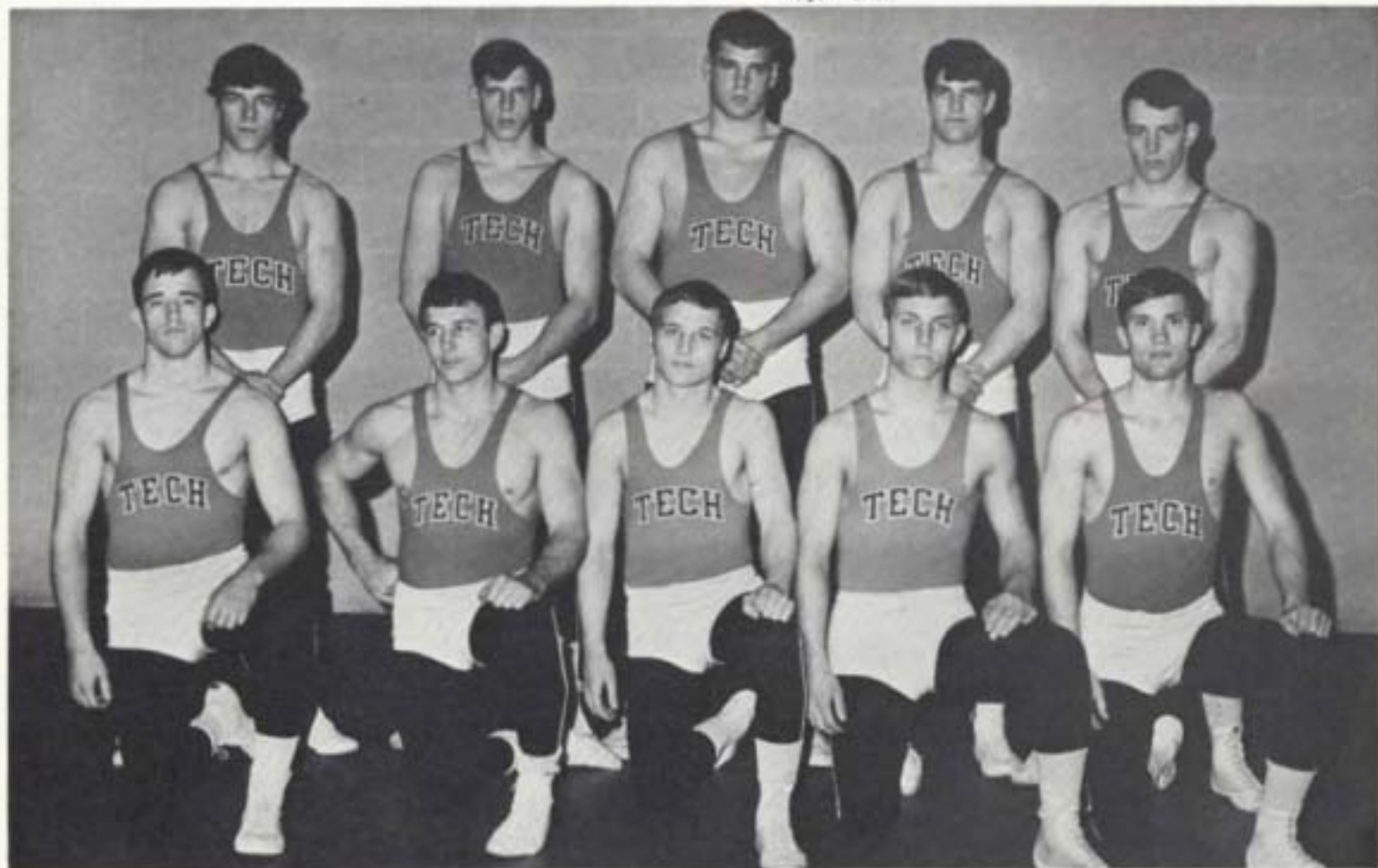

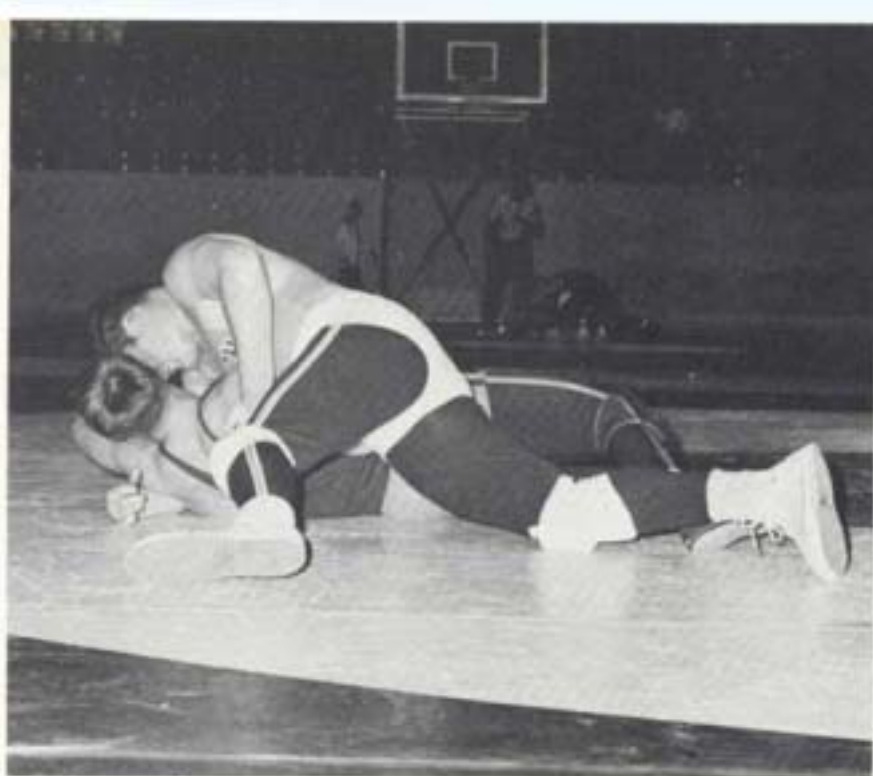
The Tech team was led by several individual standouts. Leading the way to victory was senior co-captain Mickey Jarrell. Jarrell, a fast, strong lightweight, is noted for his fast pins. He finished the regular season with nine pins and a 12-0 record.

Another senior, Lonny Gallagher, finished the season with 9-1-2 record. Lonny, who is also a co-captain, won the New York Athletic Association Christmas Tournament and placed second in the Wilkes Open Tournament. These achievements qualified Lonny for the Olympic trials.

The Hokie matmen trounced UNC 31-6, while overwhelming Duke, Auburn and Ga. Tech. Tech lost a hard-fought contest to powerful Navy where Jarrell and junior Jack Stover posted Tech's only wins. Stover also had an 8-2 season record. Perhaps one of the most satisfying victories came at the hands of W.Va., 24-71. The match featured Mickey Jarrell beating Cavalier standout John Shurberg 3-0.

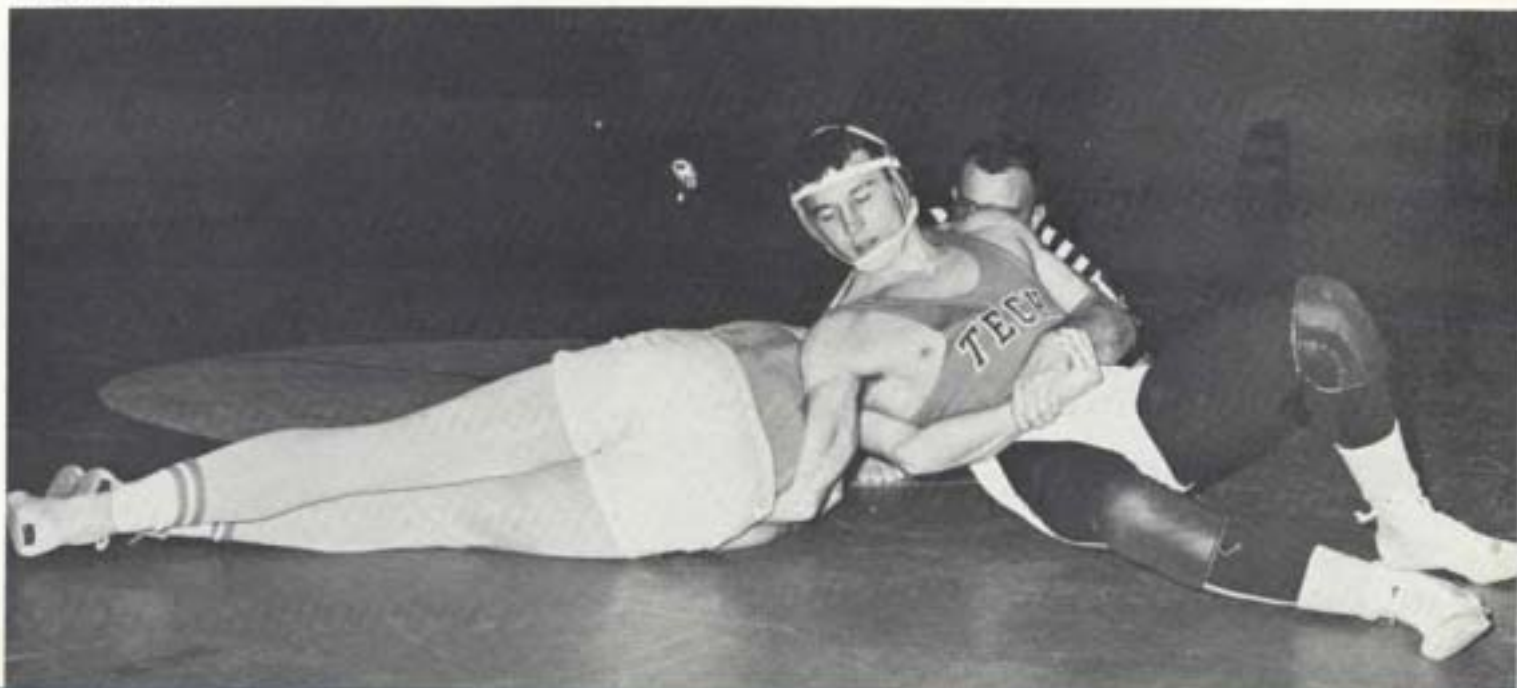

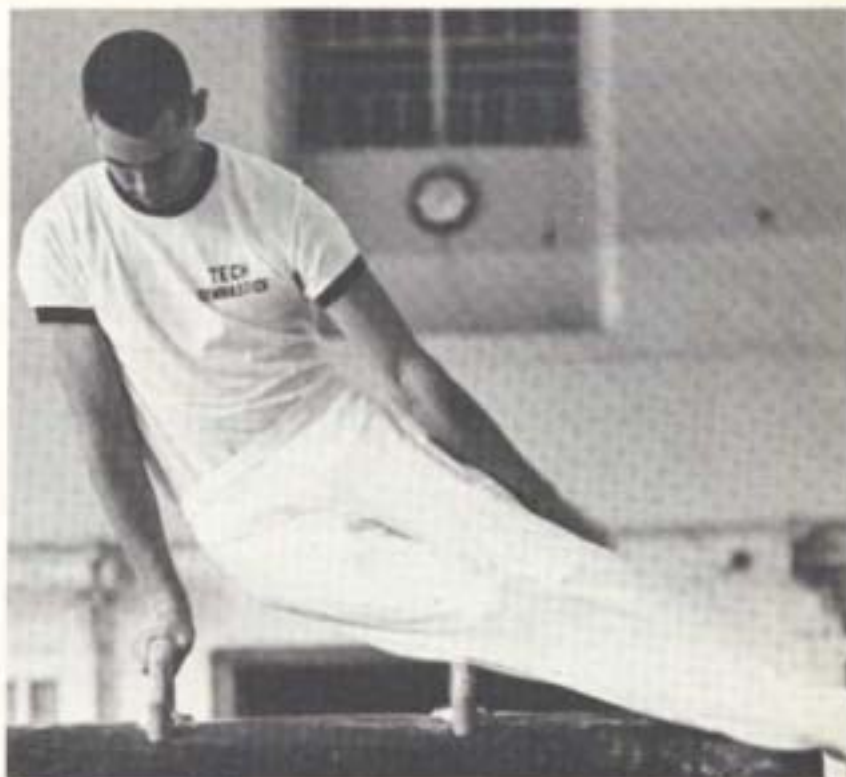

Gymnastics may have originated with the ancient Greeks, for records of their civilization show they placed great emphasis on gymnastic activity. The first gymnastics competition took place in Switzerland in the 1850's. The sport has steadily progressed since that time and in its modern form consists of competition in seven distinct activities: high bar, parallel bars, still rings, side horse, floor exercise, long horse vaulting, and trampolining.

During the Winter of 1966, a group of interested students under the supervision of Al Long, an instructor in the Department of Physical Education, organized the Virginia Tech Gymnastics Club. In two seasons of intercollegiate competition, the team has compiled a record of 6 wins and 3 losses, and in 1967 won the unofficial Virginia State Championship by defeating every major college in the state. Track and Cross Country

The 1967 Spring Track Team opened with a disappointing showing in the S. Carolina Relays, followed by fine showings in the Colonial, Tennessee, and W.Va Relays (Tech lead all scorers). After winning its first two dual meets with Wake Forest and VMI, Tech lost to East Carolina, beat Marshall, and finished second to W & M in the state meet. During the season, Randy DeHart set a new mile record of 4 min., 12 sec. and Chris Nicholson tied the high hurdles mark at 14.08 seconds.

The Cross Country team enjoyed its third straight winning season, opening with a 22-36 victory over Kentucky, losing to East Carolina, 20-36, routing Marshall, 16-46, downing Wake Forest 24-37, trampling Old Dominion, 15-50, beating UVa, losing to Tennessee, 17-48, and beating archrival VMI, 17-44. High points of the season were a strong 3rd-place showing in the NCAA Regionals at W & M and a 2nd place in the state meet at Richmond.

The Indoor Track Team opened with a warm-up meet, the Chesterfield Relays, and followed with a fine showing in the VMI Winter Relays. Tech beat VMI in a dual meet, 62-50 (first time ever), and finished second to W & M in the state meet. Highlight of the season was a first place in the Chattanooga Relays by the Two-Mile relay team.

Virginia Tech baseball fans saw an excellent baseball team last spring in the 1967 edition of the Gobblers. The Hokies' record of 14-11 does not truly reflect their ability. After some close early-season losses to such powerhouses as Georgia Southern, Florida State, and Alabama, the Techmen came on to win 10 games in a row in the middle of the season. Cold, rainy weather hampered practice and forced the postponement or cancellation of several late-season games. One highlight of the season was the back-to-back thrashings of 21-0 and 15-5 the Gobblers gave Castleton State. Sophomore Dean Hahn led Tech with his excellent pitching and timely hitting, including a grand slam home run in the bottom of the 9th inning to down Alabama 6-5. Outfielder Dick Shroy collected two of his many homeruns in successive innings, both with two men on base, in the 21-0 rout of Castleton State. Third baseman Tom Childress provided some thrills with his long-ball hitting. Catcher Johnny Oates was the best all-around player on the team. Not only did he hit home runs but he collected several perfect bunts and ran the basepaths like they belonged only to him. His defensive play was always aggressive. Oates signed to play with a pro team after only two years of college ball. He will be missed next year.

1967 Golf

A well-balanced 1967 golf team from Virginia Tech won its unprecedented fourth straight Virginia Intercollegiate golf championship while compiling an outstanding 9-1-1 record. A loss to a very strong Ohio State team and a tie with powerhouse UNC were the only blemishes on the golfers' record. The team got outstanding performances from all of its members at various times, an indication of a team with great skill and depth.

The past three years, Virginia Tech's Golf Team has been led by All-American Tim Collins. In 1965 he made Third-Team All-American and in 1967 he made Second-Team. Collins compiled a fantastic 27-3-1 record in dual meets while leading Tech to three Virginia Intercollegiate Championships.

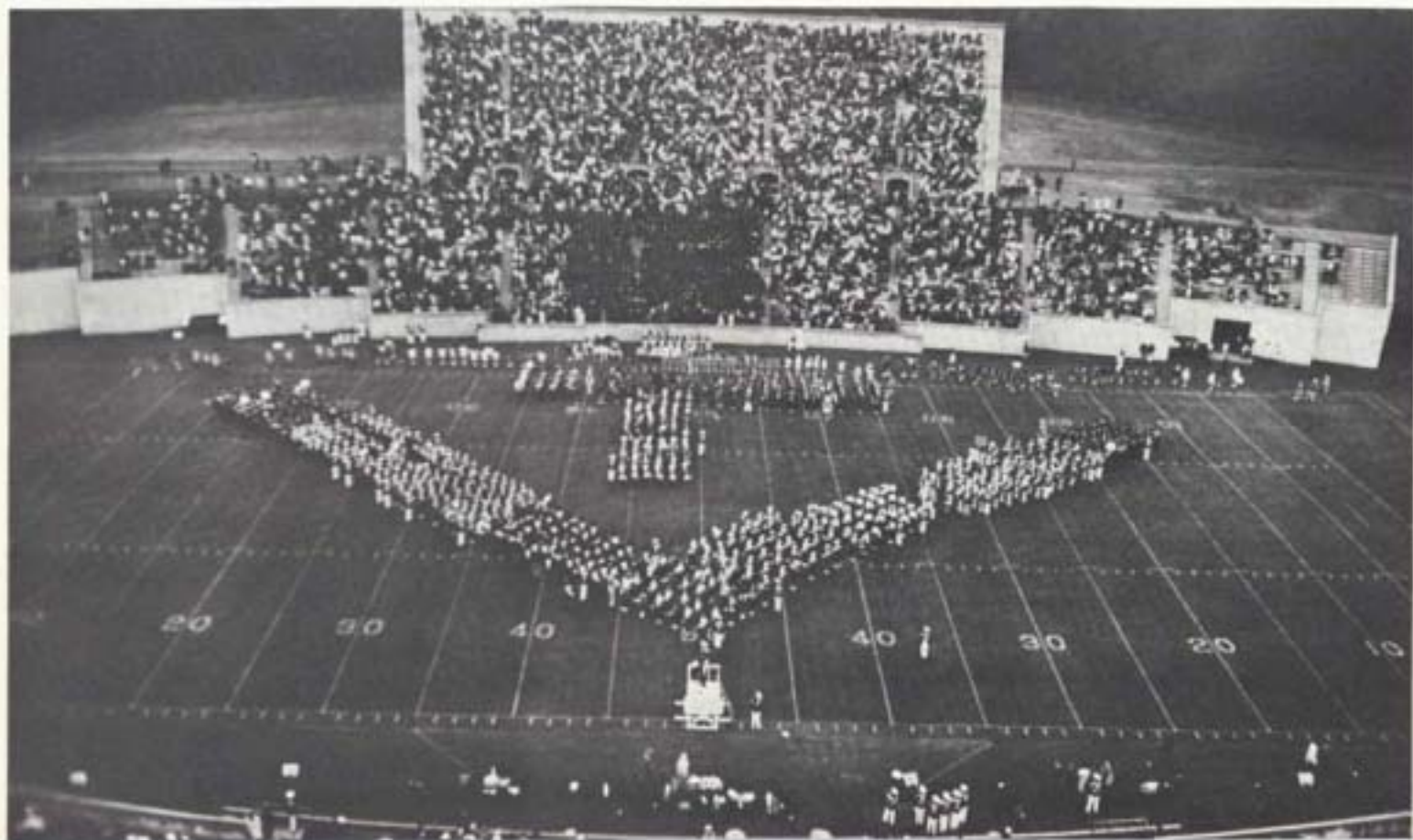

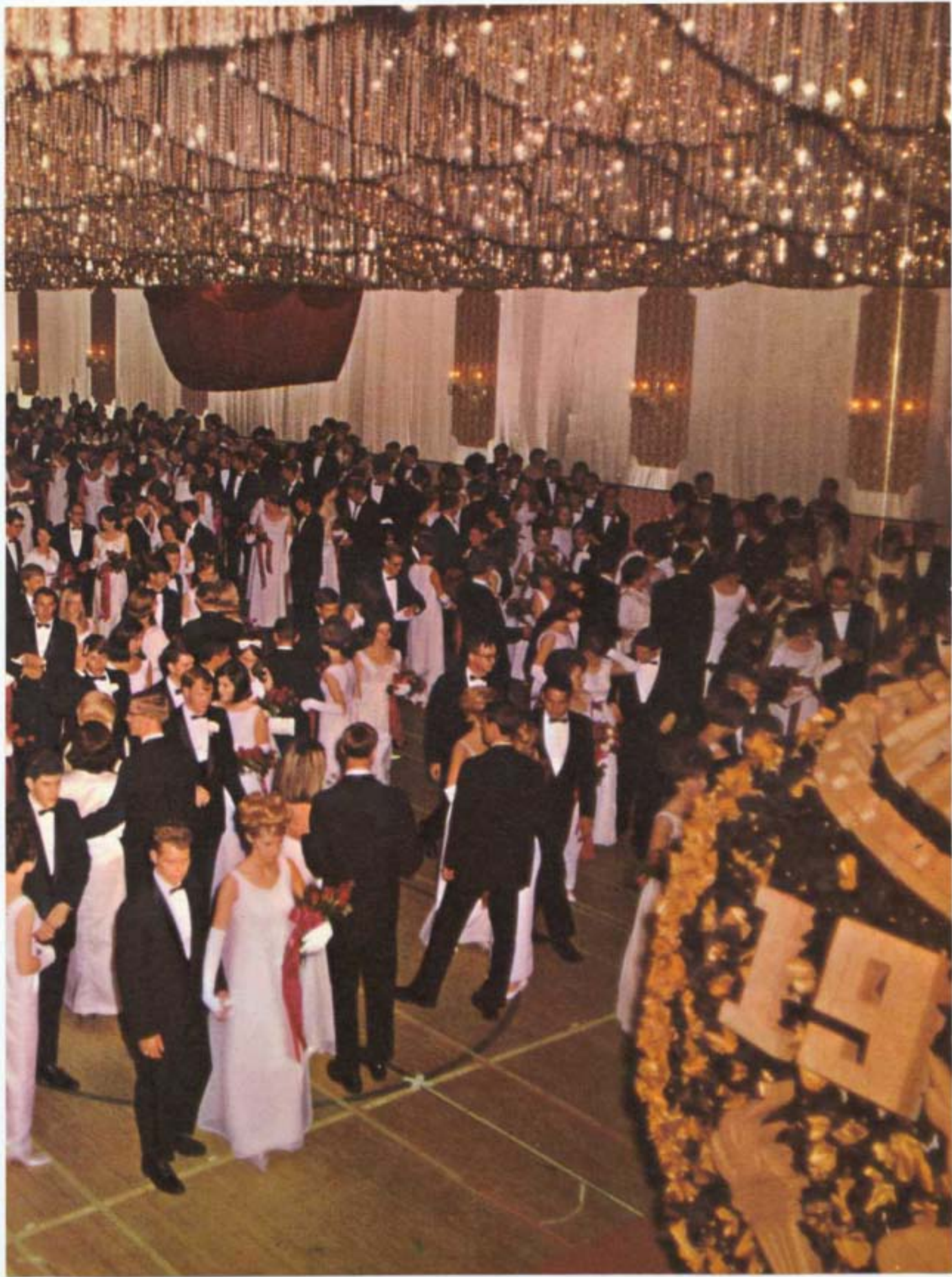








RING DANCE

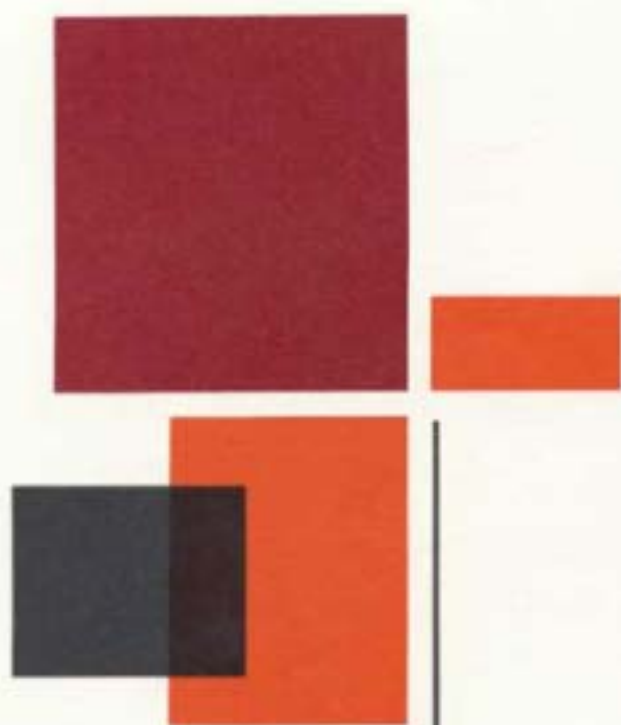

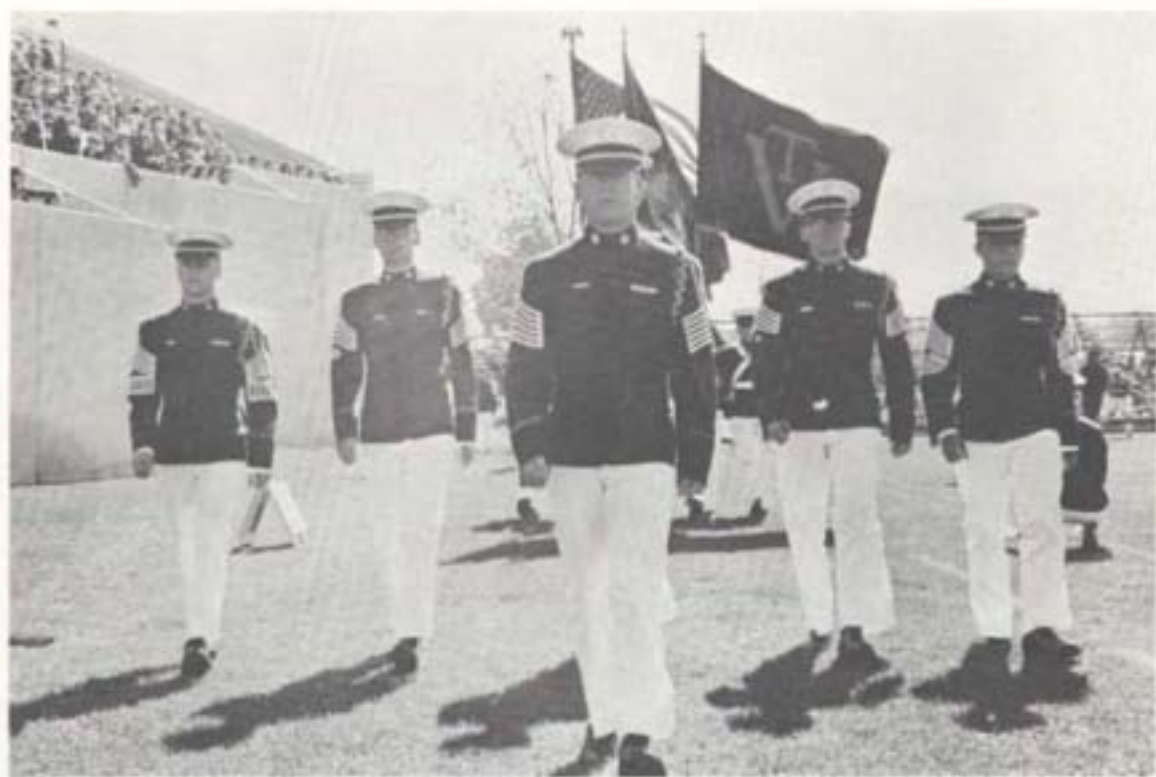

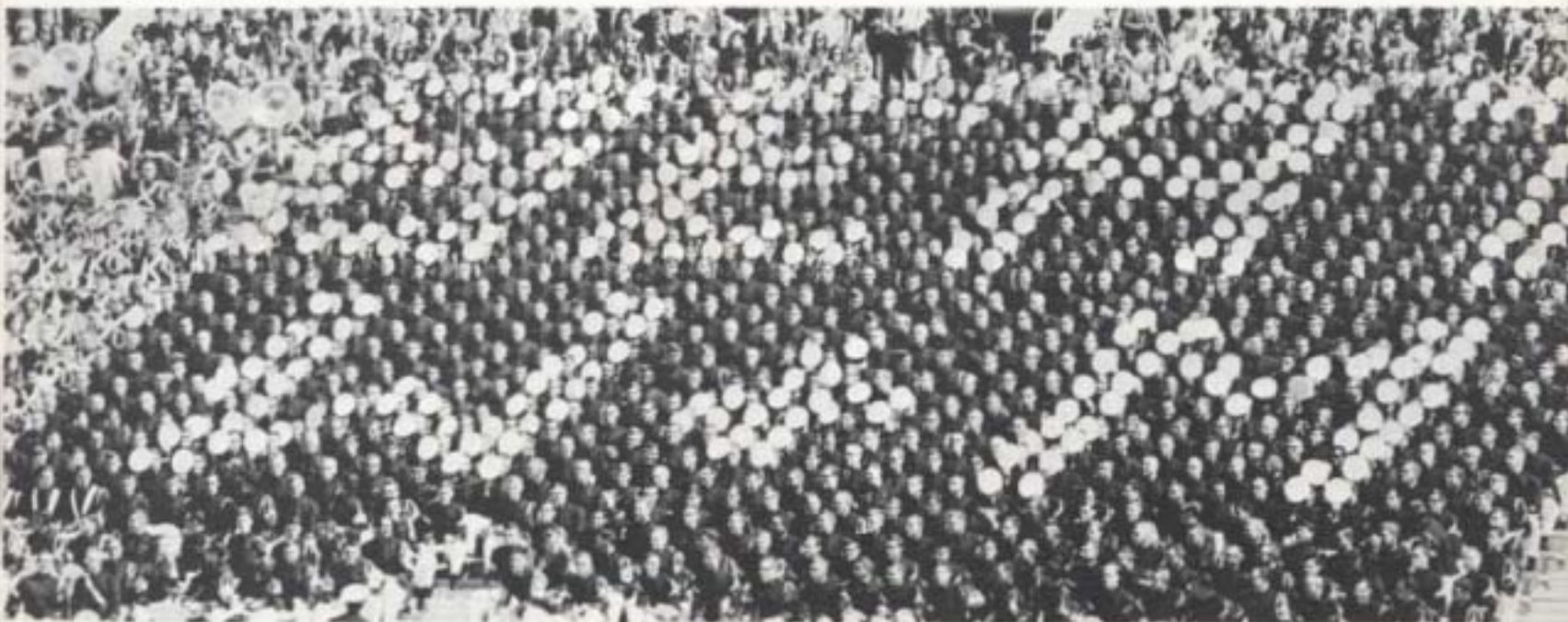
Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets

The Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets consists of approximately 1300 men destined to be the military and civilian leaders of the future. Through the training and responsibilities of cadet life, a young man learns to work for people as well as with them. By beginning his cadet life as a freshman "rat" at the bottom of the ladder, the cadet learns to perform what is expected of him in his best possible manner. As he matures, in the academic world as well as in the military, he is assigned more and more responsibilities. By the time a cadet has reached his senior year in the Corps of Cadets, he is perfectly capable of handling his senior course requirements as well as performing an important and usually time-consuming position in the Corps. This ability to take on several different tasks at once and perform them all satisfac-

torily is what makes the cadet a well-rounded person and potential leader of the future.

The Corps is controlled exclusively by cadets with the only outside supervision being provided by the Commandant and his functional staff. The military organization of the Corps is actually one of a regiment and is thus controlled by a Cadet Colonel. The regiment is made up of two groups and two battalions. Each group is commanded by a Cadet Lieutenant Colonel and his staff and has four squadrons in it. The battalions consist of four companies each and are also commanded by a Cadet Lieutenant Colonel and his staff. These sixteen units, plus the athletic company and the Regimental Band, make up the framework of the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets—a truly efficient military organization.

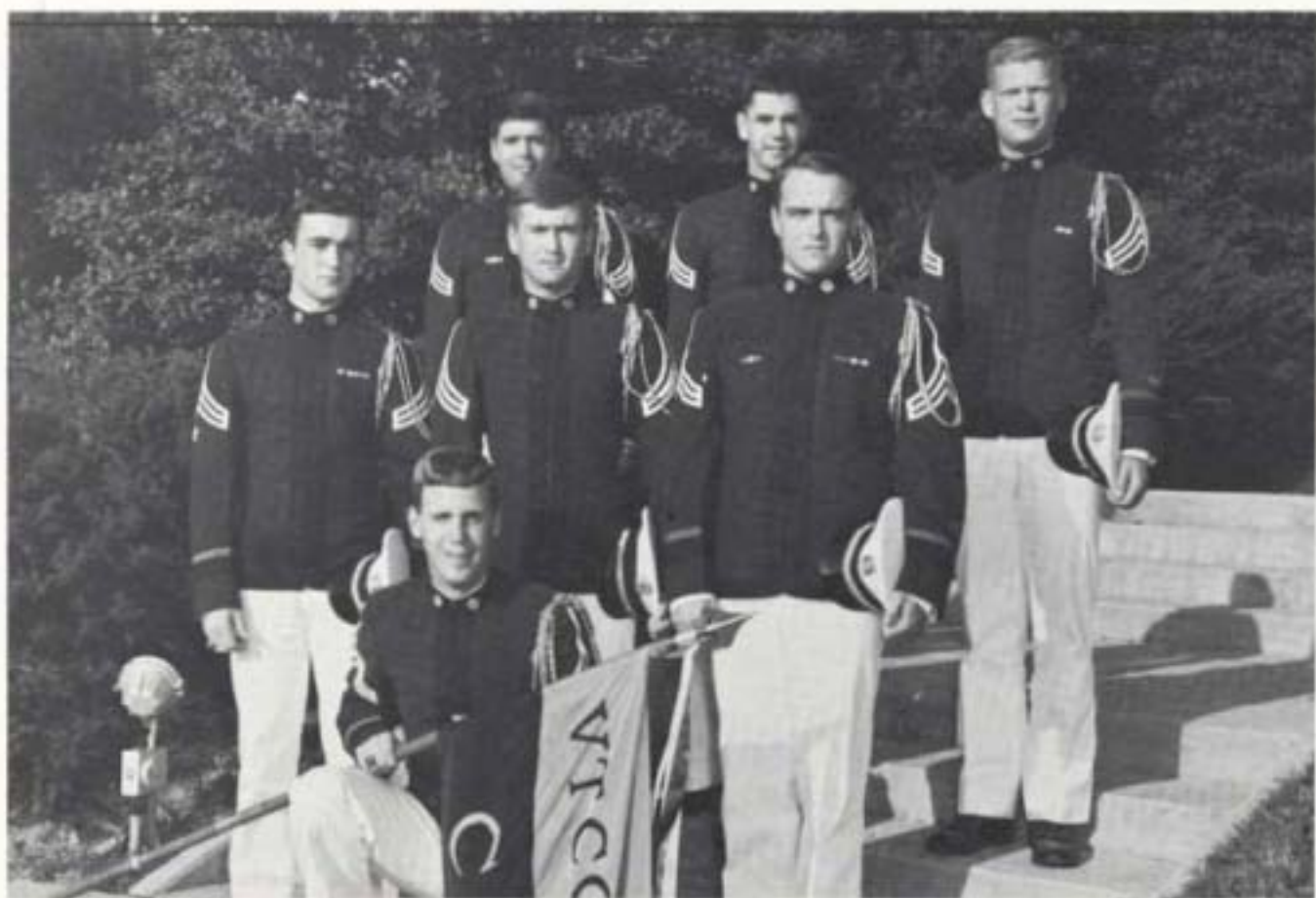


Squadron C

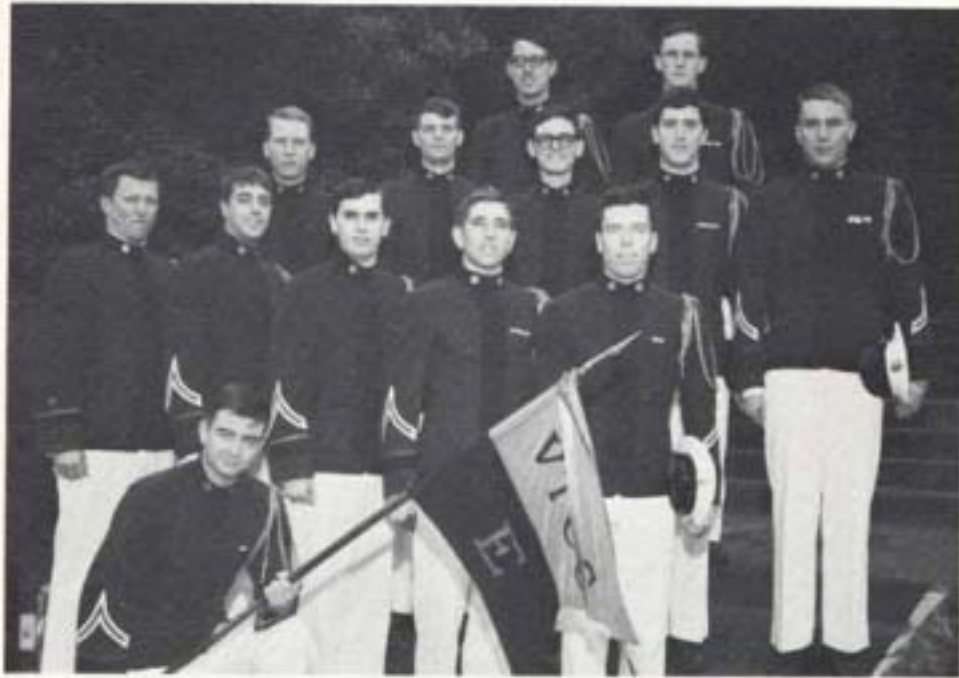

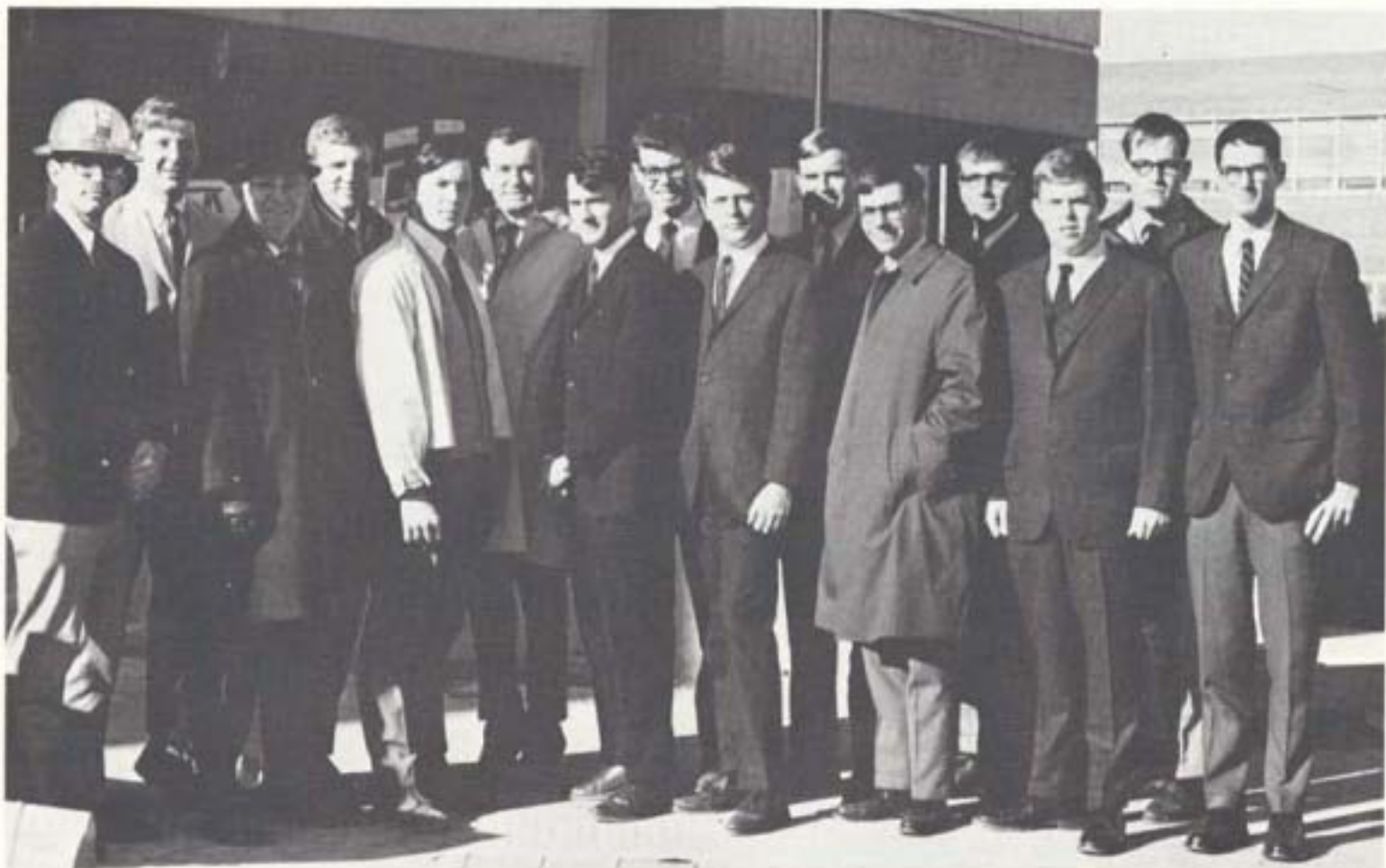


Student Society of Architectural Engineers

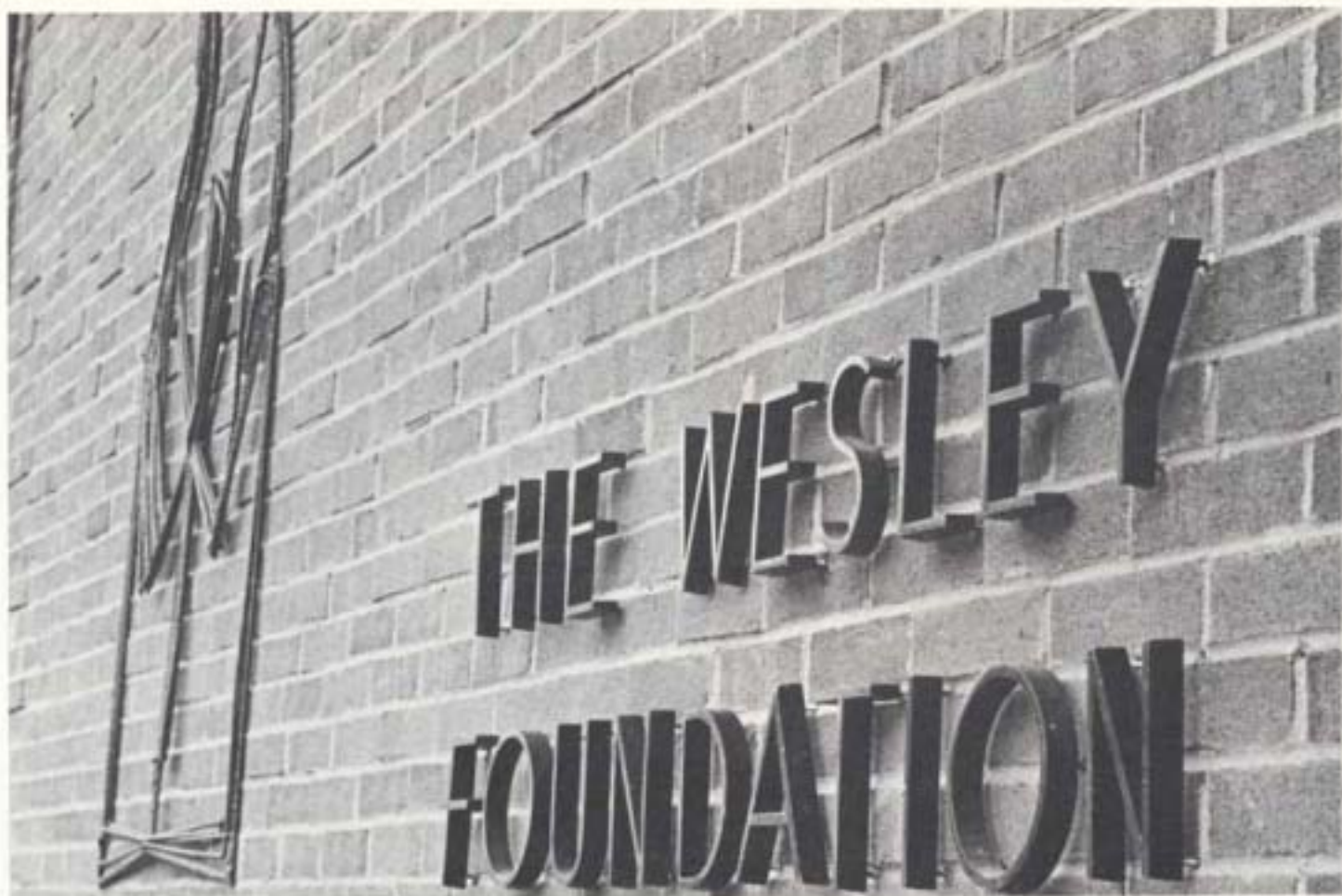

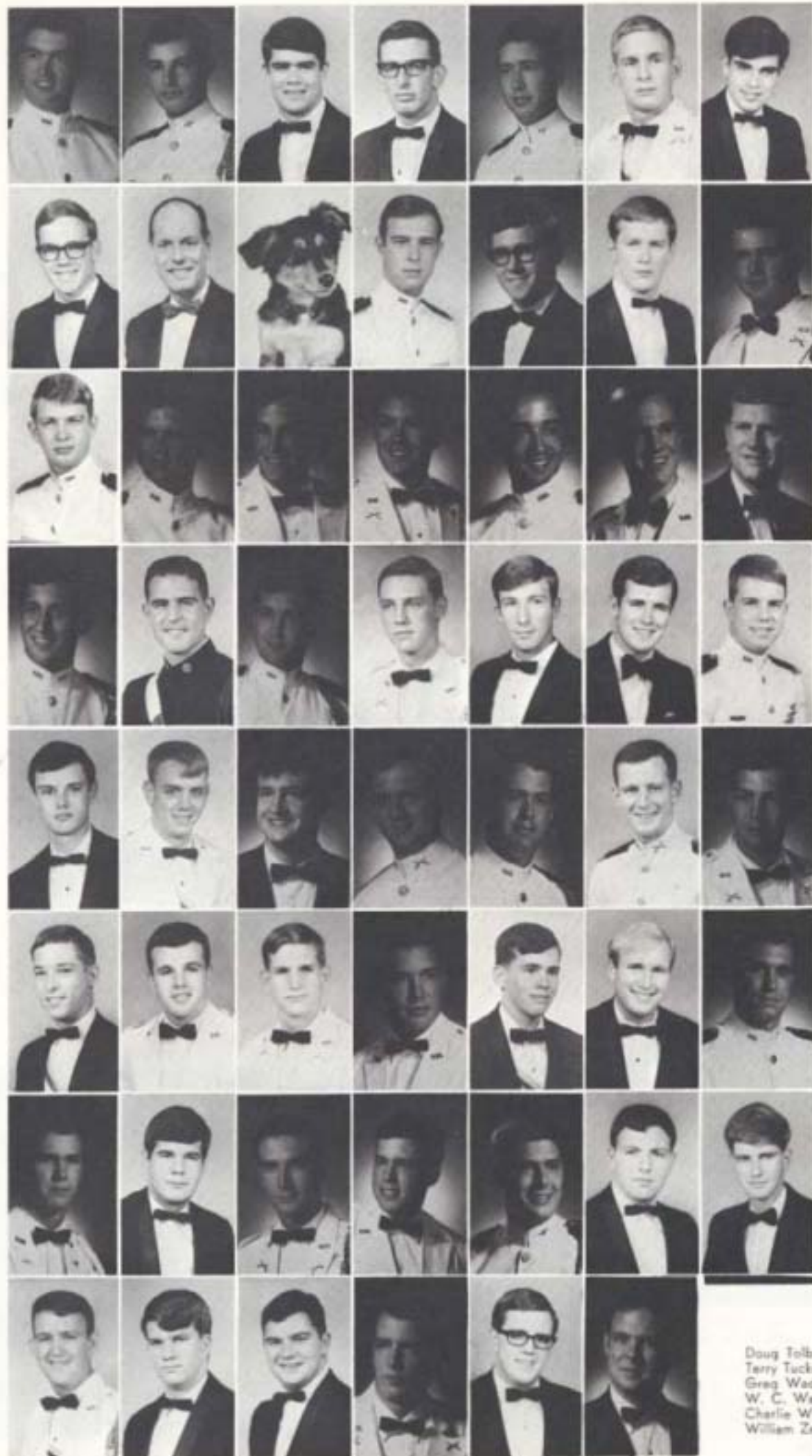

German Club Sponsors Formals, Concert

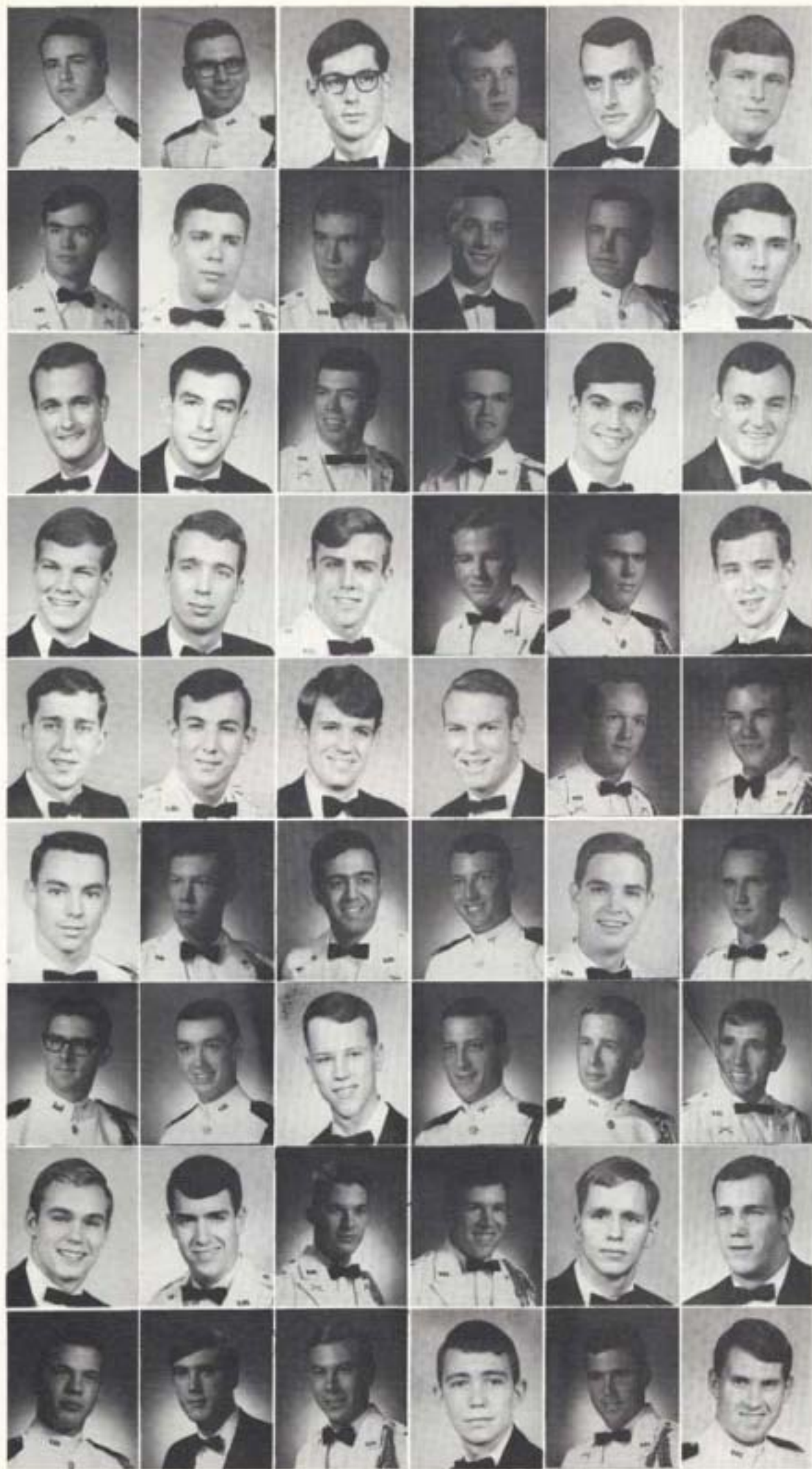

Since 1962, when Dr. T. Marshall Hahn became President of VPI, the university has seen many great changes—rapid construction of new facilities to meet the yearly growth in enrollment, expanded and broadened curricula, and an over-all growth in the prestige of the university.

A native of Lexington, Kentucky, Dr. Hahn received his B.S. in physics from the University of Kentucky in 1945 and his Ph.D. from M.I.T. in 1950. After serving as physicist in the U.S. Naval Ordnance Lab and a research assistant at M.I.T., Dr. Hahn taught physics and was a director of graduate studies at the University of Kentucky. In 1954, he became head of the physics department at Tech; in 1959 he left to become Dean of Arts and Sciences at Kansas State University, where he remained until he became president of VPI.

Besides his duties of president, Dr. Hahn is also a fellow of the American Physics Society, a member of the American Association of Arts and Sciences, American Association of Physics Teachers, Phi Beta Kappa, Sigma Xi, Omicron Delta Kappa, Sigma Pi Sigma, and Pi Mu Epsilon.

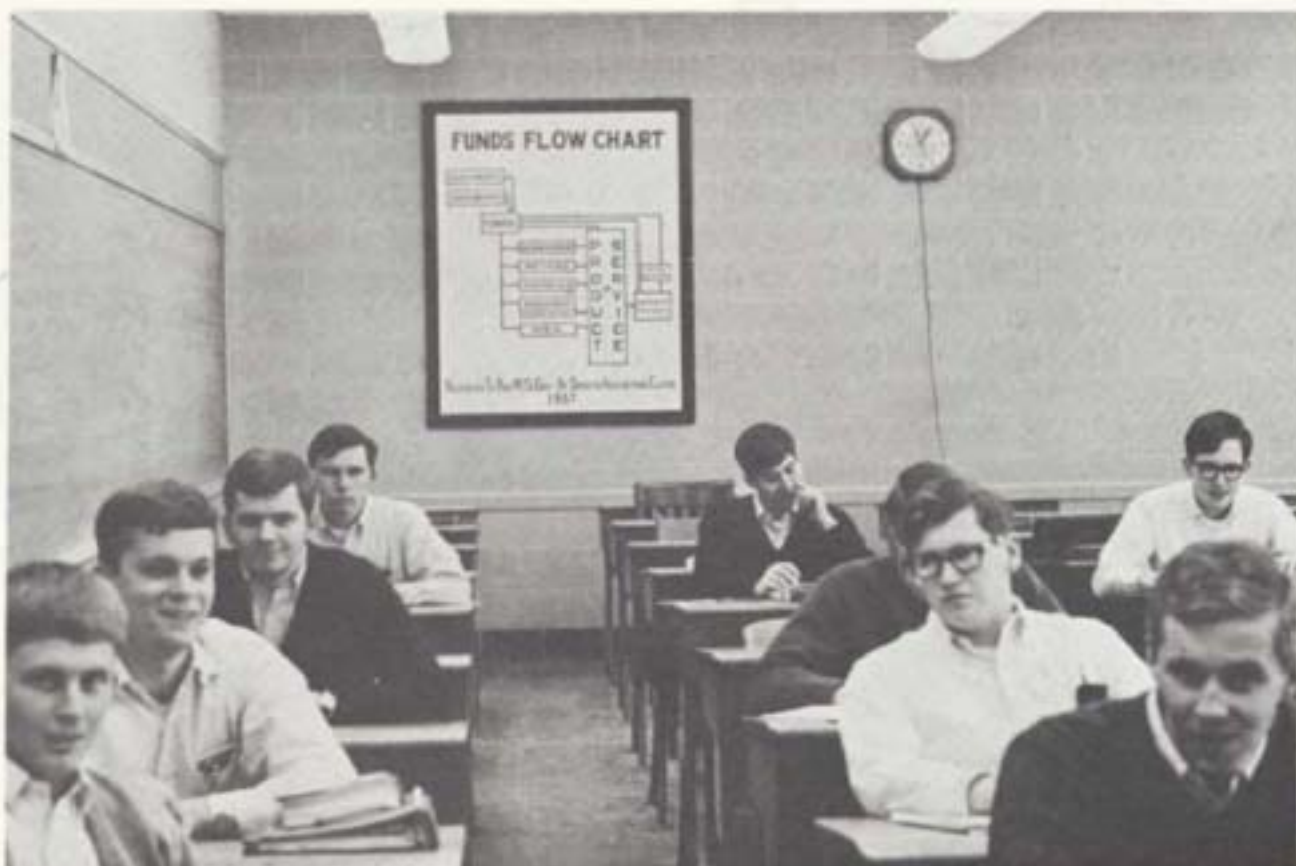

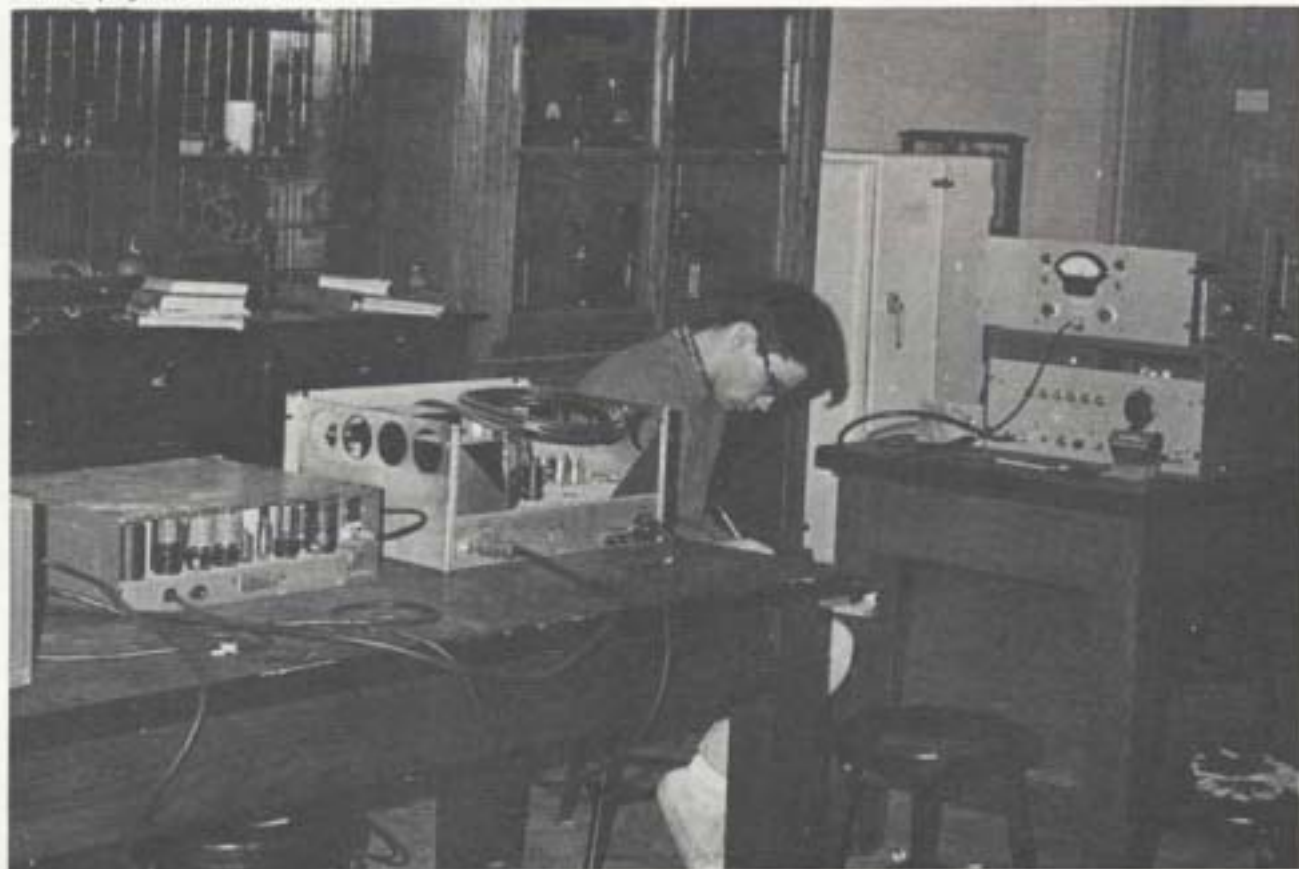

Cadet Honor Court

Traditionally the Honor System is one of VPI's oldest and most respected systems. The Cadet Honor Code is based on three beliefs: To trust a man is to make him worthy of that trust; No gentleman will lie, cheat, or steal; and Every cadet is a gentleman. To implement the code, the Cadet Honor Court was established in 1906. Since that time it has undergone several changes. Its present organization is two-bodied and consists of an Investigative Branch and a Judicial Branch. The Investigative Branch is composed of the Attorney, the Chief Prosecuting Attorney, the Honor Council Chairman, and their assistants. The Honor Council decides if an investigated case warrants a trial and if so, passes it on to the Judicial Branch. The Judicial Branch, composed of the Chief Justice, the Associate Justices, the Chief Defense Attorney and his staff, the Chief Prosecuting Attorney and his staff, the secretary and various administrative personnel, is responsible for the conduct of all trials.

The Cadet Honor Court is operated entirely by cadets though its decisions are reviewed by the administration. The Court strongly emphasizes the VPI Honor System throughout the Corps of Cadets and strongly upholds it.

Civilian Honor Court

The university actively supports and upholds the honor system which is set forth under the judicial branch of the constitution of the Student Body. In the Civilian Honor Court, violations are turned in by students and investigated by the Honor Council. If a trial is requested by the prosecution, a jury of twelve students is selected. Defense counsel is present to protect the rights of the student. The council performs numerous administrative functions for the Honor Court. The Honor System has jurisdiction on cases of lying, cheating or stealing committed by students, with the foundation of the student Honor Code resting upon the feeling that it is the duty of each student to report any violations of the Honor Code which he or she might observe.

The Student Activities Committee is a standing committee of the president of the university and serves as a subcommittee of the University Council. This particular group has probably aided and directed student freedoms, organizations, finances, politics, and services more than any other single ingredient within the university. All of its meetings are open to the student body. The Student Activities Committee is composed of three faculty members: Dr. Phillip Martin, Professor Leo Padis, Dr. Wybe Kroontje; president of the Civilian Interdormitory Council, President of the Student Government Association, vice-president of the Student Government Association, president of the Women's Interdormitory Council, Colonel of the Corps, a representative of the Publications Board, the three class presidents; and the Dean of Men, Dean of Women, and the Commandant of Cadets. Dr. Warren W. Brandt, Vice-President of the university, serves as chairman and may vote only in the event of a tie, while Dr. James W. Dean, Dean of Students, serves as secretary with no vote. Any student group or individual may petition the secretary, in writing, for a place on the agenda to be heard concerning approval of any activity, approved status, or changes in Student Life Policy.

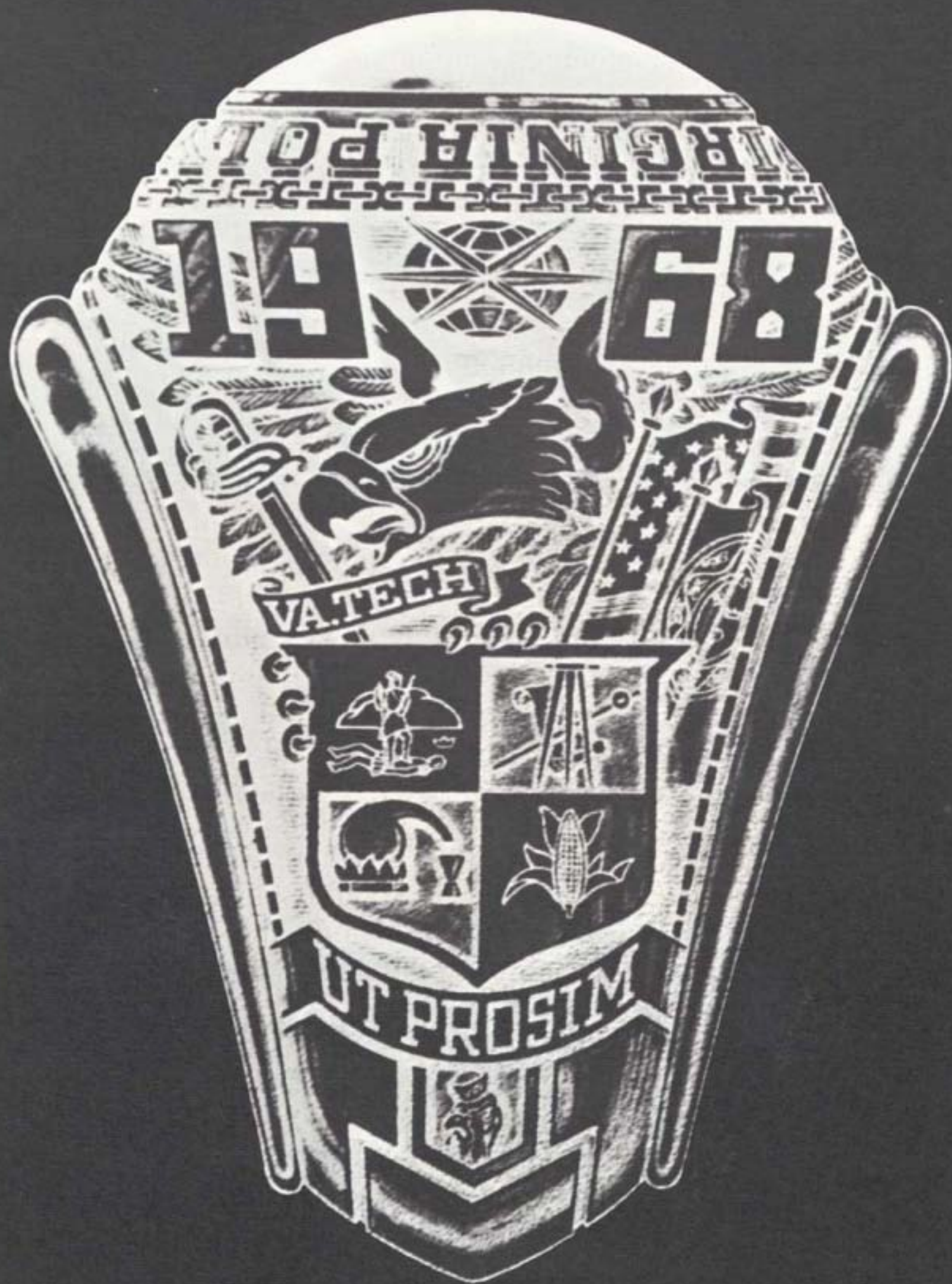
WIC and CIC

The Women's Interdormitory Council was formed this year in response to the growing number of co-eds now on Tech's campus. With nearly a thousand co-eds in the dorms, the women feel the need for their own governing body—one which could better understand and solve their problems. The duties of the WIC are essentially the same as those of the CIC, although broader in scope, in proportion to the greater number of regulations which cover coeds. The WIC works in co-ordination with the Dean of Women's Office in the governing of co-eds in the dorms, generally being given a free hand in matters directly related to the dorms.

The Civilian Interdormitory Council is the governmental organization within the civilian male residence halls. Each House Council is responsible to the CIC, composed of four officers and the thirteen House Council presidents. In a year of rapid expansion, the CIC provided reference libraries and installed additional televisions in its dormitories, sponsored a Sullins College Lake Day, and continued to invite faculty into the dormitories informally. Koofer files and the Gripe Committee are now integral parts of the program. The Civilian Interdormitory Council provides over 500 student leadership positions each year, in keeping with its slogan, "The CIC works for you, but you make it work."
