- The department had strong representation at the IWF show last week in Atlanta. IWF is the world's premier show that exhibits the latest products, fashions, technology, and equipment related to consumer wood products such as cabinets, furniture, flooring, and other architectural woodworking. Special thanks to Patrick Rappold and Tim Stuess for setting up the department display and providing a continual presence at the booth during the show. Thanks for Earl Kline for lining up arrangements and for supervising 9 undergraduate students who traveled on Friday and returned home late Saturday evening. These students were given a special tour of the American Woodmark facility in Toccoa Georgia (flat panel processing line). Students had a chance to see the latest in wood design at IWF's student Design Emphasis showcase and the latest technology used in modern woodworking equipment. Bob Smith and Earl Kline both were involved in technical sessions at the show. Brian Bond was also in attendance. We visited with many VT alumni and engaged many Virginia producers and people interested in our program. Congratulations and thanks to all for your participation and representation of our program.
- WoodLINKS USA present at IWF. As president of WoodLINKS USA I was pleased with the promotion of WoodLINKS to the industry last week. IWF supported 45 WoodLINKS teachers and 40 high school students at the show, including paying all expenses (airfare and lodging). At the national press night on Wednesday there were over 125 in attendance for the presentation of awards from WoodLINKS. WoodLINKS high school student participated in a ready-to-assemble (RTA) furniture design competition. This event was filmed for airing on PBS on Saturday of the show, and also uplinked to the new 24 hour The Woodworking Channel. We have an emerging interest in WoodLINKS in Virginia and I talked and met with many people in the state who would like to support WoodLINKS and our program at VT. We have a freshman student (Dan Roethle) in Wood Science this fall from a

WoodLINKS school in Wisconsin. I believe this is a viable pathway for high school students to become interested in and enrolled in our program at VT, and I plan to continue my efforts to make this link.
