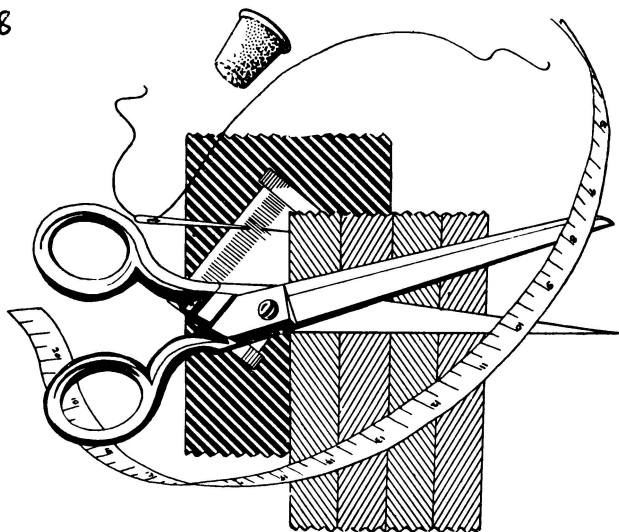


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You'd Like To Sew

Suggestions for carrying out projects:

1. Please have members bring completed articles to the next club meeting. Give suggestions for improvement where needed and encouragement to those who have done good work.
2. An exhibit of all of the articles made as follow-up or in the club period at the end of the unit is desirable and strongly recommended.
3. Notebooks should carry the pages on topics selected by the county and should also include calendar and sheets added by club member showing what she did, sample of material, cost, and check list of what she learned.
4. Any other articles made by the girl after her first should be included in her notebook with the date. Pictures and ideas on the topic can be posted in the section of the notebook related to the topic.
5. Her work sheet should be made out and included in the notebook. Start early, showing the value of keeping all records of work done, results, and follow-up.
6. There are many different things one can learn to do besides gaining skill in the repeat processes. The report has space enough to cover all topics. Fill in only those included in your program. Leave the rest blank.
