Poultry projects are developed to help stimulate an interest in science, consumerism, and animal husbandry. The brooding/rearing projects help youth learn responsibilities, skills, and knowledge through caring for their birds and learning to manage their time and finances. The poultry and egg consumer projects teach youth how to be better consumers and to increase their knowledge of poultry eggs and cookery skills. The in-school "Beginning of Life" project uses the avian egg to teach youth scientific processes, reproduction, and respect for living things by using hands-on activities.

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4-H Virtual Farm Helps Students Understand Agriculture and Food

The Virtual Farm at http://www.ext.vt.edu/resources/4h/virtualfarm features Virginia farms and farmers. The 4-H Virtual Farm takes students on a tour of the backbone of this vital industry and helps them see why farming is part of everyone's life, even if they never see a real cow or the amber fields of grain. From their computer, students can learn about the incubation of an egg, then see a baby chick hatch. On another part of the site, they can watch dairy cows being milked.

The 4-H Virtual Farm is a package that provides information and education. 4-H Virtual Farm allows students to select the part of the farm they want to visit. They can visit different parts of the farm each time they connect to it. They can hear from the farmers themselves and then use their new knowledge to solve some farm-related problems. The scope of the 4-H Virtual Farm project is tied to specific educational goals in the Standards of Learning for Virginia Public Schools. After their visit to the 4-H Virtual Farm, students can find how much they've learned - and win award ribbons - by taking the tests that are part of the package.
