School of Education/Educational Leadership and Policy Studies doctoral student **Sumeyra Sahbaz** and faculty member **Penny Burge** presented "Analysis of Grounded Theory Use in Higher Education Journals" at the European Conference on Educational Research, held September 10-13 in Istanbul, Turkey.

**Roger Ekirch**, History, was featured on the public radio show "With Good Reason" the week of October 6 on its program titled "Let There Be Night." Ekirch discusses his book, *At Day's Close: Night in Times Past*, in which he sheds light on how pre-Industrial Revolution farmers, tradesmen, and laborers spent their nights. An interdisciplinary team of Virginia Tech faculty and researchers from the departments of English, History, and Computer Science as well as colleagues from University Libraries, who comprise the university's "Digging into Data" project team, hosted the research symposium "An Epidemiology of Information: New Methods for Interpreting Disease and Data" at the Virginia Tech Research Center in Arlington on October 17. The symposium explored how methods relying on computational

strategies to mine data archives can be used for both practical and research purposes. During the last two years the team has applied data mining tools to digitized historical newspapers in the Library of Congress's "Chronicling America" database. Principal Investigators for the "Digging into Data" team are **Tom Ewing**, History and Associate Dean, and **Bernice Hausman**, English. The symposium, which brought together policy makers, public health experts, and scholars, was co-sponsored by the National Institutes of Health's National Library of Medicine and the National Endowment for the Humanities' Office of Digital Humanities.

No Right to Remain Silent: What We've Learned from the Tragedy at Virginia Tech (Three Rivers/Random House), authored by Lucinda Roy, Alumni Distinguished Professor in English, was selected by Columbus State University (CSU) in Georgia as the 2013-2014 common text for the university's 1,100 first-year students. Roy visited CSU on October 15 to give a campus-wide talk and signing and meet with faculty and students in honors, creative writing, and composition. She also met with CSU's Behavioral Assessment and Recommendation Team and was made an honorary member of the team. Earlier this year, Audible.com released an audio version of <a href="No Right to Remain">No Right to Remain</a> Silent, read by Roy.

The College's Staff Association's Scholarship Committee, chaired by **Brenda Husser**, Sociology, held a raffle at the College's Faculty/Staff Fall Meeting on October 9 to benefit the Staff Association's Scholarship Fund; \$325 was raised through this event. At the October 18 Staff Association's Fall Retreat, the committee raised \$151 from the sale of raffle tickets and another \$60.50 from a 50/50 drawing, for a total of \$211.50 for the Scholarship Fund. In addition, the College's Staff Association's

Special Projects Committee, chaired by **Sally Wieringa**, English, held a food drive to support Micah's Backpack. Items were collected at the CLAHS Faculty/Staff Fall meeting on October 9. The committee delivered 162 food items to be packed and delivered to school-aged children who participate in the free lunch program in the public schools.
