### ACLS Digital Justice Seed Grants

The American Council of Learned Societies is pleased to invite applications for Digital Justice Seed Grants, which are made possible by The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. The grants are designed to promote and provide resources for newly formulated projects that diversify the digital domain, advance justice and equity in digital scholarly practice, and/or contribute to public understanding of racial and social justice issues. **Grants will range from \$10,000-\$25,000 for 12-18 months.** Grants may not support projects whose focus is the production of creative works (e.g., novels or films), textbooks, straightforward translations, or purely pedagogical projects. ### **Research Grants in the Arts**

The National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) is accepting applications for its Research Grants in the Arts program that supports studies that investigate the value and/or impact of the arts. In addition to past topics of interest, the **NEA also welcomes proposals in three new areas, featured in [NEA's new five-year research agenda](#) to be implemented in 2024:** 1) the arts' role in the healing and revitalization of communities; 2) diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility in the arts; and 3) the evolving arts ecology. Grants will range from \$10,000 to \$100,000. All grants require a non-federal cost share/match of at least 1 to 1. [Click here](#) for details.

### Strengthening American Infrastructure

Strengthening American Infrastructure (SAI) focuses on how fundamental knowledge about human reasoning and decision-making, governance, and social and cultural processes enables the building and maintenance of effective infrastructure that improves lives and society and builds on advances in technology and engineering. **Successful projects will represent a convergence of expertise in one or more social, behavioral, economic sciences deeply integrated with other disciplines** to support substantial and potentially pathbreaking, fundamental research applied to strengthening a specific and focal infrastructure. ### Civic Innovation Challenge: A research/action competition driven by community priorities

This opportunity is a research and action competition that accelerates the transition to practice of foundational research and emerging technologies into communities through civic-engaged research. CIVIC is organized as a two-stage competition with two tracks: Track A: Living in a changing climate: pre-disaster action around adaptation, resilience, and mitigation; Track B: Bridging the gap between essential resources and services & community needs.

In Stage 1, ~50 Planning Grant awards will be made for pilot projects. **Only awardees of Stage 1 proposals will be eligible for Stage 2.** In Stage 2, approximately 20 full awards will be made. Proposals must describe how the PIs will execute and evaluate their research-centered pilot projects. [Click here](#) for details.

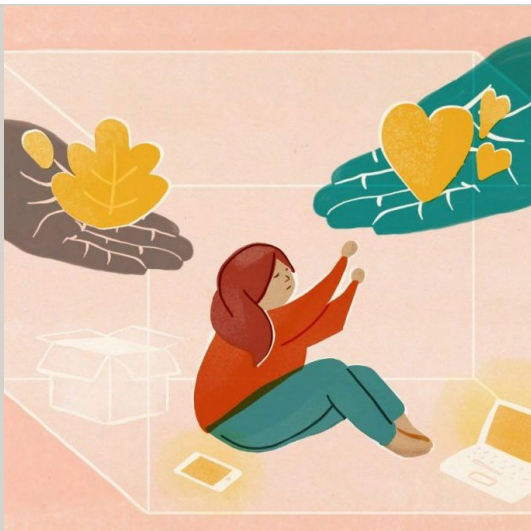
### Institute's COVID-19 Reset Program supports social science faculty
