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SCOPE OF WORK

This narrative has covered the work from July to November with time spent in contacting homes and organizing Home Demonstration Clubs, 4-H Clubs and Community Clubs. Among some of the outstanding demonstrations performed are: the pressure cooker demonstration, the process employed in making American and cottage cheeses, bread making and the canning of non-acid vegetables.

The object of this narrative is to inform the State Department of Agriculture and the War Food Administration Extension Service of the work accomplished in Albemarle and Fluvanna counties during the months of July through November.

From July 1, 1944 through November 145 families were reached through the Emergency program.

Through the influence of the Emergency Food Program, two pressure cookers have been secured and fifteen pieces of small equipment were secured, including, Foley Food Mills measuring cups and spoons, paring knives and apple corers.

Cheese making has been an interesting project for the two counties. There have been four cheese demonstrations given and three families are now making cheese for their daily use. Twelve pounds of cheese were made during the demonstrations.

Thirteen families have been benefited by improved food storage, three improvements were made outside and ten inside.

Mamie Tanner, a 4-H Club girl of Fluvanna county started a poultry project with 102 baby chicks. The chicks are now two months old and none of them have been lost. She has followed the instructions carefully that were given her through the Extension Service.

Mrs. William Jones, a Home Demonstration Club leader of Albemarle county supervised a canning project for the Advance Mills school hot lunch program.

Projects like the above mentioned that show the result of suggestions given through the Emergency Food Conservation Assistance.
