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Context in Asia

- Demographic, Environmental, and Socio-political changes
- Past and current projects
 - addressing poverty
 alleviation and/or
 environmental protection,
 not the provision of off-site
 environmental services
- Vibrant civil society/nongovernmental sector



Trends in PES

- Different stages of development
- Particular attention paid to addressing conservation and poverty alleviation
- Pilot action sites and research underway identifying "enabling conditions"



Lessons Learned - Opportunities

- Added value of PES programs
- Enabling conditions, including:
 - Prior community involvement in participatory land use change/development
 - strong social capital bonding and bridging –among community members
 - strong institutions
 - upstream land use practices yield noticeable impacts for downstream beneficiaries
 - monitoring and enforcement (formal or thru peer pressure) system
 - low transaction costs, including existing transfer payment mechanisms
 - Secure land/water rights and tenure



Lessons Learned - Constraints

- Getting incentives right
- Lack of:
 - "buyers"
 - Awareness
 - Scientific linkages of upstream-downstream benefits
 - Valuation studies
 - Social capital
 - Capacity among local organizations
 - Strong legal and regulatory framework
 - Monitoring and enforcement
 - Low transaction costs
 - Financial resources



Best Practices?

- In India, de-linking land and water rights benefits the poor
- In the Philippines, local government leadership and support a critical success factor
- In Nepal, multistakeholder committee established to review Environmental Management Special Fund proposals



Knowledge Gaps . . . in the Asian context

- Designing PES to be more efficient and equitable. Is there a trade-off?
- Financial sustainability of PES?
- How does PES fit into the scope of other financing mechanisms aimed at diversifying the financial base of the poor?
- Are PES schemes changing people's attitudes and behaviors in becoming environmental stewards?
- How will PES schemes adapt/adjust to changing market conditions?
