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Virginia FFA Salutes Doug Rinker National President 1979–80 and W. C. Dudley Retired Assistant State Supervisor



William C. Dudley Retires

William C. Dudley who served as Assistant Supervisor of Agricultural Education in the Virginia Department of Education since 1946, retired October 31, 1980.

Mr. Dudley, 65, and a native of Montgomery County, has devoted his entire professional career of 44 years to public education and service in Virginia. Following graduation from Christiansburg High School, he attended Virginia Tech where he earned the bachelors degree in agricultural education. He later received the masters degree from the University of Virginia. He taught vocational agriculture in Amherst County for five years. He then became teacher of agriculture in the Appomattox and Pamplin High Schools where he taught until 1946. In April, 1946, he was appointed area supervisor of agricultural education for Southside Virginia with headquarters at Appomattox.

In 1967, he was named "Man of the Year in Forestry" by the Virginia Forestry Association. In 1973 the national organization of FFA awarded him their highest honor, the Honorary American Farmer Degree.

Dudley is married to the former Margaret Ligon of Appomattox County. They have one son, W. C. Dudley, III, and one grandson, W. C. Dudley, IV.

He is a deacon in the Edon Baptist Church, past Master of the Appomattox Masonic Lodge and past President of the Appomattox Lions Club.

Dudley worked closely with the FFA on the local, area and state levels. He trained and worked with State FFA officer teams for many years and served as the advisor during State FFA Conventions. Mr. and Mrs. Dudley hosted State and National officrs in thier home on countless occasions.

During a special presentation at the State FFA Convention in June 1980, J. M. Campbell, State Supervisor of Agriculture Education, called Dudley one of the "Giants in Agriculture Education" in Virginia. All of us in Virginia are grateful for the dedication and enthusiasm of this giant and wish for him and Mrs. Dudley the happiest retirement possible.

Chapters earn the award for their activities in 11 areas of chapter involvement prescribed by the National FFA Organization. To be eligible for the National Chapter Award, FFA chapters submit an application listing their chapter's performance in the following 11 areas: supervised agricultural experience programs; cooperative buying, selling and assistance to members; community service; leadership development; sound programs of earnings, savings, and investments; proper conduct of

Outstanding community action efforts by Nottoway Senior and Montevideo led to their being named recipients of the Gold Emblem Award in the FFA's Building Our American Communities Program during the National FFA Convention in November.

BOAC Awards were presented to 166 of America's over 8,000 chapters during the Thursday morning session of the FFA's 1980 National Convention. The BOAC program is sponsored by R. J. Reynolds Industries, Inc., Winston-Salem, North Carolina, as a special project of the National FFA Foundation, and honors chapter efforts to make their communities better places to live and work.

Fifty-one chapters with the most comprehensive community action programs were presented National Gold Emblem Awards, the top award in the BOAC program. One hundred and fifteen FFA chapters received National Silver and meetings; scholarship; recreation; public relations; State and National activities; and Alumni relations.

maintenance and repair of the feeding, watering and ventilation systems. He keeps a close eye on sanitation and health conditions in the flock and also works with the family sheep and swine operations. Because the broilers are grown on contract, See must manage his costs and health program carefully to get the highest premium for his birds.

The Poultry Production Proficiency Award is sponsored by the General Fund of the National FFA Foundation. Inc. Applicants for the award must be involved in activities and enterprises requiring the application of classroom lessons in vocational agriculture to the profitable management of a poultry operation. Requirements at the chapter level include maintenance of a complete set of records including income and expenses, an inventory of poultry and related equipment owned by the student, a financial statement and a good knowledge of the economics of poultry production.

Dalton National Winner

Kenneth Owen Dalton is the 1980 winner of the National Fruit and/or Vegetable Production Award. As national winner he received \$500 and an expense paid trip to Europe sponsored by the National FFA Foundation, Inc.

Dalton, of Meadows of Dan, is a member of the Carroll County FFA chapter. He is the 18 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Owen D. Dalton.

He did not grow up on a farm, but he has utilized his vocational agriculture training and work experience on a neighboring farm to establish a commercial vegetable opeation. He began his farming program with a small acreage of shell beans. With the help of his advisor, he obtained a youth loan from the Farmers Home Administration to purchase equipment to expand into cabbage production. He purchased a tractor, seedling transplanter and cultivating and harvesting equipment. His first crop averaged 19,000 lbs/acre. Soil conservation techniques such as strip cropping and winter cover crops increased his yield to 30,000 lbs/acre the following year. This year, he decreased the spacing between rows from 36" to 18" adding a "third row" of plants, reducing the land required which makes more efficient use of fertilizer, labor and spray materials.

The Fruit and/or Vegetable Production Proficiency Award is sponsored by the Briggs & Stratton Corporation of Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Students who apply for the award must be involved in programs that give practical experiences in the production, marketing and services associated with the production of fruit and/or vegetables. To earn the chapter award, students must list experiences in fruit and/or vegetable production, income earned from these activities, an inventory of equipment or other assets owned, and other records necessary for the horticulture business.

Arc Welding Awards

Ag. classroom as proof of increasing membership in your chapter. If you qualify, you need do nothing except submit the FFA membership roster, which most chapters have already done. The National FFA Center will compare your membership with last year and send the pennant and a letter of congratulations.

Chapters with at least 100% membership will also receive letters of congratulations from the National FFA Center.

On the national scene, as of December 10, 1980, 492 chapters were officially "10 Plus" chapters. There were 403 "10 minus" chapters and 1,448 chapters had 100% membership. Where does yours stand?

FFA to Produce New Film

A companion booklet will also be developed that explains vocational agriculture and the Future Farmers of America. Copies will accompany each shipment of the film.

CIBA-GEIGY is proud of their long history of support of FFA activities according to Tony Adolfi, Director of Communications for CIBA-GEIGY'S Agricultural Division. "We're very pleased to be able to lend support to a program that is likely to have such a great impact on the quality of vocational agriculture education across the United States," he said.

FFA officials are looking to a possible Spring 1981 release of the film, though operational plans are still tentative. Filming will likely be done in several regions of the U.S. and input pertinent to the film's content will be sought from many representatives in the field of agricultural education.

International FFA Opportunities

Work Experience Abroad gives FFA members a chance to learn about foreign cultures, travel to another country and practice agriculture.

This international exchange program places high school seniors, college-age FFA members and FFA alumni on farms and in agribusinesses around the world. Nearly 25 countries in Europe, Latin America, Asia and the South Pacific cooperate by hosting FFA members.

"The emphasis of the WEA program is on daily living and working experiences with a host family," said Lennie Gamage, FFA Director of International Programs. "Participants receive room and board plus a stipend for their work on the farm or in the agribusiness. This work experience sharpens the student's agricultural skills and gives an understanding of world agriculture."

Three and six month programs are offered in most countries, and a 12 month Around-the-World program includes two five-month placements and six to eight weeks of travel. Intensive international ag trade work/study programs, two to three week study seminars and Polish collective farm experience programs are also offered. With sponsors from their communities and the work stipend, FFA members can experience these programs at little cost.







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The 53rd National FFA Convention

The 53rd National Convention of the Future Farmers of America (FFA), November 12-14, was a time for honoring the year's accomplishments and building for tomorrow's achievements. The event in Kansas City, Missouri, has the largest attendance of any youth convention in the nation with nearly 23,000 members, advisors and guests this year.

Steve Vaughan, a 21-year-old dairyman from Hartville, Ohio, was named Star Farmer of America, and Jack Baber, Jr., 19, Colusa, California, who cooperates in a rice drying and storage operation, was named Star Agribusinessman of America. These Stars Over America are the best in production agriculture and agribusiness of the 783 men and women who received the highest degree awarded by the organization, the American Farmer degree.

Six young people were chosen by their peers to serve the FFA organization as national officers for the coming year. Mark Herndon, 20, of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, was elected National FFA President and Robert Quick, 20, of Bement, Illinois, is the new National Secretary. David Pearce, 20, Warrensburg, Missouri; Susie Barrett, 20, Vincent, Ohio; Glenn Caves, 20, Laurel, Mississippi, and David Alders, 19, of Nacogdoches, Texas, were named vice presidents of the Central, Eastern, Southern and Western Regions respectively.

The 50th national FFA prepared public speaking contest was won by David Steakley, 18, of the Grandview, Texas, FFA chapter. He spoke about "The Challenge of Our Age"—world starvation and malnutrition. Ron Wineinger, 17, of Marion, Kansas, won the extemporaneous speaking contest with the topic "Effective Management in Agribusiness."

Nearly 1,500 members competed in nine national contests ranging from livestock to farm business management.

Winners in 22 diverse areas of agriculture proficiency were named.

Chapters from across the nation received awards for outstanding safety and community development programs and chapter projects. The Monroeville, Ohio, Chapter won the national Building Our American Communities award.

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland challenged the FFA members and guests to continue making agriculture and America strong. Addresses from entertainer Art Linkletter, baseball great Hank Aaron and University of Nebraska athletic director Bob Devaney also highlighted convention sessions.

The leadership of the National FFA Foundation Sponsoring Committee was passed to 1981 chairman Dr. Owen J. Newlin, vice president of Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc. He succeeds R. M. Hendrickson, president of the Agricultural Division of Pfizer, Inc., who led the drive which brought more than \$1 million into the Foundation's fund.

Members attended leadership workshops sponsored by the National FFA Alumni Association. Entertainment for the convention was provided by more than 300 FFA members in the band, chorus and talent review.

The Honorary American Farmer Degrees, Distinguished Service Awards and VIP Citations were presented to groups and individuals who support the FFA.

FFA Families Can Host Foreign Students

FFA members and their families can help unite the world through agriculture by hosting foreign Work Experience Abroad students.

Work Experience Abroad (WEA) is the FFA's international exchange program that brings nearly 200 students from about 25 countries to the U.S. each year. The students come from Central and South American, Asian, African and European countries for three, six or 12 month programs.

"The foreign students gain an understanding of American agriculture by working on a farm or in an agribusiness," said Lennie Gamage, FFA Director of International Programs. "Crop, horticulture, dairy, ag mechanics and sheep are just a few of the placements for these students. Beef farms are especially needed to host students who will be coming to the U.S. in March."

The host family or training establishment provides room and board and pays the student for his work. The hosts may take the student to agricultural events, historical sites and government offices to teach him more about the U.S.A.

"This inbound WEA program is a learning experience for both the student and the host family," Gamage said. "They share customs, agriculture practices and philosophies. It's a two-way exchange where both learn and grow."

Parliamentary Procedure Contest

The following clarifications have been made for the 1981 Parliamentary Procedure contest. Further clarifications will be made in the revised Virginia FFA Activity Handbook.

- 1. Only the actual reading of the Treasurer's report and the reading of the Reporter's report will be timed. The reports will be no longer than two minutes in combined time.
- 2. Only the actual reading of the Committee Reports will be timed. The combined reading time shall not exceed 3 minutes.
- 3. The timing of the parliamentary problem shall begin when the Secretary completes the first reading of the

problem. The time shall cease when the President begins the closing ceremony.

- A factor is any idea or point brought out during discussion of the problem. It does not require any action to be taken on the idea to be considered a factor.
- Only those points (or factors as defined in 4) that are considered and action taken on them will be used to determine if the problem has been solved.
- There shall be no time limit on the opening ceremony and only the accuracy and ability of the students to recite the ceremony shall be judged.

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Do You Have Leadership Abilities?

Do you like to work with people? Do you have leadership capabilities? Do you like outdoor activities? Do you have initiative and determination? Do you like to help others? If the answer to any or all of the above questions is yes, then agricultural education may open the door to many opportunities for you. From teaching vocational agriculture to agricultural public relations to international agricultural technology, agricultural education could help you achieve your career goals.

Virginia State University and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University offer outstanding programs designed to train young men and women in the field of agricultural education. As an agricultural education major, you may choose an area of specialization in the following: agricultural machinery service, agricultural science and mechanics, natural resources management, agriculture for the disadvantaged, agricultural production, exploratory agriculture, and agricultural business.

Teaching vocational agriculture in the public schools, allows an individual to work with young people while he/she teaches in his/her main area of interest. The Vocational agriculture teaching profession allows the professional to work in the classroom, in the laboratory, with the FFA, with adult classes and with the Young Farmer Association.

Each year, the demand for Virginia agricultural education teachers has increased. In fact, each graduate of the Agricultural Education Program has had several jobs from which to choose. Agricultural education is one teaching field where a shortage of teachers exists. Possibilities for advancement to vocational directors, supervisors, principals and other leadership positions are always available. In addition, employers in other phases of agriculture actively seek agricultural education graduates.

If you decide to enter agricultural education, you should know that dual major opportunities have been established at Virginia Tech and Virginia State with several departments in the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences. Possibilities for dual majors exist with: animal science, agricultural economics, agronomy, dairy science, forestry and wildlife, horticulture and poultry.

If a student wishes to attend a community college before entering Tech or State, the transfer student will be granted junior standing provided the accumulative QCA is "C" (2.0 on a 4.0 scale) or better and the individual has received an Associate Degree. Up to 50 percent of the total hours required for graduation may be transferred.

Talk over an agricultural education career with your teacher of agriculture and your guidance counselor. They will help you obtain additional information. More than 12,000 teachers of vocational agriculture throughout the United States invite you to join their ranks in one of the world's most important jobs—that of teaching youth and adults in production agriculture and agricultural technology.

The American Farmer Degree is much sought after because it is presented to approximately one member in 700 of the 481,676 member organization. It is presented only by the National FFA Organization to members who have demonstrated exceptional agricultural and leadership achievements.

The Board of Directors and the National Officers jointly reviewed the applications and recommended that Convention delegates approve the 28 candidates. Approval by these Boards was confirmed by Convention delegates prior to the presentation of the degree.

The Virginia candidates were among 782 FFA members throughout the nation recommended for the American Farmer degree in 1980.

FFA members are eligible to apply for the American Farmer Degree after having earned the State Farmer Degree in their state. They must have been an active member of the FFA continuously for at least three years and have a record of participation in the activities of the local chapter and state association. In addition, the FFA member must have earned at least \$1,000 by his or her own efforts from a supervised farming or other agricultural occupational experience program. The money he or she earned must be productively invested or deposited in a bank. The degree is presented only to FFA members who have demonstrated their leadership and scholarship ability during high school and who are showing evidence of becoming successfully established in an agricultural occupation.

Reporters have an opportunity to show the state how they preserved their chapter's history for 1980-81.

Although final plans are still being worked out, any chapter may bring their 1980-81 scrapbook to the convention for display and judging. A committee of former state officers will judge the submitted scrapbooks and ribbons will be awarded to each one.

Over the past four years, Keith has cut and replanted two acres of his own woodlot and clear cut an additional two acres of mature trees. He has cleared the family woodlot of disease-infested trees to allow the healthier trees to mature faster and produce a higher yield. Keith recently built a road to his woodlot for easy access when harvesting timber and firewood. He operates and maintains the chainsaws, bulldozer and forklift used in the operation. Since beginning his own enterprise, Keith has planted over 8,000 loblolly pine seedlings in his own woodlot.
