M. David Alexander, School of Education/Educational Leadership and Policy Studies, received the Alumni Award for Excellence in International Outreach. Alexander was recognized for his accomplishments in outreach programs in school systems, curriculum, program development, and research and international conferences that have established his position as a leader in the promotion of international education.

Carol A. Bailey, Sociology, was one of three recipients of the William E. Wine Award for teaching excellence. Bailey was recognized not only for her long-time teaching excellence in the classroom but also for her service on master's and Ph.D. committees, her efforts to engage undergraduates in research, her impact on the training of graduate teaching assistants, and her involvement with the McNair Scholars Program.

Roger Ekirch, History, was honored as one of two recipients of the Alumni Award for Excellence in Research; sponsored by the Alumni Association. Ekirch's international acclaim stems from his groundbreaking scholarship in American and European history, and his award-winning *At Day's Close*, which examines patterns of sleep in Western societies before the Industrial Revolution, has had a significant impact on the medical community as well.

Nikki Giovanni, University Distinguished Professor of English, was one of two recipients of the Alumni Award for Outreach Excellence. Giovanni is one of Virginia Tech's most visible professors due to her writing, social activism, and the time she spends sharing her love of writing with others. She embodies outreach because she not only inspires people, she actively urges them to get involved themselves. **Sara B. Kajder**, School of Education/Teaching and Learning, received the XCaliber Award for excellence as an individual involved in teaching with technology. Kajder was recognized for her efforts in using Scholar and other Web 2.0 technologies to help students develop and apply new literacies that enable them to enrich their own learning and to prepare them for future careers.

Wayne Moore, Political Science, was honored with the Alumni Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Academic Advising; established in 1989 by the Alumni Association, the award is presented each year to a faculty member who has demonstrated outstanding advisement of undergraduates.

Amy Nelson, History, was recognized as one of two recipients of the Alumni Award for Excellence in Teaching. Nelson's overall average student rating since 1998 is 3.82.
