ORGANIZATIONS:-

Extension Work in Norfolk County is organized under four heads, viz: 4-H Club Work, Home Demonstration Work, Womens' Council and 4-H Club Officers' Council.

4-H Club work is combined with the work of the Farm County agent, the Clubs comprising both girls and boys. 4-H Clubs are established in eight different communities. 4-H Club Officers Council was organized in April and have held three meetings. The Council raised sufficient funds to defray the expenses of one Delegate to the State Short Course at Blacksburg. The members assisted the County Agents in securing Club Record Books.

There are two Home Demonstration Clubs in the County. Each Club completed the Food Unit Work during the year. One Club made an exhibit of a Club Booth at the Norfolk Fair. Both exhibited at the State Fair at Richmond. One of these Clubs won first prize on Menu Planning Poster at the State Fair. These Clubs have held monthly meetings during the year and have taken an active part in all Community Work.

The Womens Council is an Advisory Board comprising women from the several sections of the County, organized for the purpose of forwarding Extension Work. An important accomplishment was the carrying out the plan it formulated for a Kitchen Contest. The womens Council paid the expenses of one of its members to accompany the 4-H girls and boys to the State Short Course. The members of the Council gave assistance in conducting the County Short Course for girls.

LOCAL LEADERS:-

There are six Local Leaders in 4-H Club work. These Leaders have made the work more effective than it would have been without their assistance. They attend Club meetings and assist the Club members with their work and encourage the keeping of records. They take an active part in Club work generally, assisting girls and boys in the preparation of their exhibits for the Fair, encouraging them to attend the Short Course. They assist in getting up the annual Club Picnic and contribute to the success of the occasion. The work of the Club Leaders at the annual Club Rally held in the Fall is indispensable. Local Leaders among the women of the several Communities contributed largely to the success of the Kitchen Contest.

GENERAL POLICIES IN RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER
ORGANIZATIONS:-

Home Demonstration Clubs, the Women's Council work in cooperation with School and Community Leagues and the County Federation of Leagues. A number of women of the County are members of the Home Makers Association.

PROGRAM OF WORK, GOALS ESTABLISHED; METHODS
EMPLOYED and RESULTS ACHIEVED:-

With the assistance of the Women's Council, the work was planned to meet, as far as possible, the needs of the County. This included 4-M Club work with the girls, in eight different communities. Home Demonstration Work in two Communities and the plans for a Kitchen Improvement Contest to be County wide.

Results Of Work As Planned:-

Working with the Advisory Council, the goals as planned have for the most part been reached and satisfactory results accomplished. In the matter of the Kitchen Improvement Contest, which was begun in March and continued through the month of May, Forty-three women were enrolled but only thirty-four completed the work. This contest was one of the most successful pieces of extension work ever put on in the County. Many things were done by the women to improve their kitchens that are not counted here, but the following is a list of the most important improvements made, viz:-

- 19 walls and ceilings were painted.
- 25 painted wood work.
- 13 new linoleums.
- 3 old linoleums were painted.
- 11 kitchens had floors painted, oiled or varnished.
- 4 new windows cut, for additional light.
- 2 doors, glass paneled
- 5 kitchens installed running water.
- 6 " " sinks.
- 2 sinks raised to convenient height.
- 1 pantry built,
- 2 porches screened.
- 20 kitchens have newly painted furniture.
- 11 new cabinets and cupboards built.
- 8 new wood boxes on rollers.
- 17 high stools.
- 12 table-tops reinforced to resist heat and water.
- 13 kitchens with built-in shelves.
- 3 hinged ironing boards.

Most of the above work was done by the women themselves. The total cost of all of the work done in improving these thirty-four kitchens was only \$428.80. The average cost per kitchen for improvements made was about \$12.00

Results in 4-M Club work.

Demonstrations in 4-M club work were completed as follows, viz:- 105 in Sewing; 60 in food preparation; 8 in Canning; 21 in Poultry; and 5 in Room Improvement. This work as a whole was exceptionally good, as evidenced by the number of prizes won by Club members at Fairs. A large percentage of Club members made creditable exhibits at the Norfolk Fair. There were forty-one exhibits made at the State Fair at Richmond. Total amount of Club prizes won, \$348.00.

One of the fourth year Clothing Club girls won first prize on her exhibit at the State Fair. This exhibit was selected to be sent to the National Boys and Girls Club Congress, held in Chicago, Ill. November 27th, as the exhibit from Virginia, in this work. In canning, there were 671 quarts of Vegetables and fruit canned. In jelly and preserves there were 128 quarts; 8 quarts of fruit juice and 71 quarts of pickles were made. There were 30 pounds of fruits and vegetables dried. These products are estimated to be worth \$244.50. The cost was \$43.68, leaving a net profit of \$200.82. In Poultry Club work there were 1114 birds raised or managed. They were valued at \$592.58 with the cost of \$280.00 making a net profit in all of \$ 332.58. Club members in Food Preparation did satisfactory work. Room Improvement work was carried out with success in each case.

The Club Picnic was held at the Norfolk City Park, with all Clubs represented. A large number of the parents of Club members were in attendance and contributed to the success of the occasion.

The County Short Course for Girls was held at Great Bridge High School, at the close of the School session, with twenty girls in attendance.

At the State Short Course at Blacksburg, seven girls from Norfolk County were in attendance. They reported to their respective Clubs on their return, that it was a most profitable and pleasant session. One of these girls was made an All Star member.

The annual Club Rally was held at the Great Bridge High School, November 7th with an estimated attendance of five hundred. Every Club was in attendance, with their friends from every section of the County. Two teams of girls gave creditable Demonstrations, one Room Improvement and one on Table Setting. Each Club gave a very creditable "Club Stunt", in competition for a beautiful Banner, donated by one of the local Banks. This Banner was won by Westhaven Club, with its "Evolution in American Dress".

In closing this report it is proper to state, that Home Demonstration work in Norfolk County has been successful, to a large extent. The work planned for another year will include enlarging on what has been done this year by extending the work in certain things to sections that have not as yet been reached.

SUGGESTIONS RELATIVE TO THE PREPARATION OF THE COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT'S ANNUAL REPORT.

The annual report should be a review, analysis, interpretation, and presentation to the people of the county, the State, and the Nation of the sum total of the extension activities in each county for the year and the results obtained by the county extension agent assisted by the subject-matter specialists. The making of such a report is of great value to the county extension agent and the people of the county in showing the progress made during the year as a basis for future plans. It is of vital concern also to the State and Nation as a measure of rural progress and a basis for intelligent legislation and financial support.

Separate statistical and narrative reports are desired from each county extension agent in charge of a line of work, such as county agent, home demonstration agent, boys' and girls' club agent, and negro agent. Where an assistant agent has been employed a part or all of the year, a report on his or her work should be included with the report of the leader in charge of that line of work. Where an agent in charge of a line of work has quit the service during the year, the information contained in his or her report should be incorporated in the annual report of the agent on duty at the close of the report year, and the latter report so marked. Where two or more extension agents are employed in a county, each in charge of a line of work, care should be exercised to avoid including the same data in the statistical report of more than one agent.

At least four copies of the annual report should be made: One copy for the county officials, one copy for the agent's files, one copy for the State extension office, and one copy for the Extension Service, United States Department of Agriculture. *The report to the Washington office should be sent through the State extension office.*

NARRATIVE SUMMARY.

The narrative report should be a statement in orderly fashion and arranged under appropriate subheadings, of the work done, methods used, and results obtained under each project, as well as of the general work accomplished. Every statement should be clear-cut, concise, forceful, and, where possible, reinforced with ample data from the statistical summary. In the preparation of the part of the report relative to each project, the results reported in the statistical summary for the project should be analyzed, conclusions drawn, and recommendations made. The report may well be illustrated with photographs, maps, diagrams, blue prints, or copies of charts and other forms used in demonstration work. Full credit should be given to all cooperating agencies. The lines should be single-spaced, with double space between the paragraphs, and reasonably good margins left. The pages should be numbered in consecutive order.

The following outline is suggestive of how the narrative report may be clearly and systematically presented:

STATISTICAL SUMMARY.

To supplement the narrative part of the report, and in order that comparable State and National summaries may be made, it is necessary to include a statistical summary of the work in each county. The following form has been prepared to insure uniformity of reporting. In addition to the questions asked under each subdivision of the report, space is provided to add further data if desired. The statistical summary will grow naturally out of the field and office records.

DEFINITIONS OF TERMS USED IN THIS REPORT.

1. A PROGRAM OF WORK is a definitely outlined plan for extension work.
2. A PROJECT is a definite, systematic, organized plan for carrying out some phase of the extension program of work, providing for what is to be done, how much, when, where, how, and by whom.
3. MISCELLANEOUS work includes work which has not yet become a regular part of the program of work--work other than project work.
4. A COMMUNITY, for the purposes of this report, may be any one of the several units into which the county is divided for purposes of conducting organized extension work.
5. A PROJECT LEADER OR LOCAL LEADER is a person, selected because of his or her special interest and fitness, who functions as a leader in advancing some phase of the local program of extension work.
6. A DEMONSTRATION is an example designed to show the practical application of an established fact. Demonstrations as contemplated in this report are of two kinds, method demonstrations and result demonstrations.
A method demonstration is a demonstration given by an extension worker or other trained leader to a group for the purpose of showing them how to carry out a practice. Synonym: Lecture demonstration. Examples: Demonstrations of canning, mixing of spray materials, and culling of poultry.
A result demonstration is a demonstration carried on by a farmer, farm woman, boy, or girl under the direction of the extension service, involving a substantial period of time, records of results, and comparisons. Examples: Child-feeding, corn-culture, and orchard-management demonstrations.
7. A DEMONSTRATOR is a farmer, farm woman, boy, or girl who, under the direction of the extension service, conducts a result demonstration.
8. MEMBERS COMPLETING should include those who have satisfactorily finished the work outlined for the current year.
9. A DEMONSTRATION MEETING is a meeting held to give a method demonstration or to start, inspect, or further a result demonstration.
10. A TRAINING MEETING is a meeting at which project leaders or local leaders are trained to carry on extension activities in their respective communities.
11. AN OFFICE CALL OR TELEPHONE CALL is a visit or call by a farmer or other person seeking agricultural or home economics information, as a result of which some definite assistance or information is given.
12. A FARM VISIT is a call at a farm by the agent at which some definite information is given or concrete plan of work outlined, or some valuable information obtained from the farmer regarding his work, or the better practice prevailing in his neighborhood.
13. A HOME VISIT is a call at a home by the agent at which some definite information is given or concrete plan of work outlined, or some valuable information obtained from the farm woman regarding her work, or the better practice prevailing in her neighborhood.
14. DAYS IN OFFICE should include time spent by the county agent in his office, at county agent conferences, and any other work directly related to office administration.
15. DAYS IN FIELD should include all days spent on official duty other than those spent in office.
16. LETTERS WRITTEN should include all single letters on official business.

DEFINITIONS OF TERMS USED IN THIS REPORT--Continued.

17. A FARMERS' INSTITUTE is one of a series of meetings of one to two days' duration, arranged by a central State farmers' institute agency, at which agricultural and home-economics problems are discussed, usually by outside speakers employed for the purpose.
18. AN EXTENSION OR MOVABLE SCHOOL is an itinerant school usually of two to six days' duration where practical but systematic instruction is given to persons not resident at the college. AN EXTENSION SHORT COURSE differs from an extension school in that it is usually held at the college or other educational institution and usually for a longer period of time, but not exceeding two weeks.
19. RECORDS consist of definite information filed in the county office that will enable the agent to verify the data on extension work included in this report.
20. FARM OR HOME PRACTICE ADOPTED is a new or improved practice adopted on a farm or in a home during the year as a result of extension teaching. Examples: Spraying of potatoes for disease, canning of fruits and vegetables, use of balanced rations, and hat making.
