What do you consider the most effective and satisfactory demonstration work done in your county this year? Describe it in detail.

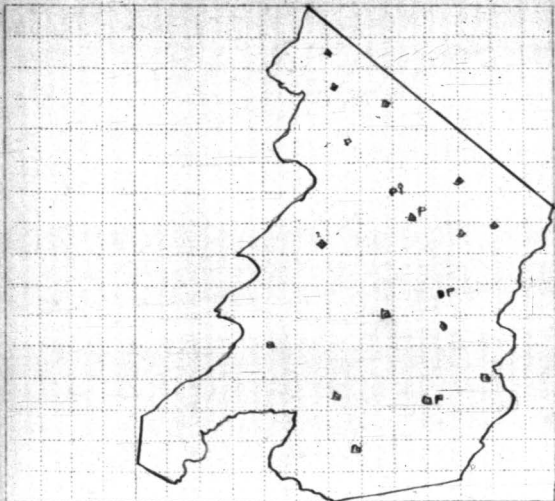
