XI. PLANS FOR A UNIFIED COUNTY EXTENSION PROGRAM

The agents have been working to strengthen the individual extension groups with the idea of working toward a unified program. Work has been started with a planning meeting toward this end. It is hoped that this will go much further during the coming year.

XII. PROBLEMS OF CARRYING OUT EXTENSION PROGRAM

There are several different economic levels in the county and this necessitates changing demonstrations and informative material. There are many working women and this means night meetings. The agent is working on strengthening the leadership program so she will be able to do more individual work in the county. The club members are encouraged to pass along information to friends and neighbors who are not reached so as to broaden the reach of the extension program. An effort is being made to get to know more people by attending different Churches and Church suppers. Every opportunity will be taken to publicize the extension program to broaden the county concept of it.

that will help in preparing a better annual report. She will check the plan of work frequently to see if objectives are being accomplished. The program development leaders will be encouraged to check the clubs to see if they are meeting county objectives. All 4-H club members will be encouraged to keep a detailed report on progress made in their particular project on projects. Monthly and annual reports of the county extension program will be given to the state office.

#### X. PLANS FOR PROFESSIONAL IMPROVEMENT

##### A. Organized Study

###### 1. Schools

The agent will attend all training schools that are available. These may be for the planned program or in addition to this.

###### 2. Short Course

The agent will attend any short courses that are available and can be worked into her schedule.

##### B. Reading Books and Publications

Agent will read two professional books and subscribe to and read six magazines.

##### C. Membership in Professional Organizations

The home agent belongs to the American and Virginia Home Economics Associations and also to the Virginia Home Demonstration Agent Association.

##### D. Participation in Programs, Workshops Planned by Other Organizations

The agent will take advantage of these programs or workshops when featured and will cooperate with these programs if asked.

The extension program of Clarke County is planned jointly with the county agent when possible. The home agent will cooperate with the county agent on any phase of the program that may arise at any time. The home agent will be prepared to give and receive constructive criticism at all times.

B. General Public

Home agent will show a pleasing and friendly attitude to everyone in the county as she meets them and respond in the same manner to requests made of her. She will strive to be tolerant of people, try to understand their behavior, needs and wants and at all times show a general interest in the county. Also, she will be well informed and try to present information in a definite and concise manner. The radio, newspaper, personal contacts and home visits will be used to help promote good public relationships, and to reach more families with extension program.

C. Elected Representatives

An effort will be made to know all elected representatives and to help and/or cooperate with them in any way possible.

D. Other Professional Workers

Home Agent will be informed as to their program. She will recognize these workers abilities and use such when possible. She will render assistance and cooperation whenever possible and keep relationships conducive to any cooperative endeavor.

IX. PLANS FOR RECORDING PROGRESS AND EVALUATING PROGRAMS

The agent will keep a daily record of telephone and office calls, home visits, and meetings as well as any other information

and 4-H functions. Every effort will be made to cooperate with them to the fullest.

B. March of Dimes Fund

Each year the home demonstration clubs sponsor a dinner from which all proceeds are given to the county Polio Fund. The women look forward to this project for it is a means for them to get to know each other so they are very liberal with their time and help.

C. County Red Cross Chapter

The home demonstration clubs cooperate with the Red Cross by making cancer bandages. These are used by the county nurse for the cancer packages. The Glendale home demonstration club always sends homemade cookies to the Newton D. Baker Veterans' Hospital at Christmas. The women are encouraged to come to the bloodmobile.

D. County Cancer Fund

This year half of the funds from the benefit dinner will be given to the Cancer fund.

E. Health Department

The agent will work with the county nurse anyway possible. The home demonstration women make cancer bandages for the department when they are needed.

F. County Welfare Department

Most of the community 4-H clubs prepare Christmas baskets for some needy family which is assigned them by the Welfare Supervisor.

5. 4-H Achievement Night

The objective is to recognize individual and club accomplishments in 4-H club work and to publicize the club program.

The agents will work with a county council committee to plan the program for the Achievement Program. If it can be arranged, it will be held during 4-H Achievement Week. Deserving members will be given awards and recognition and the agents will publicize these in the local newspapers.

6. The Contests - Club, County and District

The objective is to inspire the club members to develop different skills in their projects and to give them opportunity to compete with club members other than their own club.

All club members will be encouraged to enter the county contest. The winners from this will be assisted by the agent with preparation for the district contest.

7. The County Agricultural Fair

The 4-H boys and girls will be encouraged to take part in the county fair. This experience helps them develop better standards in their work. It also gives them initiative to work harder next year.

D. Young Men and Young Women's Work

Clarke does not have an organized Young Men and Women's Program, because there are not enough young people who would take part to warrant having the same. A large number of this group is reached by the home demonstration club, 4-H Honor Club, and some others are reached individually.

a. Each club will be encouraged to make an exhibit of some phase of its program. These are usually put in local stores for the week.

b. Club members will be encouraged to take part and attend the Share-of-the-Pun contest which will be held during this week. The Public Speaking contest will be held in connection with this program. For this year a covered dish supper for parents and leaders is planned before the contest.

c. A radio program will be devoted to the local 4-H activities.

d. Special news articles will be used to publicize the work that has been done and what is planned for the near future.

### 3. 4-H State Short Course

The objective is to get as many club members as possible to attend the Short Course in order that they get a broader concept of what they are a part of. This experience will give them incentive to work toward entering the state contest.

a. The agents will inform the club members as to when the Short Course will be held.

b. The agents will give assistance in obtaining transportation for those going.

c. The agent will help any members taking part in the state contest.

### 4. Rural Life Sunday

The objective is to help develop the moral and spiritual values of children. The parts they take in the programs help to get them over their stage fright and help develop the fourth 'H' (Heart).

6. Housekeeping

The objective is to help the girls do a better job of the housekeeping job.

a. Junior leaders, leaders, and agent will give the method demonstration at the club meetings.

b. Members will be encouraged to keep a record of work done. This will be handed in at the end of the year.

c. The club will be encouraged to enter an educational exhibit in the county fair.

7. Safety

The objective is to help the girls know how they can help make their homes and surrounding area a safer place.

a. Members will keep a record of the work they do and this will be handed in at the end of the year.

C. 4-H Activities

1. Camp at Powell's Fort Valley

The objective is to have as many club members as possible to attend and participate in camp as possible. Other than helping develop personality and physically, this experience gives them a broader view of 4-H club work and helps them develop their leadership abilities. The agents will inform the club members as to the time and cost of camp and will try to work out plans for all who want to attend to go.

2. National 4-H Club Week

The objective is to familiarize more of the people with the 4-H club program and the work it does in the county.

- b. Girls will keep a record of the work they have done and this will be handed in to the agent at the end of the year.
- c. Encourage the girls to enter the county fair.
- d. Encourage the girls to enter the county contest.
- e. Teach the girls standards by which foods should be judged.

Comparing products at the fair and judging foods at the meetings are means of doing this.

f. Films will be used when suitable to show people methods for preparing foods.

#### 4. Health

The objective is to help make the members realize the importance of good health habits.

- a. Leaders, guests, junior leaders and agent will give method demonstrations at the monthly meetings.
- b. Members will keep a record of the work they do and this will be handed in at the end of the year.
- c. The club carrying this project will be encouraged to enter an educational exhibit in the county fair.

#### 5. Ironing

The objective is to help the girls learn to do a better job of this everyday task. An appreciation for doing a good job will try to be developed.

- a. Leaders, club members and agents will give method demonstrations at the meetings.
- b. Girls will be encouraged to enter the county contest.
- c. Members will keep a record of the work they do and this will be handed in at the end of the year.

c. Encourage girls to enter county contest for their project.

d. Encourage girls to enter garments and articles in the county fair.

e. Use bulletins, charts, and demonstrations to help the girls improve their practices.

f. Hold project meetings during the summer where possible

## 2. Room Improvement

The objective is to help the girls take better care of their rooms, make improvements where possible and learn good standards for rooms.

### Methods to be Used

a. Club members, leaders and agent give method demonstrations at the meetings.

b. Encourage girls to enter products in the county fair.

c. Encourage the girls to enter a demonstration in the county contest.

d. Plan a county tour of girls doing a good job of room improvement.

e. News articles will be used to recognize the outstanding girls in the project.

## 3. Meal Preparation

### Bread

The objective is to help the girls know the proper foods to have in their diets. Method demonstrations will be designed to help the girls learn methods of preparation and how foods should be served.

a. Leaders, junior leaders, older club members and agent will give method demonstrations at the monthly meetings.

The club project for this year is "More Club Recreation". The Honor Club meets three times a year. At the spring meeting they plan for National 4-H Club Week which is one activity they help carry out. The summer meeting is usually a summer outing and the fall meeting is a business session, plus some form of a special program. The club has a tapping committee who works up and takes charge of tapping ceremony for new members which is held at the annual Achievement Program in the fall.

6. Project Planning Meeting

A joint planning meeting for the county is not held. Each club uses the last meeting on the year to plan for the coming year. They decide which project will be carried as a club project. By having all the club members work on this job they are more interested in what they are going to be doing.

B. Project Work

1. Make or Remake  
So You Like to Sew  
Looking Your Best

The objective is to teach the girls the correct techniques of sewing. This information will enable them to help stretch the family income and will be of help to them all through their lives.

Methods to be Used

- a. The junior leaders, leaders, club members and agent will give method demonstrations at each monthly meeting as is outlined in the different projects.
- b. Have girls keep records of the work they have done and hand in a record sheet when the project is complete.

IV. COUNTY EXTENSION PROGRAM - YOUTH

A. Organization

1. County Youth Council

Clarke does not have a county youth council

2. County Youth Committees

In Clarke there are no youth committees.

3. County 4-H Council

The County Council is made up of club officers and the county officers. It is the purpose of the County Council to strengthen the county 4-H club program. There are two meetings a year. The fall meeting is a training meeting or workshop for training the new club officers. The spring meeting is planned by a committee and there will be an IFYE talk. All of the 4-H club members and leaders will be invited to this meeting so as to increase their knowledge and understanding of the IFYE program. At both meetings there will be a business session to take care of any business on the docket, elections, committee appointments, plans for special activities, etc. During 1959 the county council plans to put up at least four road signs. The other two will be added as soon as possible.

4. All-Stars

Clarke does not have an All-Star organization because there are not enough all-Stars living in the county. The number has increased and it is hoped that the group can organize during the coming year.

5. Honor Club

The Honor Club members help with the regular club program anyway they can, such as serving as officers and junior leaders.

Federation Meeting so as to gain a more complete understanding of the working of the Extension program. The county committee would like to take a bus to the meeting this year and possibly this would encourage more members to attend.

7. Work in Unorganized Communities

An effort will be made to organize clubs in the communities that need this work.

- a. The organized clubs will assist in organizing new clubs.
- b. The county chairman and the agent will visit as much as possible in these unorganized communities to work up interest.
- c. Special interest meetings will be worked on for these interested areas.

III. FARM AND HOME DEVELOPMENT

The agents have been working with two families in the last year. They hope to add several more families during 1959. In some cases the agents will be working together with the family and in others the agents will be working separately.

Clarke is a highly organized county and as the number of working women increase it makes club work harder so individual contacts become more effective. After building up the club leadership the agent plans to do more individual work. In some cases these people will be working and in many others they will not be.

The radio program and news articles will be used to encourage outstanding work done by the county people. Where possible club members will be encouraged to visit Farm and Home Development projects.

4. Institute of Rural Affairs

The women will be encouraged to attend the Institute of Rural Affairs. By doing this they will gain much helpful information, learn more about their landgrant college, become more interested in the general Extension program.

a. Club women will be encouraged to go to the Institute.

b. Delegates will give report to their individual clubs so as to encourage others to go the following year.

c. The county committee will sponsor a county delegate.

5. The County Agricultural Fair

The home demonstration women will take part in the County Agricultural Fair which is sponsored by the Clarke County Puritan Club. They will show what they have done through their exhibits. Competing in the projects will encourage the women to do more and better work in the future.

a. The women will serve as department chairmen, superintendents, etc.

b. The agent will assist by getting judges and taking in exhibits.

c. The home economics teachers and the extension agent will work together and set up the premium lists and prizes.

d. The home demonstration clubs are encouraged to have a fair chairman who will work toward getting her club members to take part in the fair.

6. Spring Federation Meeting

The club women will be encouraged to attend the spring

year the proceeds will be divided between the Clarke County Police Fund and the Cancer Fund. The women feel these are both very worthy charities and will give freely of their time and material goods in order that it will be a success.

b. County-wide Picnic

A county-wide picnic for all home demonstration members and their families is planned for this summer. The purpose of this is to get the members to know one another.

3. National Home Demonstration Week

During the week several special activities, which are designed and planned to arouse interest in home demonstration work will be carried on.

a. Club members will be asked and encouraged to visit non-members for the purpose of acquainting them with the program and getting new club members.

b. One of the result demonstrations will be open house for county club members and friends.

c. Each club will be encouraged to sponsor an activity to observe National Home Demonstration Week.

d. A news article designed to give the people a better understanding of the club program will be written and used in all local papers.

e. A radio program will be devoted to the accomplishments of the county extension program.

f. The county committee will prepare and put in a local store window a display of some of the clubs projects. This will be designed to tell the people about some of the things the clubs have

The extension horticulturist will come to the county and train the club leaders to do the club demonstrations on "Preparing Rock Gardens." The agent will supply the program of work chairman with suitable material for developing the monthly topics. The agent will encourage the clubs to have a plant, seed, and bulb exchange in the spring.

D. Other Activities

1. County Objective

- a. Begin meeting on time
- b. Have club represented at each county training meeting.
- c. Each club member attend Spring District Meeting.
- d. Support all 4-H club activities and help increase membership by 20 members.
- e. Each club get three new members.
- f. Each club try to have a representative to Institute of Rural Affairs.
- g. Each club member read 5 books on reading list.
- h. Each member take one non-member family and pass on information regularly.

Methods to be used:

- a. All clubs will be encouraged to meet all these goals in the course of the year.
- b. Program Development leaders will check throughout the year on her club's progress on completing these goals.

2. County or Community Projects

- a. Polio and Cancer Dinner

For several years (six) the home demonstration clubs have sponsored a dinner for the benefit of the Polio Fund. This

f. Garden, Foultry and Landscaping

1. Developing rock gardens

The objective is to help the women build rock gardens to beautify the home and surrounding area.

The extension horticulturist will come to the county and train the leaders who will give the club demonstrations. The local garden club will be invited to attend the meeting.

g. Home Management ( club choice)

1. Small equipment

The objective is to help the women select small equipment that is suitable for gifts.

The agent will work out a demonstration from written material and give the demonstration for the clubs requesting this information. It will be designed to include good, but inexpensive to medium expensive articles.

C. Federation Program of Work

The Program of Work for 1959 will be "Home Grounds Beautification".

What:

1. Encourage club members to have a soil test made of garden soil. Use results of test.
2. To study and learn suitable shrubs and flowers for the home grounds - what, when, and how to plant and care of it.
3. To study and learn how to develop a rock garden. Where to locate what plants and when to plant - kind of rock.

How:

1. Each club have a program of work chairman.
2. Program of Work chairman be responsible for having 10 - 15 minute discussions on Home and Community Beautification at each meeting.
3. Also devote one meeting to the subject.
4. Each club hold a plant exchange (seeds, slips, plants, bulbs)

The objective is to teach the women how to gather and prepare plants for dried arrangements.

The assistant home demonstration agent from a neighboring county will come to the county and train the leaders to give the method demonstrations for the monthly meetings.

2. Dried Arrangements

The objective is to help the women make arrangements of the plant material they have gathered during the summer season.

The assistant home demonstration agent from Frederick will come to the county and train the leaders who will help the women at the monthly meetings which will be a work meeting.

d. Clothing

1. Putting in zippers and buttonholes

The objective is to teach the women to do a professional looking job of zippers and buttonholes.

The agent will train the leaders who will give the method demonstration at the meetings. The leaders will be supplied with printed material that can be used to supplement this demonstration.

e. Housing

1. Better Home Lighting (club choice)

The objective is to help the women improve the lighting of their homes at a nominal cost.

The agent will give the method demonstration for the club meetings who desire it. This will be an all day meeting with the remaining time spent on making lamp shades. Printed material will be used to supplement the demonstration.

b. Foods and Nutrition

1. Inexpensive Foods for Entertaining

The objective is to help the women to do a better job of entertaining with less costly foods that are tasty and pretty.

The agent will use extension and commercial material to prepare the method demonstration that she will give at the monthly meetings. The demonstration will be designed to tie in with the usual holiday parties in December.

2. Hearty Salads

The objective is to teach the women how to use hearty salads to add variety to the family meals.

The extension foods and nutrition specialist will come to the county and train the agent, who in turn, will give the method demonstration at the monthly meetings. She will use extension and commercial material to supplement the demonstration.

3. Wise Buying and Preparing Inexpensive Foods

The objective is to help the women buy, prepare and serve attractively inexpensive foods so as to stretch the family income.

The extension foods and nutrition specialist will come to the county and train the leaders who will give the method demonstration at the monthly meetings. The agent will supply the leaders with printed material that they can use to supplement the demonstrations.

c. Rural Arts

1. Preparing Flowers and Other Plant Material for Dried Arrangements

The extension house furnishings specialist will come to the county and train the leaders, who in turn, will give the method demonstrations at the club meetings.

#### 4. Making Draperies

The objective is to help the women learn to make draperies which can help them stretch the family budget and aid in improving the appearance of the home.

The extension house furnishings specialist will train the agent, who in turn, will give the method demonstration at the monthly meetings and will assist the women with making their draperies. Extension bulletins will be used to supplement this demonstration.

#### 5. Upholstery (special interest)

The objective is to teach the women to re-upholster so that they can do over their chairs in place of having to buy new ones, thus stretching the family income.

The agent shall attend a district upholstery school to add to her knowledge of this work. The total number in the interested group will meet at their convenience during the month of March. The agent will be working with these groups while the leaders give the regular monthly demonstrations.

#### 6. Re-caning chairs (club choice)

The objective is to help the women learn how to reseat chairs in order that they can be made reusable instead of thrown away.

The agent will work with this group and help them to learn to recane chairs.

2. Project Work

a. House Furnishings

1. Fabrics for House Furnishings

The objective is to acquaint the women with the new materials and finishes that are on the market today so they will be able to make selections which are best suited for their uses.

The agent will use extension, commercial and any other information available to prepare the method demonstration that will be given at the monthly meetings. This information will also be used in preparation for several of the other demonstrations throughout the year.

2. Slip Covers

The objective is to help the women learn to make slip covers so that they can use this as a means of stretching the family budget. In some cases this will save buying new furniture.

The extension house furnishings specialist will come to the county and train the club leaders who in turn will give the club demonstrations. This meeting will be an all-day session and will give the club an opportunity for fellowship that they normally don't have time for.

3. Beauty for Your Windows

The objective is to help the women add beauty to the home by giving the windows the proper treatment. Information on the best material and hardware to use is needed to aid this improvement.

II. COUNTY EXTENSION PROGRAM - ADULT

A. Over-all Program

1. County Agricultural Extension Service Board

At this time Clarke does not have a County Agricultural Extension Board.

2. Home Economics Council

Clarke county does not have a Home Economics Council

3. General Interest Committee

In 1957 a Farm and Home Lighting Committee was organized. This group recognized the need for better farm and home lighting and made some plans for getting good lighting information to the people of Clarke. So far, this committee has not done much beyond this point.

B. Home Demonstration Club Program

1. County Home Demonstration Committee

The county committee is made up of the club presidents, program development leaders and county officers. This group meets in the spring and fall. The fall meeting is the planning meeting for the coming year's program and activities for the first of the year are planned for. At the spring meeting a check is made on foregone activities and plans are made for the activities for the remainder of the year. If it is possible the training meeting for program development leaders will be held the same time of the spring planning meeting.

thus reducing the money expenditure for food.

The social conditions in the county are not too good. There is a lack of recreation for young people, but much is being done by the Churches, home demonstration clubs and other organizations to improve the youth situation. During the past year a teen-age canteen has been organized. It meets on alternate Saturday nights in Berryville and White Post. Many parents are working and there is no one left to take the definite responsibility of the children. There is a need for greater parent-child relationship and recreation is a good means to further this relationship.

The people are much interested in the health of their families and communities. There is need for more rural people to take advantage of Chest X-Ray and blood mobile.

TV had encouraged people to stay at home more in family groups. This calls for more practical, comfortable homes, more information on house furnishings, easy care of the house and ways of making the home attractive and livable is needed. The women realized this is a pressing problem, so they have devoted the major part of their program to this phase of homemaking.

With the cost of living going up so much the club members need help on the family budgeting. Last year work has begun on this phase and some of the demonstrations for 1959 are designed to help stretch the family budget.

Clarke is a highly organized county and it is hard to get people to come to meetings. Also the many different social standards

I. COUNTY SITUATION

Clarke is a small northern county which is located east of Winchester. The population is 7,050 with 53% engaged in agriculture and 47% in industry. The main sources of income for the agricultural group are from the sale of fruit, cattle, dairy products and general farming. This group includes a large number of tenant farmers and farm laborers, which means there is a small number of farm families operating an average size farm. A large number of farms are owned by non-residents. The number of people in industry is increasing because the government is employing more and a book factory has moved into the county. Also, there are a lot of retired people who have moved into the county.

There is very little domestic help employed in the average home of the Home Demonstration members. Many homemakers work outside of the home in the fruit industry during September, October, November and December. This affects the home demonstration program to the extent that the major program and activities must be carried on during the first six months of the year.

In addition to these mentioned sources of income, the family garden, poultry flock, home produced and cured meat, including beef, veal and lamb, supply much of the family food needs,
