My name is Kristin Machac, and I am a PhD candidate at Virginia Tech. I have just completed a dissertation titled: A model of expert instructional design heuristics incorporating design thinking methods. Two of my research questions were largely inspired by your research studies of expert instructional designers in practice and the challenges faced by novice designers. In your Delphi study examining instructional design principles applied by experienced designers in practice, you posed the questions: (a) Can we teach principles to novice instructional designers, and (b) What methods should we use to provide this information?
