RAPID PACE

The Local Chapter of the F. F. V's. of Clintwood is progressing nicely. The members of this chapter are very enthusiastic over the prospect and have thrown themselves into the work, determining to win. Never before in the history of D.M. H.S. has an organization enthused the pupils as has the F. F. V. It is a milepost in the history of our school and a marker in the progress of the vocational work in the state.

When the chapter was organized the members selected the following objectives to be carried out:

- 1. Cooperative marketing and buying
- 2. Boosting the Department of Agriculture
- 3. Vacation tour
- 4. Father and Son banquet
- 5. Organization of Thrift Bank

Clifford Wood was elected President, as he had the largest savings account and Clifton Cosby, secretary, as he had one of the best kept records. A board of directors will be appointed in the latter part of next week by sponsor U. K. Franken.

The cost of the banquet was announced and each member paid his proportionate share of the expense. Mrs. Franken was instructed to purchase a suitable present for Miss Jones, whose untiring efforts made the banquet such a success.

REAL THRIFT

Jan. 29, the Willis Chapter of F. F. V's met and after a short discussion organized a Thrift Bank. Each class has their own officers on account of depositing their money at the beginning of class period on Mondays and to see which can put on the best Thrift Bank account. For the first and second year boys the following directors were elected: Jesse Conner, Pierce Weeks, Luther Marshall, Graydon Bond, Clarence Alderman, Carmon Hylton, John Conner, and R. A. Noell, Inst. Luther Marshall was elected Pres., Carmon Hylton Vice-Pres., Pierce Weeks Secretary and Frank Hylton Cashier. For the third and fourth year boys the following directors were elected: Burnett Poff, McClure Phelegar, Lonnie Kieth, Quinton Donnelly, Harold Donnelly and R. A. Noell, Inst. Burnett Poff was elected Pres., McClure Phelegar Vice-Pres., Lonnie Keith secretary, and Charlie Donnelly cashier.

After the election the following rules were set up:

- 1. Each Mon. take 10 or 15 minutes at the beginning of class period to deposit money.
- 2. Each boy must have \$25.00 on savings account or otherwise profitably invested to remain a member of the bank at the end of each year.
- 3. Money shall be drawn from bank only for productive investments, college education, school tuition, clothing and books.
- 4. Cashiers shall be elected for a term of three months.
- 5. Election of cashier must be held at end and beginning of school, then every three months during school term.
- 6. Coshiers connot succeed themselves but may be reelected after a lapse of one term.
 7. Directors, president, vice-president, and secretary shall be elected at beginning of school term.

Willis continued -

8. Directors shall elect the president, vice president and secretary from directors. 3. Cashier shall be elected by directors but not one of them.

There are twenty-five (25) boys in the agricultural classes and each one of them has a Thrift Bank account."
