Volunteer Led 4-H Clubs

Riding Star 4-H Horse and Pony Club

Summer Programs

Prince Edward 4-H offers a variety of programs throughout the summer. Those planned for summer 2017 include:

- Cloverbud Camp an overnight camping experience at Holiday Lake 4-H Center for youth ages 5 – 8 (usually a weekend in mid-June)
- Junior 4-H Camp an overnight camping program for youth ages 9 13 held at Holiday
 Lake 4-H Educational Center; dates will be announced in late September
- State 4-H Congress state level competitions and workshops for senior 4-H members (ages 14 18) held on campus at Virginia Tech, June 2017
- Camp Loud and Clear a weekend camp for deaf and hard-of-hearing youth ages 8 and older held at Holiday Lake 4-H Center in July

Volunteer Opportunities



Without volunteers our 4-H program can't grow. If you have a talent or an interest that you would like to share with local youth ages 5 – 13, please consider giving your time to 4-H. Volunteers can participate in many different ways with all levels of time commitment. Some volunteers lead short-term special interest after-school programs. Some will volunteer to lead a half-day workshop. Others lead clubs that meet once a month. We can always use extra eyes and hands for programs like cooking and sewing.

There is a significant movement statewide to bring back traditional **4-H community clubs**. These are clubs composed of families that live in the same part of the county. They elect

officers and hold monthly meetings, often at a church or community center. Members of community clubs will generally choose their own projects and work on them with the support of parents and club leaders. Members will make a presentation to the club as they complete their work and qualify for district level contests. Community clubs often take on service projects and plan and work on them together. A successful community club requires a couple of people who are willing to commit to take the lead as well as a group of supportive parents. The value in a community club is that members often have long-term involvement, allowing them to advance to higher levels in their project areas and take on leadership roles in the club.
