Each of these winners received a check for \$200.00 from the Future Farmers of America Foundation and a certificate from the Virginia Association FFA.


Young Smith lives on and helps to operate the 1,000-acre home dairy farm. He has spent 5,018 hours work during the past five years.

Robert now owns 6 dairy cows, 15 heifers, 11 calves and one bull. He grows 5 acres of corn, 10 acres of wheat, 10 acres of barley, 15 acres of oats, 5 acres of rye and 10 acres of mixed hay. The herd averaged 17,000 pounds of milk and 647 pounds of butterfat. The milk tested 3.7%

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

Coleman Named Central Supervisor

Wickham B. Coleman, 42, has been appointed assistant supervisor of agricultural education in Central Virginia effective July 1, 1971. He succeeds Jesse C. Green who retired June 30. When Mr. Coleman assumes his new duties, the central area agricultural education office will be moved from Powhatan to Bowling Green, Virginia.

A native of Caroline County, Mr. Coleman is a graduate of Caroline High School. He received the Bachelor of Science and the Masters degrees in agricultural education from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. Following graduation he served as an officer in the U. S. Air Force for two years. Mr. Coleman began his career in public education as a teacher of agriculture in Caroline County in 1953 where he taught for sixteen years. During the past two years he has served as principal of Ladysmith High School in Caroline County.

Mr. Coleman has been active in community, church and professional organizations, having served as vice president and secretary-treasurer of the Virginia Vocational Agricultural Teachers Association. He also served as president and secretary-treasurer of the Caroline Education Association and West Caroline Ruritan Club. Roadside Marker Dedicated to the First FFA Chapter

The Weyers Cave Ruritan Club dedicated a roadside marker to the founding of the first chartered FFA Chapter in America on State route 256, one mile east of Weyers Cave June 11, 1971.

Six of the original chapter members attended the dedicatory ceremonies unveiling the marker at 6:45 p.m. and a banquet followed in the Weyers Cave Elementary School at 7:30 p.m.

Along with the charter members were state and national officers of the National FFA organization. The banquet was dedicated to the late E. B. Craun, Sr. who was the first vocational agriculture teacher at Weyers Cave and under whose direction the chapter received its charter.

The Weyers Cave chapter was later consolidated into the present Fort Defiance High School chapter.





DAIRY FARMING

Kenneth Wayne Price, a Marion Senior High School student, was named to receive the State award of the Future Farmers of America for dairy farming. Kenneth has conducted an outstanding program of supervised farming on a 102 acre dairy farm where he is farming in partnership with his parents. His supervised farming program has consisted of 83 dairy animals, 66 acres of corn for silage and grain and 65 acres of hay. The skills and competencies which he has developed include testing milk for butterfat, balancing rations according to production and animal nutritional needs, artificially inseminating cows, fitting and showing dairy animals, managing and maintaining animal health by vaccination, breeding procedures, milking techniques and castrating and dehorning. He has gained experience in marketing dairy cattle and products through selling milk cooperatively, purchasing feed and replacement heifers cooperatively, using semen from proven sires in his breeding program. 

The work of the Appomattox County FFA Chapter in wildlife conservation was recognized as the state's most outstand-


Nearly 200 wildlife feed patches were planted by members of the winning Appomattox County FFA Chapter. A wildlife exhibit was prepared and placed in a local store.


Jesse C. Green Retired July 1

Ford to vocational-agriculture departments on a first-request basis. Ford said it is taking steps to answer additional requests as soon as possible.

The film calls attention to accelerated efforts by tractor and farm machinery manufacturers to make their products as safe as possible, and to stepped-up farm safety programs by many groups.

"These efforts are inspired by the conviction that tractor accidents can be avoided," Ford notes.

Safety pointers in the film range from proper preparation for a tractors operation to hazards in the field and on the highway.

Safety reminders on decals accompanying the film include:

- · Use protective frames or cabs together with safety belts.
- · Pull loads from drawbar only.
- Equip tractor with weights necessary for good stability.
- Make sure power take-off protective shield is in place.
- · Use flashing lights and slow-moving emblem on highways, day or night.
- Do not allow passengers on tractor

Dairy Co-ops To Sponsor FFA Contests

Two of the largest dairy marketing co- | year at the National FFA Convention. opratives in the nation recently announced they will join the National FFA Foundation in sponsoring two educational dairy contests at the National FFA Convention this fall in Kansas City, Missouri. Associated Milk Producers, Inc., of San Antonio, Texas, and Mid-America Dairymen's Association, Inc., of Springfield, Missouri, will co-sponsor the National FFA Contests in Dairy Cattle and Dairy Products judging. The FFA is a national youth organization which provides educational activities to supplement the instructional program in vocational agriculture.

Representatives of both Associated Milk Producers, Inc., and Mid-America Dairymen's Association, Inc., met with National FFA President, Dan Lehmann, recently to sign a sponsoring agreement. Wm. A. Powell, President of Mid-America Dairymen's Association, Inc., and John Butterbrodt, President of Associated Milk Producers, Inc. emphasized this will be an opportunity for their organizations to join in an educational activity that benefits youth and at the same time advances the dairy industry.

The dairy judging contests are two of William Godwin Kennedy five National Judging Contests held each

They are the culmination of FFA Dairy Judging Contests that begin at the local chapter level and proceed through contests at the district and state levels.

Last year 44 states sent three-man teams to the National FFA Dairy Cattle Judging Contest. Another 34 states sent teams to participate in the National Dairy Products Judging Contest. The National Judging Contests are competive activities in which young men and women who are students of vocational agriculture test their ability to select top quality dairy cattle and dairy products. The contests are a valuable educational tool because in selecting and ranking livestock and animal products, participants must use their knowledge and understanding of the factors that make top quality agricultural products.

Only FFA members between 14 and 21 years of age are eligible to compete in the contests. Students must either be enrolled in vocational agriculture or they must have completed all the courses in agriculture given in their school.

Nine classes of dairy cattle will be available for the Dairy Cattle Judging Contest. Each three-man judging team

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observes the animals from all angles for 12 minutes, but is not allowed to touch them. After the allotted time each team member is given an additional 12 minutes to prepare reasons for their placement choices. Finally, each team member has two minutes to give oral reasons for one class placement.


The Dairy Cattle Judging Contest requires students to make decisions under pressure. They must call on all their knowledge of dairy cattle learned in the classroom to make a placement decision. Reasons must be sound because the student is called on to verbally defend his reasoning once the decision is made.

The dairy products judging has application for both the dairy farmer and the milk consumer. The contest teaches students to recognize top quality milk and to understand the factors that affect milk quality. The Dairy Products Judging Contest consists of two parts. First, each three-man team is given seven samples of bulk milk which has been pasteurized. Each sample is to be visual and taste tested to determine flavor, odor, and sediment content of the milk. In addition to scoring milk samples, contestants are required to inspect milking machine parts rating serviceability and affect on milk quality. Each team member's evaluation of the samples and the milker parts is written on score sheets and compared to scores determined by the contest officials. The scoring is done according to standards set by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Although the dairy contests are recognized as competitive events with all the joys of victory and agonies of defeat, they are considered strong educational activities. "Contests provide an incentive for students to learn more about their area of interest," says Robert Seefeldt, FFA Manager of Contests and Awards. "Contestants for the National FFA Dairy Judging Contests will spend many hours practicing and sharpening their skills. The knowledge and decision-making ability they gain will help make them better employees," he points out.

Dairy Judging Contests start at the local chapter level where thousands of students are involved. Most states also have district and state Dairy Judging Contests where chapters throughout the state vie for the opportunity to represent the state in the National Dairy Judging Contests. In this way a high proportion of FFA members are involved in the Dairy Judging Contests even though only the best teams make it to the national competition.
