VII Significant Accomplishments in 2008-2009

In July 2008, Patricia Kelly led the Malawi Study Abroad program.

In September 2008, Josiah Tlou and Patricia Kelly conducted Phase III of the Kenya Cultural Exchange program by traveling to Nairobi and Mombasa to assist the Kenyans who had visited the US in delivering civic education workshops and to provide feedback on the development of on-side projects.

In March 2009, Patricia Kelly and Josiah went to Kenya to visit the 10 sites where individual civic education projects had been implemented. Dean Sue Ott Rowlands arrived to meet with our partner institution, Kenyatta University, and to discuss the projects with the Kenyan implementers.

In May 2009 the School of Education's Center for Research and Development in International Education (CRaDIE) hosted a group of 20 Nigerian College of Education presidents for a ten-day international seminar. The group was focused on developing partnerships for promoting educational technology in tertiary education institutions. They heard presentations from the Institute for Critical Technologies and Applied Sciences, Virginia Bioinformatics Institute, Corporate Research Center, VTLS, IDDL and Distance Learning, Math Emporium, Center for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching, Office of Research, Education, and Development, Learning Technologies, Academic Assessment, the College of Engineering, and the School of Education. A number of academic and

research facilities across campus were also visited. Following the Blacksburg portion of the seminar, the group traveled to Charlottesville where Associate Dean of the Curry School of Education at University of Virginia, Rebecca Kneedler, and Joe Garofalo, Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, spoke to them. They toured the grounds and visited Monticello. Prior to debarking, they were given a presentation at the National Board for Professional Practices office in Roselyn, Virginia.

In May 2009, Josiah Tlou was an invited participant at the World Congress for Civic Education in Cape Town, South Africa, for 260 delegates from 66 countries. Dr. Tlou was sponsored by the Center for Civic Education in California.
