SUBJECT: Minutes of the Meeting of Thursday, December 2, 1976

The Commission on Student Affairs met on Thursday, December 2, 1976, at 4:00 p. m. in Room 344 Squires Student Center. The following members were absent: Dean David E. Hill represented by Mr. D. David Ostroth; Ms. Linda L. Harriman represented by Ms. S. Kathy Rowe; Dr. N. Alan Sheppard; Mr. Ed Harvie. The following items were considered.

1. The minutes of the November 4 and 8, 1976, meeting were approved as distributed.
2. The agenda and addendum were approved with the following changes:
 - a. Item 16 on Page 4, request by Ananda Marga to hold a song writing seminar, was deleted because it was only open to Ananda Marga members and their invited guests.
 - b. Ms. Christine Rotchford requests permission for the Latter Day Saints Student Association to hold an open house Wednesday, January 12, 1977, and Thursday, January 13, 1977, in Room 326 Squires Student Center from 9:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. The group plans to have a table set up in the telephone lobby of Squires with a display of literature and pamphlets. Also, Thursday, January 13, 1977, from 6:30 p. m. to 8:00 p. m., a film will be shown in Squires Student Center with a question and answer period afterwards. This event will be free and open to the public.
3. Mr. Zane Scott moved for the approval of the Residence Hall Federation Executive Board minutes of October 11, 18, and November 1, 1976. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.
4. Ms. Lynn Wildrick, representing the Y. M. C. A., requested permission to advertise campus-wide the Y. M. C. A. Free University Winter course offerings. The tentative list includes the following:

A minimum fee will be charged for each class, and the majority of the classes will be held off campus. Additionally, the Y. M. C. A. requested permission to distribute campus-wide a flyer listing their classes.

Mr. Bill Johnston moved for approval. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

5. Mr. William W. Adams, representing the Virginia Tech Wargaming Society, requested permission to advertise prior to and sponsor a state-wide wargaming tournament on Saturday and Sunday, February 5 and 6, 1977, in the Old Dominion Ballroom of Squires Student Center. Each individual entering the tournament will be requested to pay a pre-registration fee of \$6.00 per four-man team and \$2.00 per individual. Participation in the tournament will be closed to the general public; however, the University community and the general public will be invited to observe the tournament.

Ms. Terri Garcia moved for approval. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

6. Mr. Glenn Tyndall, representing the Wesley Foundation, requested permission to advertise campus-wide a Moravian Love Feast. The Love Feast will be held on Sunday, December 12, 1976, at 6:30 p. m. in the Wesley Foundation. This special Christmas program will be open to all members of the University community. A free will offering will be received.

Cadet Albert Poole moved for approval. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

7. Mr. Bill Gilmore, representing the Virginia Tech Outing Club, requested permission to advertise campus-wide prior to and sponsor an outdoor equipment sale beginning Monday, December 6, 1976. The club will advertise campus-wide to encourage student and faculty to order outdoor equipment at a lower price. In addition to contacting the Commission on Student Affairs, the Virginia Tech Outing Club will need to contact Dr. Raymond Smoot in the Office of the Vice President for Administration.

Mr. Mark Warlick moved for approval. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

8. Mr. Danny Walker, representing the New River Almanac, requested permission to advertise prior to and during the sale of the Winter, 1976, issue, during the week of December 13-17, 1976. Sales will be held in the New River Almanac Office, 321 Squires Student Center, from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., the University Bookstore, and retail bookstores. The cost is \$1.00 per copy.

Ms. Terri Garcia moved for approval. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

9. Mr. Gary Smallwood, representing the German Club, requested permission to advertise prior to and sponsor Winter Germans on Friday, January 28, 1977, from 8:00 p.m. to 12:00 midnight in both the Commonwealth and Old Dominion Ballrooms of Squires Student Center. There will be an admission charge of \$5.00 per couple, and refreshments will be served.

Mr. Gary Smallwood moved for approval. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

10. Ms. Jane Good, representing the Monteith Residence Hall Federation, requested permission to advertise prior to and sponsor a Cartoon Blanket Night on Thursday, December 9, 1976, at 8:00 p.m. in the basement lounge of Monteith Hall. The event will be publicized only in the dormitories of the upper quad area of campus but is open to the general public. There will be an admission charge of 50¢ per person to cover the rental cost of the films and the cost of the popcorn.

Mr. Zane Scott moved for approval. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

11. Ms. Chris Rotchford, representing the Recreation Committee of the Virginia Tech Union, requested permission to advertise prior to and sponsor an ACU-I qualifying Frisbee Tournament to be held on Saturday, December 11, 1976, in the Fieldhouse. There is an entry fee of \$1.00, and the tournament is open only to Virginia Tech students. Permission for use of the Fieldhouse has been obtained from Mr. Mathews, Assistant Athletic Director.

Ms. Chris Rotchford moved for approval. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

12. Mr. Roy Martin, representing Kappa Sigma Fraternity, requested permission to advertise prior to and sponsor a dance and drawing

for a color TV set on Saturday, January 8, 1977, from 8:00 p. m. to 12:00 midnight in Squires Commonwealth Ballroom. The dance and drawing are open to the public at a price of \$1.00 per person. Beer will be sold at Squires Student Center, and the necessary number of security guards will be provided.

Mr. Roy Martin moved for approval. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

13. Mr. Donald Carter, representing the Conservation and Recreation Society, requested permission to advertise campus-wide and sponsor a Christmas tree sale on campus and within the Residence Halls and Squires Student Center. The club plans to begin advertising the sale on December 2, 1976, and end no later than December 18, 1976. The sale will be open to faculty, staff, and students, as well as the general public. The group has been granted permission by Dr. Raymond Smoot in the Office of the Vice President for Administration to use part of the gravel parking lot behind the Stadium to store the trees during the sale. They will solicit orders in the buildings and allow customers to come and pick out the tree of their choice. The club plans to advertise through various campus media. Dr. Smoot has notified the club that the campus mailing service is to be used only for official University correspondence and cannot be used for a mass mailing to advertise this sale. The Conservation and Recreation Society should contact the Residence Hall Federation and the Director of Squires Student Center concerning the use of their facilities.

Mr. Roy Martin moved for approval. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

14. Ms. Kathy English, representing the Shanks Residence Hall Federation, requested permission to advertise prior to and sponsor two film festivals during Winter Quarter, 1977. The first is scheduled for December 16, 1976, from 8:00 p. m. to 10:00 p. m. in Room 100 McBryde Hall. Four comedy films will be shown at this time. The second is scheduled for Thursday, January 27, 1977, from 8:00 p. m. to 10:00 p. m. in Room 100 McBryde Hall. The events are open to the public with a 25¢ per person admission charge. Arrangements have been made to reserve 100 McBryde Hall for both of these events.

Mr. Mark Warlick moved for approval. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

15. Ms. Kathy Flint, representing the Performing Arts Federation, requested permission to advertise prior to and sponsor the attached list of 20 programs during Winter Quarter, 1976.

Mr. Dan Taylor, representing the Latter Day Saints Student Association, requested permission to hold an open house Wednesday, January 12, 1977 and Thursday, January 13, 1977, in Room 326 Squires Student Center from 9:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. both days. The group plans to have a table set up in the telephone lobby of Squires Student Center with a display of literature and pamphlets.
