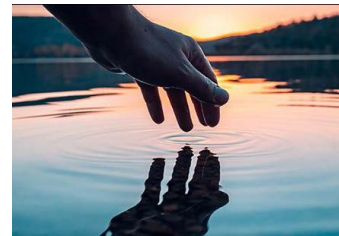

Honoring the legacy of MLK, "We Cannot Walk Alone"

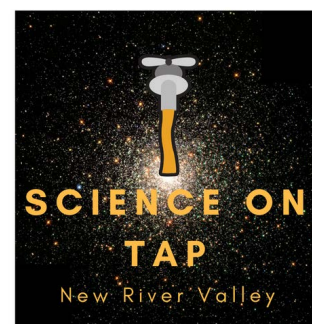

From the Sewall Lab:

Male zebra finches exposed to lead (Pb) during development have reduced volume of song nuclei, altered sexual traits, and received less attention from females as adults

Two years of work conducted in the lab of GCC affiliate, Kendra Sewall (Biological Sciences), was synthesized as an article in the journal *Ecotoxicology and Environmental Safety*. Authored by recent postdoc Chris Goodchild (now at Central Oklahoma State U) with massive help from previous post doc Michelle Beck (now at Rivier College), current grad students [Isaac VanDiest](#) and [Sam Lane](#), and undergraduate Neuroscience Fellow Frankie Czesak. The work was partially funded by a GCC undergraduate research grant to Tommy McCabe and by an ICTAS Jr Faculty award.
