I. Learning

A. Undergraduate Teaching and Advising

- ◆ Faculty provided academic and career advising to 760 psychology majors enrolled in Fall 2005 and to 775 in Spring 2006.
- ◆ There were 10 lecture courses, 1 lab course, and 9 variable credit courses taught in the first summer session of 2005; 9 lecture courses, 2 labs, and 9 variable credit courses taught in second summer 2005; 44 lecture courses, 6 lab courses, and 9 variable credit courses taught in fall 2005; and 45 lecture courses, 8 lab courses, and 9 variable credit courses taught in spring 2006. Variable credit courses included Field Study, Independent Study, Undergraduate Research, Research and Thesis, Research and Dissertation, Clinical Practicum, and Internship.
- ◆ The total number of students enrolled in these courses were as follows: Summer I - 173; Summer II - 135; Fall 2005 - 2554; Spring 2006 - 3476
- ◆ Over 200 students earned the Bachelor of Science in Psychology this year:
 - 20 Summa Cum Laude, 18 Magna Cum Laude, and 26 Cum Laude
 - 3 Graduated In Honors
 - 3 Graduated as Honors Scholars
 - 5 Graduated as Commonwealth Scholars.

B. Graduate Teaching and Advising

- ◆ Faculty provided curriculum and career advising to 78 graduate students enrolled in one of three psychology PhD programs in the Fall of 2005 and to 75 were enrolled in Spring 2006.
- ◆ There were 3 variable credit courses taught in the first summer session of 2005; 3 variable credit courses taught in second summer 2005; 7 lecture courses, 2 practicum courses, and 4 variable credit courses taught in fall 2005; and 11 lecture courses, 2 practicum courses, and 4 variable credit courses taught in spring 2006. Variable credit courses included Research and Thesis, Research and Dissertation, and Internship.
- ◆ No graduate were enrolled for first summer or second summer session of 2005. However, 64 students were enrolled in the above courses in fall 2005 and 70 students were enrolled in spring 2006

C. Undergraduate Research Mentoring

- ◆ In summer 2005, 2 Field Studies, 2 Independent Studies, and 2 Undergraduate research courses were offered. In fall of 2005 and spring of 2006, 3 field Studies, 2 Independent Studies, and 2 undergraduate research courses were taught
- ◆ 5 students received Departmental awards for excellence in undergraduate research. They were:

- Jennifer Carey, who completed an honors thesis with Dr. Angela Scarpa-Friedman on the effects of gender and physical abuse on later aggression and depression.
- David Harris, who worked with Dr. Scott Geller on multiple studies focusing on enhancing safety through computerized prescription orders, alcohol use problems in college students, and a prison-based dog training program
- Kristie Harris, who conducted research with Dr. Russell Jones on coping in families that were the victims of residential fires
- Rachel Rhoades, who completed an honors thesis with Angela Scarpa-Friedman on surveying the needs of and services provided to children with autism
- Laura Wilson, who conducted independent research with Dr. Martha Ann Bell on individual differences in cognitive development among young adults
- ◆ David Kidd received the Outstanding Undergraduate Research Award because of the quality and diversity of his research completed with Drs. Scott Geller and Kent Glindemann on aggressive driving behavior, bicycle safety, and alcohol use among college students
- ◆ Shelby McDonald received the award for Outstanding Psychology Senior for her work in all aspects of academic and community life including: completing an honors thesis with Dr. Angela Scarpa on physiological measures of emotional regulation and aggression in children, completing a summer internship on brain imaging at the University of Wisconsin, being president of the Psychology Club and Psi Chi (the psychology honor society), and being one of the co-founders of the Active Minds – a program to promote mental health on campus.

D. Graduate Research Mentoring

- ◆ 8 students earned the MS in Psychology
- ◆ 10 students earned the PhD in Psychology
- ◆ 2 PhD graduates accepted positions as Assistant Professors and 5 moved on to post-doctoral or research scientist positions
- ◆ Graduate students research and professional development were supported by awards established by donors to the Department: The Galper Fund awarded \$2,000 for graduate student professional development activities and the Clinical Child Research Fund awarded \$1,500 for graduate student research. The 2005-06 Departmental Personnel Committee conducts the departmental review for promotion and tenure in accordance with the procedures described in the Faculty Handbook, which indicates that the departmental committee shall consist of the Department Chair and an appropriate faculty representation. For purposes of tenure recommendations, the Personnel Committee in the Department of Psychology shall consist of the Department Chair plus six other tenured faculty members; three elected by the full-time faculty and three appointed by the Department Chair after the election. Additional members may be appointed by the Department Chair to represent specialty areas for any year in which promotion or tenure is being considered. The committee composition will be announced in a manner which disregards the elected or appointed status of its membership. Based on faculty discussion and vote, and, consistent with

the College of Sciences' Promotion and Tenure Committee, the "peel-off-by-rank" system will no longer be used for promotion to Professor. The Department Chair and the Personnel Committee may choose to meet with Professors to discuss promotion considerations for candidates being considered for promotion to Professor.

The Departmental Personnel Committee shall be responsible for making recommendations for any new faculty appointments that will involve an entering tenure appointment and/or rank above assistant professor. The Departmental Personnel Committee will also be responsible for providing the Department Chair with an assessment of the degree to which the committee feels that each faculty member (below the rank of Professor) is progressing satisfactorily within rank. This is not to be confused with the assessment that the Annual Review Committee makes of the annual Faculty Activities Reports by the faculty. The former involves a review of the entire career of a faculty member, while the latter is an assessment of the productivity for one year. Both assessments will be shared with the faculty member at the time that the Department Chair provides the annual performance evaluation. The PROMOTE process was implemented by the Personnel Committee during 1998-99, and will be continued during the current academic year. The PROMOTE process is available in a separate document. The Personnel Committee also serves as the department's Post-tenure Review Committee, should a post-tenure review be required consistent with department and university policy.

During fall 2004, faculty members voted that Personnel Committee members will serve a two-year term, and the term will be based on calendar years. Thus, elections were held in January 2005 for the calendar years 2005 and 2006. The next election will be for a term that begins in January 2007.

This committee will be composed of all faculty who teach a course in the graduate Core Curriculum. Their functions will be to assure that the goals of the core curriculum are achieved. They will also be the group that considers requests for graduate course waivers and substitutions. When a student who has received the M.S. from VPI & SU and is applying for entrance into the Ph.D. program, it will be the responsibility of this group to recommend to the Director of Graduate Programs whether the student should be approved for acceptance. The committee will consider letters of evaluation from members of the student's thesis committee and the vote of the student's graduate area faculty. This committee will also evaluate the credentials of persons who have obtained their M.S. degrees from another university and are recommended by a graduate area for acceptance directly into the Ph.D. program. The committee will also consider proposals for new graduate courses (both within and outside of the core curriculum). It will be required to meet a minimum of at least once each semester and will work closely with the Director of Graduate Programs.

GRADUATE ADMISSIONS AND SUPPORT COMMITTEE

The Graduate Admissions and Support Committee consists of the Director of Graduate Programs and faculty representatives (appointed by area directors) from each of the three graduate areas. It is their responsibility to insure that only those applicants who meet the high standards of this department are admitted. This committee also will coordinate offers of graduate assistantships to incoming students. The graduate admissions procedure will be as follows:

1. As applications are received from the Graduate School, they will be logged into a data-based computer file and will be placed in a separate folder kept in a central location.
2. It will be the responsibility of each area representative to insure that the folders for each area are available to the faculty and are not misplaced.
3. The area faculty will rate the appropriateness of each applicant. These ratings will be maintained in the student files.
