THE SITUATION

The county (median) income is \$900 below the state. The number of farms has decreased some 27% since 1955. 85% of the county's young people leave the county because of the lack of work opportunities and many older people are forced to commute 35/40 miles for regular employment. There appears to be a definite need for taking a closer look at the total resources within the county to determine possibilities for overall economic development

THE SPECIFIC PROBLEM

Lack of suitable county-wide, representative committee to identify major problems and plans for their solution.

THE PROGRAM OBJECTIVE:

To organize and maintain an effective RAD committee and necessary sub-committee for the purpose of making a complete analysis of the county situation and determining problems and possible solutions.

A MAJOR EMPHASIS - EDUCATIONAL PLAN

PROJECT AREA: 4-H AND OTHER EXTENSION YOUTH PROGRAMS

PHASE: 4-H ADULT LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT, CALENDAR YEAR - 1964

THE SITUATION

For the 175 club members in the county, there are 14 men and women 4-H adult leaders. Approximately 6 of these leaders are very well trained and assist with the program effectively, however, the 4-H program would be more effective, if there were more leaders and if they were better trained adult leaders. Five men leaders were secured in fall 1963 which is improving the program.

THE SPECIFIC PROBLEM:

Display active participation in the absence of an agent but tend to shift the responsibility back to the agent when he or she is available. This tends to slow down the overall program. PROBLEM: The lack of more well trained adult leaders.

THE PROGRAM OBJECTIVE:

To solicit and train more participation of public spirited men and women as effective 4-H adult leaders.

Most county farmers average 25 miles from normal marketing facilities at Richmond, Tappahannock, Providence Forge, and Urbanna. Farmers are not using fully the services of farmer organized and operated facilities, i.e. Feeder Pig Sales, Feeder Calf Sales, Fat Cattle Sales.

THE SPECIFIC PROBLEM:

Farmers do not use, in all cases, the marketing facilities available to them and especially farmer organized and operated facilities.

PHASE: AGRONOMY - GENERAL, CALENDAR YEAR: 1964

THE SITUATION:

21,000 acres of cultivated crops are produced in King William; 5,000 acres improved permanent pasture; and 3,000 acres of hay. Yields of row crops and hay are generally equal to the immediate area, and above state averages. Bulk of farmers are general farmers producing corn, soybeans, small grain, hay and pasture, and generally do a fine job with a good season. 1963 drought hurt our county farmers financially and the full effect will not be realized until spring planting.

THE SPECIFIC PROBLEM:

New varieties, types of fertilizer, cultural practices, insect, disease, and weed control, and harvesting and storage methods.

THE PROGRAM OBJECTIVE:

To keep farmers posted on latest developments in crop production, harvesting, storage, and conservation of the soil.

King William County is a grain surplus county. 7500 head of hogs, of which 800 are considered breeding stock. County averages approximately 6 pigs per litter weaned; requires 15 bushels of corn to produce 200 pounds of pork only far, with some improvement in last few years. County has a Hog and Pasture Club which conducts a "More Pigs Per Litter Contest".

THE SPECIFIC PROBLEM:

Too few pigs weaned per litter and feed conversion in market hog operations too low.

THE SITUATION:

12 grade "A" dairies involving approximately 2000 adult cattle in the county make up approximately 25% of the total income. 11 are on the Richmond Milk Market and one on the Norfolk market. The county dairies are profitable businesses but have the normal problems of the day with labor, high production costs, and large capital investments. Due to the 1963 drought dairy farmers are forced to take full advantage of the Disaster Feed Grain Program.

THE SPECIFIC PROBLEM:

Dairy management practices could be improved to include milking practices, feeding techniques, and more and better use of DHIA and artificial breeding programs.

THE PROGRAM OBJECTIVE

To keep dairymen informed of up to date recommended management practices and to avail themselves of these improved techniques.

AND NATURAL RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

PHASE: FORESTRY - FORESTRY IMPROVEMENT, CALENDAR YEAR: 1964

THE SITUATION:

65% King William County OR 105,000 acres in forest land, 16% of this area is in pine and/or more than 50% pine. Approximately 42,000 acres are not paying their own taxes and needs the landowners attention. A Forestry Club was organized in 1957-53 to promote interest in forestry, which has had an average of 40 members (adults and juniors). This group has led the way each year with the county doing approximately 1500 acres of forestry improvement work annually.

THE SPECIFIC PROBLEM:

Approximately 50% of the landowners have done little or no forestry improvement work.

THE PROGRAM OBJECTIVE:

To stimulate interest among landowners in doing forestry improvement work on several acres annually; to stress approved forestry practices; and to work closely with service agencies and commercial foresters in an over-all forestry program.

THE SITUATION

Most farmers are forced to keep general farm records for tax purposes. Very few keep farm records in sufficient detail to be of value to them in improving farm enterprises. Several enterprises may be losing money while few enterprises might be paying and thereby the over-all farm shows a net profit. Present day farming necessitates detailed record keeping.

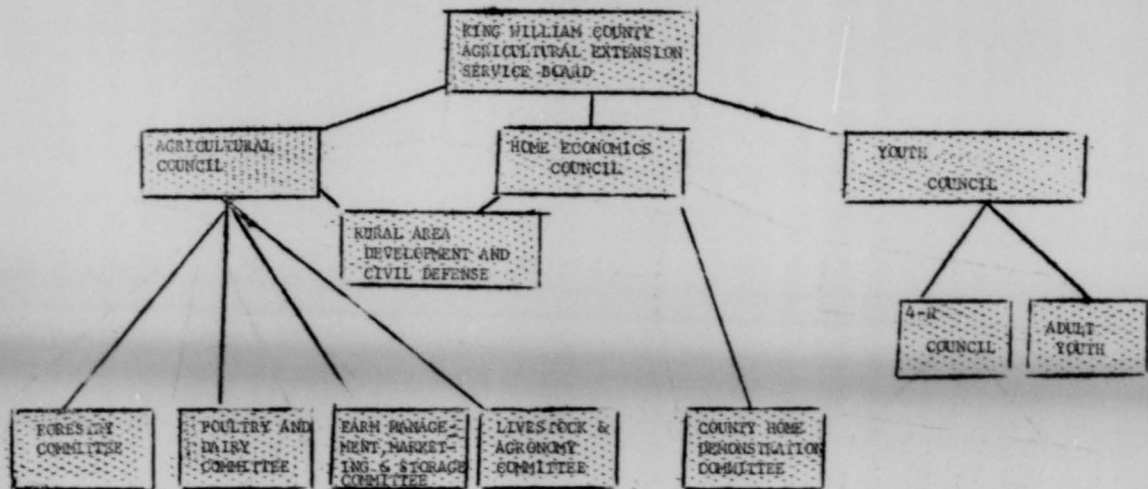
THE SPECIFIC PROBLEM
